The people of this county will have opportunities to enlist at the following places: Spur, Dickens, Afton, and McAdoo. The people living in each of these towns will be given an opportunity to join on Thursday and Friday. Saturday the opportunity will be extended to our rural residents as they visit these trade centers.

Your attention is called to the fact that the worker who approaches you on the street will be wearing an official Red Cross badge and his or her services is free to the local chapter. If you should be unable to help this cause your courteous treatment of these jokers is but a gentleman's obligation.

Keep this fact in mind. A regular membership is one dollar. Only fifty cents of a dollar membership remains in our local chapter. Fifty cents goes to the National Chapter. This is the way the National Chapter raises funds with which it goes to the relief of disaster torn communities as it did in Dickens County in 1931. We should not forget that great service. A one dollar and fifty cent membership will net as much to our local chapter as two one dollar memberships will net as much to the local chapter funds as eighteen one dollar memberships. Two ten dollar memberships will net as much for local relief as thirty-eight one dollar memberships.

T. H. Tallant Died Sunday At Home Of His Daughter

Funeral rites were read Monday afternoon at 3 o'clock at the First Baptist Church of Spur for T. H. Tallant, 79, who died Sunday morning at 11:25 at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Jesse Hagins and Mr. Hagins, of eight miles east of Spur, with whom he has made his home since the death of his wife which occurred in 1926.

T. H. Tallant was born in the State of Miss., later coming to Texas and to Dickens county where he has made his home for a number of years.

Mr. Tallant was one of the earliest of the pioneers of this section and a number of years before this county was organized came through this section on a hunt for buffalo, that being his occupation at that time, and no doubt his excursion caused him to decide upon this vicinity as the place he would like to make his home in later years.

Rev. A. P. Stokes, of Afton, his pastor and Rev. J. V. Bilberry, a pioneer Baptist minister who also traveled horseback through this territory in the early days and an old friend of the family, jointly conducted the services. Webber Williams was in charge of funeral arrangements.

Surviving are five children, Mrs. Jesse Hagins, Spur; Will Tallant of near Big Spring; John; Abner and Robert Tallant of Waurika, Okla.

Interment was made in the Spur cemetery in the family lot beside the grave of his wife.

Pooling Exemption Tax Certificates

We are informed by the Washington Office that the demand far exceeds available supply, Nov. 6th, and unless the National Pool receives surplus Certificates promptly it will be impossible to meet the requests from other Counties needing the Certificates.

At present date there is not a dead line set on pooling your Certificates, however, it would be highly appreciated by this office if the producers will pool their certificates regularly to avoid congestion later on in the year after the closing date is set. The announcement of the closing date and other details will be published in our local papers when available.

A program embracing the expenditure of over \$60,000 has been approved by the Works Progress Administration of the federal government to be expended in the city of Spur. Final endorsement of the program was received this week by City Manager Larry Burrow, who has been at work in the project for the past eight months.

Most of the important streets of the city will be paved with a tripple coating of asphalt following the relaying of the city mains, which according to federal requirements must be jointed with copper and which work will begin immediately.

In addition to this some 5,000 shade and ornamental trees will be planted within the corporate limits of the city under the supervision of the Tree Planting Administration of the federal government.

Spur's parks and golf course will not be slighted in the appropriation granted by the government for the improvement of parks and playgrounds.

And last, but not least, Spur is at last to have that much wanted bathing pool. \$27,000 will be spent on this project and it will be available to every person living in this vicinity at the low charge assessed by every government project.

The city of Spur will be in the next few months, thanks to her progressive city officials and manager, the playground of this section as well as the business center.

3 Monuments To Be Erected In Co. With Centennial Funds

Three monuments will be erected in Dickens County in the near future to be paid for out of Centennial funds, according to information received here this week.

One of the monuments to be erected will be a tablet placed at Soldier Mound, which on early day maps and charts was listed as Mt. Anderson and was known as Fort Anderson. This mound is the scene of one or more Indian fights and on its more or less flat top, according to the legend, are the graves of soldiers who died in action. Anderson for whom the Fort was named, was a member of the 10th Cavalry.

Another of the monuments, the site of which has not as yet been selected, will be dedicated to those who died in action.

The third monument will be erected to the memory of John Dickens, one of the heroes of the Alamo, and for whom Dickens County was named. It will be located at the County Capitol, Dickens.

Four hundred dollars has been appropriated for the monumentees.

**Overs And Unders
Must Have Poll Tax
Exemption Receipts**

All eligible voters who are exempt from poll taxes must have an exemption poll tax receipt before he or she will be allowed a vote.

We take this means of notifying citizens of the free voting age and will appreciate the cooperation of everyone in contacting those who might not notice this in print.

Article 2968 of Chapter 5, Title 50, of Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925 is amended by the addition of article 2968 which reads, in part, as follows:

Every person not subject to the disqualifications set out in article 2954 of the Revised Civil Statutes of 1925 who does not reside in a city of ten thousand inhabitants or more, and who is exempt from the payment of a Poll Tax by reason of the fact that he or she has not reached the age of twenty-one years on the first day of January preceding its levy, or who is exempt from

the payment of a poll tax because he or she was not a resident of the State on the first day of January preceding its levy, but who shall have since become eligible to vote by reason of length of residence or age, shall on or before the thirty-first day of January of the year in which he or she offers to vote, obtain from the Assessor and Collector of Taxes for the County of his residence a certificate of exemption from the payment of a poll tax, and no such person who failed or refused to obtain such certificate of exemption from the payment of a poll tax shall be allowed to vote.

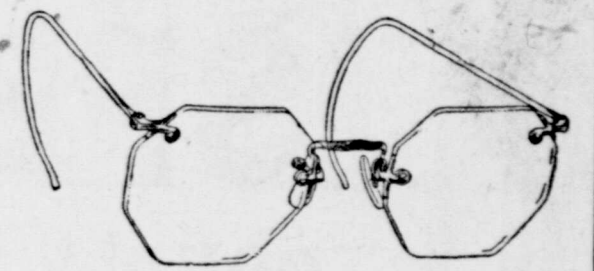

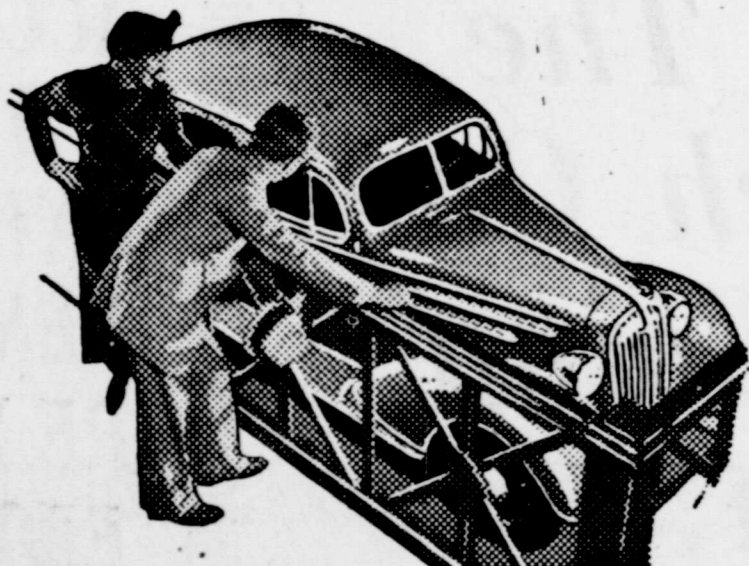

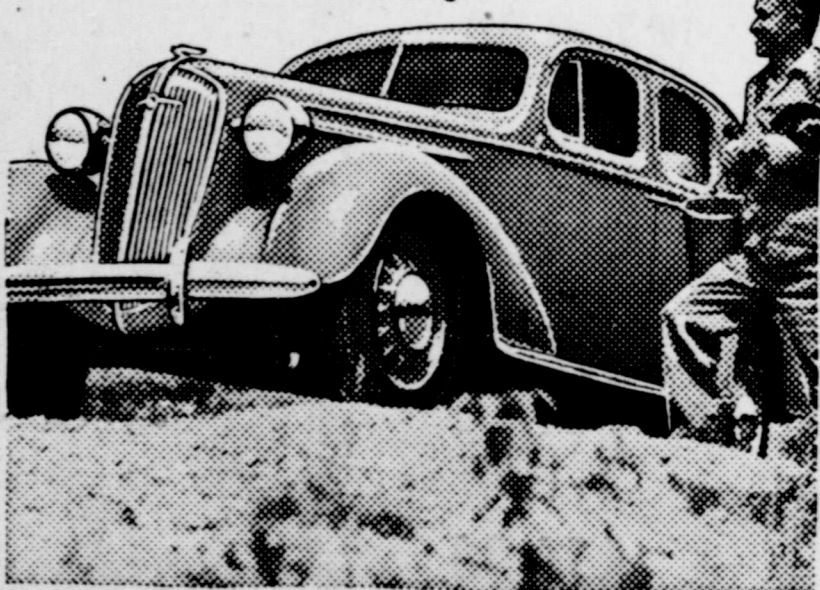
