NOTICE OF INTENTION TO ISSUE REFUNDING BONDS

Notice is hereby given that on the 14th day of December, 1936, the Commissioners' Court of Dickens County, Texas, will pass an order authorizing the issuance of Refunding Bonds of said County, in the maximum amount of Fifteen Thousand (\$15,000.00) Dollars, for the purpose of refunding and in lieu of a like amount of indebtedness, consisting in valid and legally issued time warrants now outstanding against the Permanent Improvement Fund of said County, described as follows:

\$15,000.00 Courthouse Improvement Warrants, dated November 9th, 1936, bearing 6% interest, and maturing \$1,000.00 on November

9th in each of the years 1937 to 1951 both inclusive.

Said Refunding Bonds shall bear a maximum interest rate of five (5%) per cent and shall mature serially over a maximum period not exceeding fifteen (15) years.

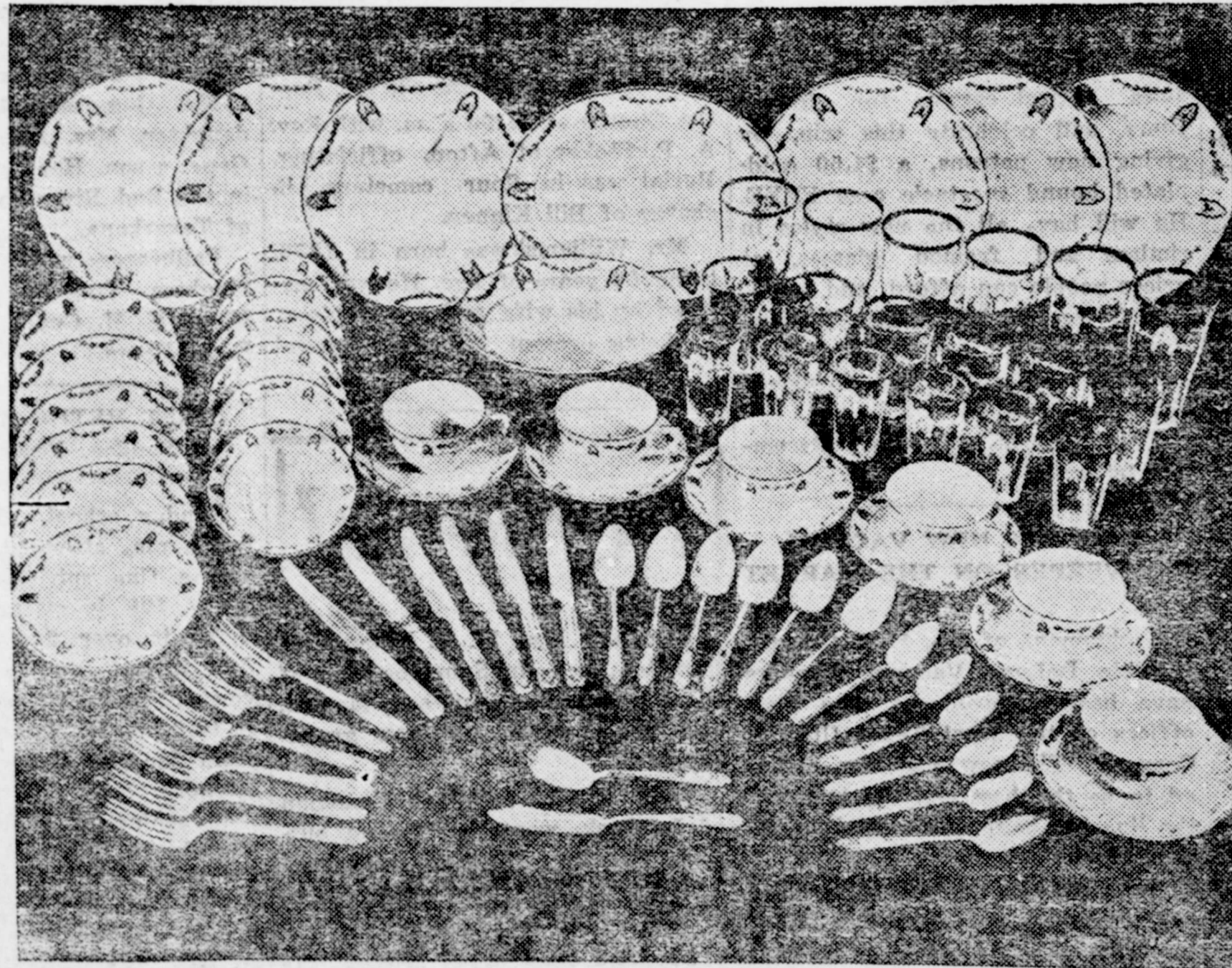

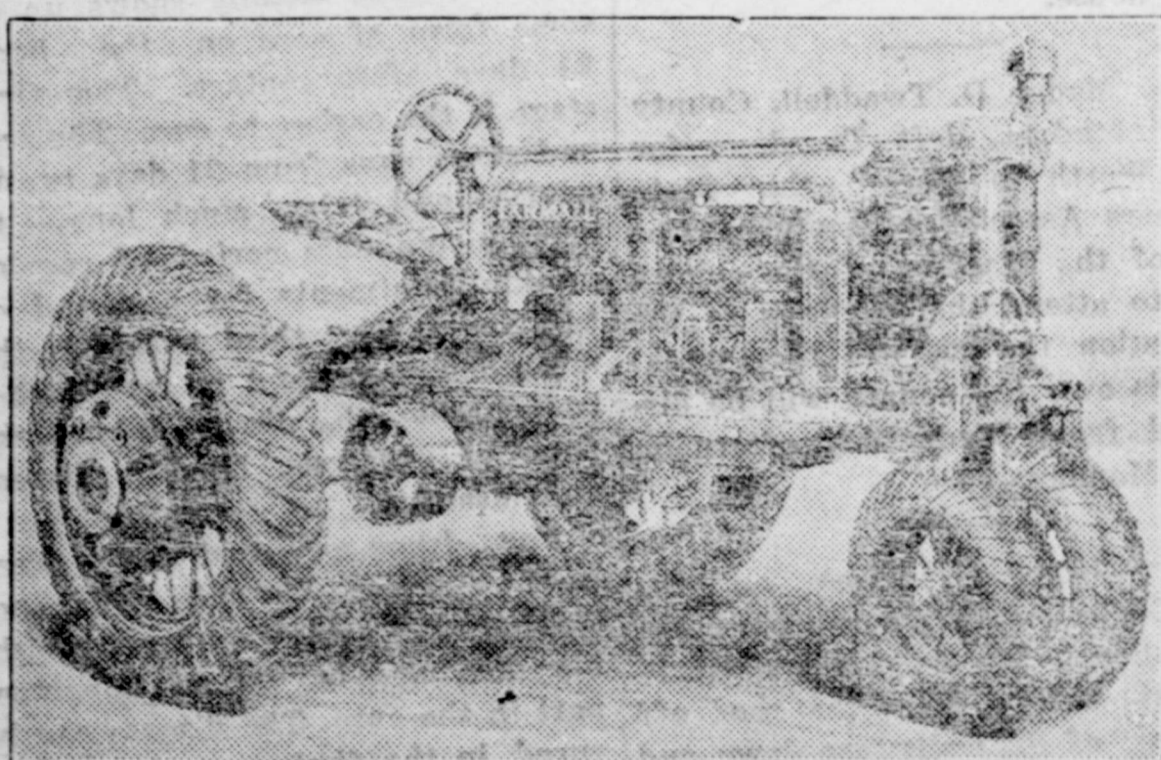

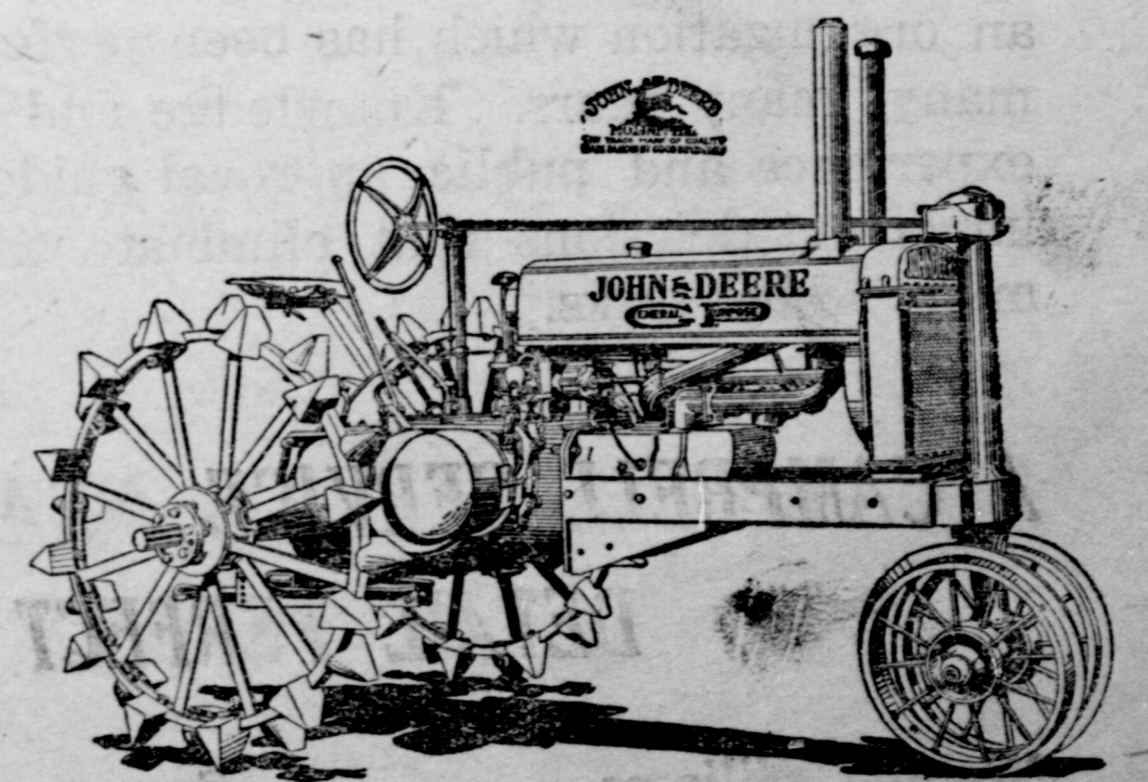
