Local Doctors Give Talks On Syphillis

As part of a national campaign by the Public Health Service against the continued spread of syphillis Dr. Bob Alexander and Dr. B. F. Hale used this subject for a program at Spur Rotary Club last Thursday. The continued spread of the disease is alarming and doctors in connection with the state and federal health departments are trying to educata the public about the disease and the cure for it. The following facts taken from the talk by Dr. Alexander are given, not for sensational publicity, but for the valuable information that person should know.

The definite origin of syphillis is unknown but the scientific explanation is that the disease has been known ever since the beginning of recorded history. The disease is world wide and has been studied by medical science for hundreds of years. In 1905 the germ of the disease was discovered and in 1906 the Wasserman test was discovered which is a blood test which shows whether the disease is in the blood stream or not. This test is not infallible and according to the doctors a person may have syphillis and the Wasserman test not show

In 1910 the first drug cure for the disease was found. Because the disease has the ability to similate most any disease of the body a cure was hard to find. In discussing incidence of the disease the doctor stated it was very prevalent and no one was immune. Estimates give 10 per cent of the entire population as afflicted with a higher per cent for the negro race.

Transmission of the disease is two ways: 90 per cent being by sexual intercourse and 10 per cent by innocent contact.

The disease usually shows up in some form of sore on the body 21 days after contact. This first stage is the easiest to cure. The second stage runs from 21 days to six Fort Worth to attend the State months and takes much longer to cure, a minimum period of regular. weekly treatments for a period of plan to attend the meetings of the two years. The third period is the most dangerous and in many cases is incurable, the disease taking the form of paralysis, Bright's disease and insanity.

Four drugs are used in the treat Work began last week on the ment: mercury, bismuth, iodide potassium and arsenic and a nourishing diet also having an important part in the cure. The disease can be cured in the first, second and possibly the third stages with the proper use of the right medicines. But the high cost of the medicines and treatments retards the cures in many cases. Another factor in the cure of syphillis is that after a few treatments the patient feels much better and has no visible effects of the disease and the tendency is to discontinue the treatments.

The public health service urges the public to recognize the necessity for treatment, treatment that will eventually cure. The disease today is more prevalent in the United States than in any other country and is the most wide spread disease in this country. Accurate surveys of the disease have never been completed because of the nature of the disease.

Dr. Hale cited many instances of the disease, how it was spread, its cure, the condition of many of those who had contacted it. Two living examples, showing two stages of the disease, were presented to the club members by the doctors.
