ELECTION PARTY!

The Castro County News is going to have a party—an election party.

The time is Saturday night beginning when the first returns come in and continuing until 7 p. m.

The big board will be located directly in front of The News office—now located just across the street from the Ramey Implement Co. Lights will be strung across the street affording everyone a view of the big board. There will be lots of parking and standing room. And we'll try to have some ice water.

County Chairman E. F. Harman and his staff will be located at The News office and election officials are requested to communicate with him there.

It is doubtful if state returns can be posted on the board this year under a ruling of the Texas Election Bureau which forbids the practice. However, announcements can be made as to who is leading.

All county returns are expected to be in by midnight Saturday and will be published in the Sunday morning extra of The Castro County News.

Wheat Shipments To date 286 Cars From Dimmitt

Two hundred and eighty six cars of wheat had been shipped out of Dimmitt up to Wednesday of this week, local Denver officials said.

This represents about 429,000 bushels of grain.

The price trend was encouraging this week, the price at local elevators being 82c per bushel Thursday morning.

Candidates Spoke Here Saturday Nite

County and District candidates waxed warm and eloquent last Saturday evening on the court house lawn before a large and attentive audience of Castro County people.

One district candidate stated that the Dimmitt crowd was the largest and most attentive of any he had attended this year. Practically all county candidates were present and the following district candidates:

For District Judge R. C. Joiner and Charles Clements.
For District Attorney—Chas. H. Dean of Dimmitt.

For Representative—A. B. Tarwater and W. W. Hick Halcomb. Mr. J. N. Johnston of Floydada was not present but announcement was made for him.

Judge Lackey of Borger spoke in behalf of Clint C. Small.

E. F. Harman presided and introduced the speakers.
Arrangements for the occasion were in charge of J. W. Bell and E. F. Harman.

Free lemonade was served to the crowd through the courtesy of the candidates.

FEED LOAN APPLICATIONS MADE AT COURTHOUSE

There has been established at the courthouse in Dimmitt, an office where applications for Emergency Feed loans will be received. Field Supervisor John S. Andrews announced Thursday.

Applications for loans will be accepted from farmers and stockmen for the purchase of feed for farm and range livestock and to plant forage crops in Castro county, which has been designated as emergency drouth area. Miss Stella Harman is in charge of the local office and the county committee consists of Bruce McLean, O. Stephens, and C. O. Byrnes.

In discussing the regulations the Field Supervisor pointed out that applications can be accepted only from applicants who have no means or other sources of credit enabling them to undertake the production of a forage crop or crops or to purchase feed for their livestock.
Loans will be advanced in monthly installments, with supplemental application necessary for each month's requirements.
The lien securing the promissory note given will be subject to non-disturbance agreement to be executed by lien holders, if any, who must agree to take no steps to enforce the payment or collection of any claim against the borrower nor dispossess him of any property until Jan. 1, 1936.
Applications must be submitted to the Emergency Crop and Feed Loan Committee for Castro county in which the applicant's livestock is located or forage crop to be planted.

HOW TO VOTE

The Texas Ballot consists of the names of the candidates only.

The voter expresses his preference by running a pencil mark through those whom he is NOT voting for. The name that is NOT scratched is the vote that is counted.

Placing a check mark or an X before or after a name DOES NOT COUNT and a ballot so marked is declared void.

If the voter does not wish to vote in a particular race he does not scratch any of them.

Any defaced ballot or punched ballot is void. If the voter makes a mistake or mutilates his ballot he should turn the same over to the election officials and request a new one.

Road Work

Work on highway 86 east of Dimmitt was going along nicely this week with most of the fences having been set back and grading on the curve just outside the town having been completed.

The work is under supervision of the State highway Department with labor furnished by the local relief office. Nearly all of the right-of-way has been secured, according to County Judge Percy Estes.

PARRISH CAMPAIGNS FOR SHEPPARD HERE

Sterling J. Parrish, of Amarillo, son of former State Senator Pink L. Parrish, was here this week campaigning for the State Comptroller George H. Sheppard.

The literature being distributed by Mr. Parrish reveals the record of Mr. Sheppard and shows the increase in collection of several taxes since Mr. Sheppard's tenure of office.

Mr. Sheppard was instrumental in getting legislation thru the legislature which practically stopped bootleg gasoline and tax free cigarettes.

Election Extra!

If present plans carry thru, The Castro County News will issue an election extra Sunday morning, July 29th.

The paper will not be mailed out but will be distributed in Dimmitt FREE of charge.

These will be distributed to the homes and will be available in local drug stores.

The election returns carried in the issue will be those received up to about 1 o'clock Sunday morning.

Both local and State returns will be reported as nearly up to date as possible.

Under the new ruling of the Texas election bureau no returns can be given over the radio nor can they be posted on a bulletin board.

The Castro County News will be the first paper in Dimmitt to give you the returns.

So far as is known this will be the first time an election extra has been attempted by as small a paper as The Castro County News.

Sadler Company Opens Tonight; Three-Day Stand

Harley Sadler and his own company will open for a three-day stand in Dimmitt, beginning tonight, Thursday.

Sadler comes here from Plainview. There are forty-six people in the company this year and the plays are said to be the best in many years.

Harley Sadler's show needs no introduction to West Texas people.

The entertainment is being brought here under the auspices of the American Legion.

Through a mutual understanding and agreement with the Castro County News, election returns will be announced between acts at the Harley Sadler show Saturday night.

85 Absentee Votes

Eighty-five absentee ballots have been cast in Castro county, according to County Clerk W. F. Cone.

This is the largest number of absentee votes ever cast in this county, it is said, and may be taken as an indication of interest being taken here.

Boxes were delivered to precinct chairmen Wednesday of this week.

CATTLE BUYING IN THIS COUNTY IS DELAYED

Cattle buying under the Emergency Drouth program has been delayed by non-receipt of forms and instructions. A wire from College Station gives the information that supplies of forms have been exhausted and will be forwarded as soon as received from Washington.

However, arrangements have been made for handling the cattle from the north side of the county out of the County Agent office at Hereford, and all those in that part of the county should make application thru that office.

Campaign Has Been Unusually Quiet For State

Texas today is on the eve of another primary election that has probably been less intense and less bitter in the campaign stage than any held in the state for more than a decade.

Throughout the campaign which opened in January there has been a marked lethargy on the part of the voters. However, it is expected that a near-record vote will be cast. This prediction is based on the large number of absentee votes in all counties.

Over the State generally, of course, the Governor's race is in the spotlight. The color and bitterness which usually characterizes this campaign has been conspicuously absent this year, largely due, many believe, to the fact that James E. Ferguson nor his wife are seeking office. Ferguson, a potent factor in Texas politics for the past twenty years is supporting C. C. McDonald for the office which Mrs. Ferguson is vacating.

The four major contenders for gubernatorial honors, according to most prophets are: James V. Allred, Tom Hunter, McDonald, all of Wichita Falls, and Clint Small of Amarillo. Both Maury Hughes of Dallas, and Edgar Witt of Waco, are considered the trailing candidates.

All of the candidates have more or less centered their verbal fire upon Attorney General Allred, who most people predict is virtually certain of a place in the run-off.

Other races have failed to attract more than passing attention with the exception of the race for Attorney General in which Walter Woodward of Coleman and Wm. McCraw of Dallas have spent some months berating each other from the stump. Clyde Smith of Tyler is the third man in this contest.

In the district races in this particular district chief interest is centered in the contest between Charles Clements and R. C. Joiner, both of Plainview for the office of District Judge. Judge Clements is the present incumbent, while Judge Joiner formerly held the post.

Mild interest has been shown in the race for Representative, with A. B. Tarwater, of Plainview seeking re-election to his fourth term. Two more contestants are J. N. Johnston of Floydada and W. W. Hick Halcomb of Dimmitt.

Chas. H. Dean of Dimmitt, is unopposed for District Attorney.

County Races

Chief interest in the county races lies in the contests for Sheriff and for County Clerk.

For Sheriff the five cornered race is between Garland Brown, Bill Burnham, G. W. McIlroy, J. H. Snider and John Nolen.

In the clerk's race the four candidates are: W. F. Cone, incumbent, Glenn Hickman, Mrs. R. B. Boren, and Carlos Reynolds.

There are contests in all the Commissioner's races. In Precinct 1, John Lille, incumbent, is seeking re-election and is being opposed by H. G. Connally and Barber Eubanks.

In Precinct 2, H. M. Horton, incumbent is opposed by Sid Sheffy and O. C. Axtell.

L. A. Ricketts in Precinct No. 3, who is a candidate for re-election is opposed by Fred Duck Boswell.

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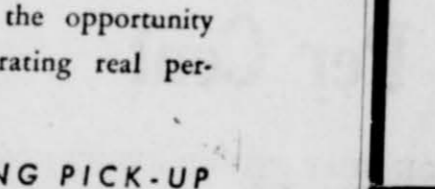

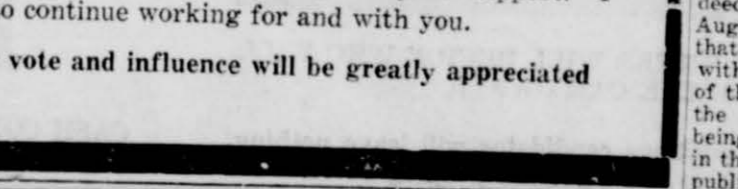

Here's Who Is Eligible To Vote Next Saturday

Persons who have moved to Texas from another state since January 1, 1933, but who have lived in the state at least a year can vote poll tax free in the Saturday Democratic primary.

Such voters may go to the polls on election day and make affidavit that they have lived in the state at least a year, but they were not here by January 1, 1933.

These persons and others who come within the following classifications may cast their ballots in the primary, officials said.

1. Persons who paid their poll tax before January 31, 1934 and who present their poll tax receipt at the polls, or make affidavit that they have paid the tax.

2. Persons who have become 21 years of age since January 1, 1933 (not 1934) and who claim their exemption at the polls.

3. Those persons who have become 60 years of age since January 1, 1933 (not 1934) and who claim their exemption at the polls.

4. Persons who have moved to Castro county since January 1, 1933, but who have lived in the county at least six months.
