Members of the Winters Emergency Medical Services Association and new EMT students will be offering, for sale, the "911 Emergency Flash-

Many times the response of an emergency vehicle is delayed when drivers have difficulty locating homes, particularly at night when house number are impossible to see or directions to the house are unclear.

The "911 Emergency Flash-Lite" creates a beacon which signals approaching emergency vehicles, helping the driver find the home more quickly.

The "911 Emergency Flash-Lite" is a simple device and very easy to use. It screws into any normal light socket, such as an inside lamp or an outside porch light. It converts your normal porch light into both a standard porch light and a secondary use: a flashing light in case of emergency.

It can alert neighbors to a need for help or if you call an emergency service, such as fire, police, or ambulance, it identifies to them which house they are to respond to.

With the simple gadget installed in a porch light, it operates the porch light under normal conditions by simply turning on the light switch, but should an emergency arise, the light switch is turned on twice

within a couple of seconds and will continually flash until the switch is turned off again.

People can get emergency equipment to the right house faster by notifying an emergency agency when you call for help that you have a "911 Emergency Flash-Lite" and simply go to the house where the light is flashing.

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

Home of the Seventh Generation

When Perry Poe bought his house recently in the Bluff Creek area fourteen miles north

strange because Moro Mountian was located fifteen miles to the east. The little village consisted

His great, great, great grandfather, Henry Clay Mitchell moved with his family to a farm in the vicinity in 1887. They came in a wagon from Whitewright.

> By 1895 a widow, Elizabeth Elliott, had secured a contract to carry the mail on the Guion to Moro Route, about fifteen miles, which paid \$100 every three months-and the carrier fur-

> nished transportation. Mrs. Elliott bought the 25 acre farm that now belongs to Perry and Jeannine Poe. She lived there for 40 years or more,

the mail. Although the farm now has a modern two story house, Perry razed a small barn that had probably been hers. Several clumps of thriving oak trees dot the farm and shade the yard where children play.

The Daniel Elliotts and their seven children traveled more than a thousand miles from their native Kentucky in a covered wagon for Mr. Elliott's health, but he did not improve and died in 1894, less than a year after his arrival. The family continued living in a log cabin on a ranch in two years later, and her husthe Shep area, and worked for the owner. The oldest son, LeRoy, took his father's place, but when the rancher, who had killed a man, whipped LeRoy Mrs. Elliott feared for their lives and appealed to neighbors. Three men took their guns and wagons and moved the family to a house on the C. M. Hunt ranch where they lived rent free until home near Moro.

Mrs. Elliott continued carrying the mail. As each child became sixteen years old he could be sworn in as a substitute carrier to assist his mother. At one time or another all the children helped carry the mail.

The children also worked at such jobs as were available in a farm and ranch area. LeRoy was thrown while breaking horses on the Jim Wood ranch. When his mother learned he was hurt, she hitched the horses to the wagon and went after him. Neighborhood men sat with him that night. Early the next morrearing her family and carrying ning they told her that LeRoy

had died. They buried him by his father on the southern slope of Flat Top Mountain in the Bluff Creek Cemetery. It was 1896.

The Widow Elliott's path crossed that of H. C. Mitchell after his wife, Susan Mariah, died in August of 1902, when his son, James, and her daughter, Alza Dean, were married in December under the sheltering oak trees in her front yard.

Tragedy again struck the family with the death of Alza in 1910, her four year old daughter band in 1917. The three remaining Mitchell children went to live with their father's brother, Henry. The oldest, Margaret, died last year, and is buried by her parents and little sister. James Mitchell and Irvin and Beatrice Schroeder continue to live on the Mitchell farm in the Draso Community.

The Perry Poes had an eye for Mrs. Elliott was able to buy her the future when they bought a home with a 25 acre yard. They already have a nice wheat crop growing and the grass in the yard established. When they entertained the Poe clan at Thanksgiving there was room for their three girls, Amber, Erica and Amanda to play with cousins, Jenea and Bethanie. And Matt, the lone boy cousin, kept busy riding the four wheeler. The girls are looking foward to owning a pony, or two,

or three. A fitting climax to the day was the visit to the quiet Bluff Creek Cemetery lined by sturdy cedar trees that protect the graves and shelter the birds that sing above them. The influence of these staunch pioneers who struggled to establish their homes and provide a better life for their children lives on.

It makes us conscious that our roots are deep and strong.





Extension Service offering farm computer training

Farmers and ranchers in central and western areas of Texas can sharpen their computer skills by participating in several short courses conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

A short course on "Electronic Spreadsheets and their Use in Agriculture" will be conducted December 7-9. A second short course on "Farm and Ranch Accounting" is set for January 4-6. Both will be at Tarleton State University, Stephenville.

The National FFA Organization is the new name for the high school group previously known as Future Farmers of America. "I view this action as a progressive move that needed to be

made," said Jay Hays, president of the Student Body at Texas A&M University.

Hays, a former Texas FFA vice president, said delegates to the recent national meeting of the youth organization in Kansas City voted to take the word "farmer" out of the name because it was hurting recruiting.

Hays said that although FFA remains in the organization's title, it no longer reflects farming as a career.

"One might compare the FFA name change with that several years ago of Texas A&M, which no longer stands for 'agricultural and mechanical college' of Texas," Hays said.

"We are not the National FFA Organization, or FFA organization of each state, as a result of action by delegates to the 61st annual conference of the youth group," he said.

Hays is an A&M senior from Wolf City majoring in agricultural education.

Hays said FFA officers and U.S. Education Department advisors to the organization recommended the name change to help reduce a 23 percent decline in membership since the mid-70's.

Hays said the FFA has about 416,000 active members nationwide, with about 54,000 of them residing in Texas.

RRC levies fines

The Railroad Commission assessed a total of \$13,000 in well plugging penalties to five oil and gas operators for problems under Commission well plugging rules.

The largest of the penalties, \$8,000, went to Western Oil and Gas, Inc. of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma for four inactive and unplugged wells on the company's Mable Montgomery lease in Shackelford County. The wells have been inactive and unplugged for more than two years.

A similar penalty of \$3,000 was levied against Rolling Hills Production of Skellytown for an inactive and unplugged well on the Belle Wisdom lease in Hutchinson County.

Three operators agreed to pay penalties without admitting any violation of Commission rules. Kimleco Petroleum, Inc. of Wichita Falls agreed to a \$500 penalty for two wells on the Perkins-Prothro lease, Wichita County; Sydson D'Oro Exploration Company, Inc. of Houston agreed to a \$500 penalty for a well on the W. W. Fondren lease, Colorado County.
