OIIL BIIDNIESS . .

Is there any chance we could be seeing a real turning point in product prices?

Gas prices are very strong, oil prices are sympathetically on the the upswing, and monthly checks to royalty owners are up. Could this be the time we have been waiting for when oil and gas will finally start to bring a price commensurate with our expectations?

Nope. I hate to be so negative, but, as many of you probably have surmised, this is not a significant product prices. The current prices are a very short-term phenome-

The cause is, of course, the weather. Not just the weather around here, but the news-making weather of the northeast. The Blizzard of 1996 is the big news story of the young new year, and it has been a resounding success as a public relations push for higher oil and gas prices.

Gas prices got as high as \$3.00 in some areas and oil prices moved above \$20 for a while. But, the prices are dropping as you read this. This is a return to reality.

The major market fundamentals still point to a stagnant or even down year for prices worldwide. Although consumption will be up, non-OPEC volume will more than account for any needed increase in production.

I expect prices to be near \$17 for oil and \$1.50 for gas in March. The bright side of this shortlived event? Well...

Bigger revenue checks for any time, even for just a month or two, can't be all bad.

And, the realization that petroleum fuel is in strong demand may have a psychological impact on the market for the long term. Thus creating a mental floor for prices in traders' minds, and possibly strengthening the market's FEL of H.J. Kleberg Sur. No. 114. perception that prices of a finite and valuable resource must increase over the long term to account for the short-term risk of running low.

Don't get discouraged when prices drop back. Be prepared to take advantage of whatever opportunites that present themselves under the low price scenario. And, hope that long-term prices will finally start to rise as the marketplace sees the value in oil and gas.



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
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Last week I was involved with three funerals. It really was a good way to begin the New Year. Funerals have a way of getting us back on track. Back to basic questions. Questions like: Where am I headed in my life? What would I like to yet accomplish on earth? What will I be

In none of the funerals did anyone mention money. Or property. Or awards won. Nothing like that. In all of them, the departed loved ones were remembered for their character, their faith, their love of God, and the love of their family. One was a priest. One was a father. And one was a grandmother. All will be missed by their family and friends. All will be remembered for their giving of themselves to others. They were all like those of whom Jesus spoke when he said, "Whoever would save his life will lose it, and whoever loses his life for my sake will find it." These folks all found their life by loosing love from theirs for others, and so — they found it.

It was so refreshing — to go to these funerals. To hear the testimony of friends and family to the real worth of the one who had died was so encouraging. Each one was different. Each had a different calling. But each had a faith in the same God who revealed Himself in perfect love, the love of Jesus Christ. And this faith demonstrated itself by being active in love.

So, when they died, their loved ones gathered. To grieve, yes. But like a melted Chocolate bar and more than that — to pay respects, to give praise and thanksgiving to popcorn too. Chef's were bring-God, and to rejoice in the great gift of love that they had received.

Father John, Johnny Frierson, Mary Goodner. My close friend in ministry, a man I came to know in prayer, and my daughter-in-law Mary's grandmother. All were, in their own way, smaller incarnations of Him who became "incarnate of the Virgin Mary." All had an effect on my life. All were buried the same week.


It was the week after the New Year when these funerals took place. It was not too long after that wrinkle in time known as the Incarnation, God became human. In those 30 some years He had tough times. He had to encounter evil face-to-face. He had to learn sympathy for human beings by becoming one. He had to suffer with us. He had to forgive sin by taking on our sins. He had to defeat death by dying.

That makes a profound difference. Each of my friends who died had severe pain their last days, devastating cancer. But they never stopped praying. And, as a hospice doctor once said, "When my patients pray, they are talking to someone who has actually died — something that is not true of any other adviser, counselor, or death expert."

It's His death that makes ours tolerable. It's His love that will not let us go down the tube. Like the Gospels say, "This is love: not that we loved God, but that he loved us and sent his Son as an atoning sacrifice for our sins,

Greater love has no one than this, that he lays down his life for his

For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son." That must be why, in that week in which we buried three friends, I felt so very close to God in the funerals. His love was present: And His love is stronger than death. You could feel it and know — and believe. And resolve to live as they did. In His love and passing it on! What counts and what lasts! Love never ends!



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


