Winters educators receive prestigious awards

Two administrative staff members of Winters Independent School District have recently received awards for outstanding service.

Mike Harris, WISD Superintendent since May, 1996, was named Administrator of the Year by the International Society of School Librarians. Harris received his award for his efforts on a two-year project at Poth, where he served as superintendent from 1992 to May,

While at Poth, Mr. Harris helped his school build a media center, complete with state-of-the-art equipment. Poth was entered in a national competition for the project and was the only small school making the final cut. County Auditor Darlene Smith reported to Runnels County Commissioners that the county had takenin\$126,849.05 more money than it had spent for the fiscal year ended September 30. This compared to \$3,876.29 for the fiscal year ended September 30, 1995. The report was given in conjunction with the County Auditor's annual report which was approved by Commissioners at their special meeting on Tuesday, November 19.

Commissioners also discussed health insurance coverage for retirees and their spouses again, but again tabled action until the wording for the resolution could be worked out and sent to Blue Cross Blue Shield for their approval. The discussion has been whether persons who retire from county employment should be allowed to remain on the county's health insurance policy at their own expense until they reach the age of 65 and qualify for Medicare.

Commissioners approved Sheriff Bill Baird's request for a separate account to keep funds received from the Texas Department of Criminal Justice on their Releasee tation. Housing Payment Agreement.

Commissioners Nursing home administrator and son plead guilty

charges related to Medicare fraud. by the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the State Department of Health and Human Services led to the charges.

Michael Shaun McDaniel, owner of McDaniel Medical of Eastland, pled guilty to one count of mail fraud before U.S. District Judge Sam Cummings in Lubbock on Thursday, November 14. McDaniel Medical of Eastland is now defunct.

McDaniel's mother, Darlene Powell McDaniel pled guilty to misprision of a felony—knowing about the scheme but telling no one about it.

Darlene McDaniel was relieved of her duties at Heritage Oaks when the investigation began last January by Dalton Hughes, owner of Heritage Oaks. At the time, Hughes said he knew of no wrongdoing, but felt he must fire Ms. McDaniel to protect the nursing home's repu-

Roger McRoberts, an assistant U.S. Attorney in Lubbock, said a Medicare claims processor recognized a potential problem from the number of claims submitted by McDaniel and called the FBI.

McRoberts said Shaun McDaniel would be held accountable for the entire amount of the fraud despite pleading to only one criminal charge. "It doesn't make any difference, bottom line, as long as the total amount of the fraud is agreed to," he said.

Shaun and Darlene McDaniel could both face jail time, fines up to \$250,000, or both, plus three years' probation or restitution. Mail fraud

FEL of Lot 16, Blk. 1A, H&TC Sur., A-In the news recently, there have been a lot of stories about up-andcoming petroleum companies that are growing by leaps and bounds.

The thing that they all have in common is that they are buying reserves-not finding them. This is a trend that has several causes and consequences.

The causes are not as easy to sort out, but I have a few ideas.

First, recent increases in oil prices has upped the price companies are willing to pay for properties. This, in turn, has made it more attractive to sell properties, especially if you are company in need of cash or are focusing efforts in another area.

Additionally, technology provides leverage for companies (who have the expertise and capital to use it) to acquire properties, increase production, and reap rewards well above the cost of acquiring the property.

Consequences are more opinion than anything at this juncture, and you know I have plenty of opinions.

There will probably be an overall consolidation of ownership to the companies who have that expertise and capital. Also, acquisitive companies who do not keep up will get outbid for properties, or, worse, liquidated by those who do lead.

One thing to remember, though. A company cannot grow forever by acquiring properties. These fast-growing companies must find new oil or their growth will be limited to increasing margins on acquired properties, which is not a bottomless pot of gold.

We'll watch those new companies that are doing so well now to see if they figure this out.



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
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The other day I came across an article written for the Washington Times, dated December 27, 1993. The title was "A Reverence for Roots and Rural Life." That's what caught my eye, and captured my attention as I read a most stimulating and insightful column honoring the writings of Kentucky poet/farmer Wendell Berry.

Wendell Berry has written 30 books, including novels, short stories, 10 volumes of poetry and 11 collections of essays. He teaches two courses at the University of Kentucky, one in composition and the other in poetry. He is well respected as a writer and teacher, but he refers to himself as a farmer and works the land year-round. He left a promising job teaching English at New York University to return to Port Royal, Kentucky, population of 100 (or thereabouts). He took up farming with his wife Tanya and their two children on the 12 acres that had been in the hands of his family since 1803. They now have 125 acres. He has a flock of sheep, a milk cow, and a pair of draft horses. The land is rough, "covered with trees and grass, rolling country, steep in places." But it provides firewood and much of their food. He grows squash, corn, tomatoes, and many other things.

He believes in marriage and the family and the community as God's creations. To those would change the institution of marriage as glibly and indifferently as they might shed a coat, he writes, "It is foolish to think that ancient community forms can be satisfactorily altered or safely discarded by the intention of individuals." He denounced the "sixties radicals," who styled themselves as a "a generation free of history" who could begin anew, shrugging off the legacy of their forebears.

In his writings, he demonstrates that he has grave doubts about free markets and international trade. He fears the emergence of an economic elite that would exploit world resources just as brutally as industrialists raped Appalachian coal fields. "The proposed revisions of the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade would throw our farmers into competition with farmers of the Third World, thereby endangering agricultural economics both here and there.'

He rails against the "cult of expertise," which he sees as an enemy of rural society and of America generally. We wrongly assume "that any necessary thinking will be done by certified smart people in offices...then will be handed down to supposedly unsmart people in

In his book "Sex, Freedom, and Economy," Berry attacks politically correct sex. "We are living in a sexual atmosphere so polluted and embittered that women must look on virtually any man as a potential assailant, and a man must look on virtually any woman as a potential accuser." No surprise to Berry. The cult of sexual liberation detaches sex from community life. "It has forsaken trust for it rests on the easy giving and breaking of promises." Having forsaken trust, it has become political. In private life as in public, we are attempting to correct bad character and low motives by law and by litigation.'


About work, he writes, "Self realization comes from doing the work that is required and from accepting responsibilities with a glad heart. To work without pleasure or affection, to make a product that is not both useful and beautiful, is to dishonor God, nature, the thing made, and whomever it is made for.."

Sounds like a prophet to me, this man from Kentucky. And "not for profit" is he prophesying. For sure he makes you think. And maybe, just maybe, return to a real reverence for roots and rural life.

It took all day and until late at night to bring home a load of groceries from Ballinger. A trip to Abilene took two or three days. Blizzards were frequent in the winter that froze the potatoes and fruit so country merchants carried very little fruit, but had plenty of arbuckle coffee with a stick of candy in each package for the children. Twenty pounds of sugar or beans could be bought for one

The family residence was built onto the south side of the store. Mrs. Townsend usually boarded the shoool teachers and served meals for 25¢ to travelers and drummers, as salesmen were then called. Once Will B. Hogg, son of ex-Governor Hogg, stopped for breakfast. He ordered cantaloupe and the children thought it very odd. One of the children said, "Our parents told us, as was then believed, that if we ate anything like that before breakfast it would make us sick."

> In addition to fried chicken three times a day, there was ham and bacon for breakfast, roast for dinner, and steak for supper. Since there was no bakery in town, bread was baked every Saturday and ice cream was served on Sunday, made with a hand-turned freezer. A large bell was rung to call people to meals.

> There was no laundry in town and the family did the washing on two machines, having a hundred sheets on the line by sunup in the mornings. The hotel was always rushed trying to care for the crowds.

Estimating fertilizer carryover

economic impacts on the agricultural industry. Current estimates indicate that livestock and crop losses have amounted to over 2.1 billion dollars. As a result, it is important that agricultural producers identify methods for reducing reproduction inputs for fall and winter crops this year, and for spring crops next season.

One place to look for savings is in the soil. In cases where fertilizers were applied in the spring or even late last winter, little rainfall was received and crops did not make, many of the plant nutrients are still in the soil.

The best method for estimating fertilizer carryover is soil testing. A soil test is a chemical analysis of the soil which determines whether levels of essential plant nutrients are sufficient to produce a desired yield. When not taken up by a crop, some nutrients, particularly nitrogen, can be lost from the soil by leaching or volatilization. Others, like phosphorus, can react with the soil over time to form compounds which are not available for uptake by plants.

Soil testing can be used to estimate how much loss has occurred and predict what types and amounts of nutrients should be added to produce a particular crop and yield. Fertilizer savings could range from a few dollars per acre to more than \$20 per acre.

For operations where fall and winter fertilizer applications are practiced, now is an excellent time to obtain a soil test. It is generally recommended that one "compos-

The drought of 1996 had major ite" soil sample be collected from cores taken randomly across each uniform area. The 10 cores are placed in a clean plastic bucket, thoroughly mixed and than about 1 pint is sent to the laboratory.

Individual soil cores can be taken using a regular spade, soil auger or soil sampling tube. First, scrape any plant litter from the surface. On heavy, clayey cropland soils, also remove the upper 1-2 inches of soil material. Make the core or boring 6 inches deep. When using a spade, dig a V shaped hole and take a 1-inch slice from the smooth side of the hole. Then take a 1 by 1-inch core from the center of the shovel slice.

By collecting 10 to 15 individual cores across the area, one can ensure that the soil test results will be representative of the site which has been sampled and that fertilizer recommendations will be appropriate.

Complete sampling instructions and sample bags can be obtained from the county extension office.

Soil tests can be obtained from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service Soil, Water and Forage Testing Laboratory in College Station, Texas, or from various private laboratories across the state. Costs range from about \$10 up, depending on laboratory and type of tests requested. Contact the county extension office for more information.


