Word comes right at the end of the year that Floating, Production, Storage, and Offloadning (FPSO) vessels have been blessed by various industry groups as appropriate for developments in offshore Texas and Louisiana. But, what is an FPSO?

These handy-dandy contraptions are really boats there is no limit to what men "("floating") designed to handle all of the normal operations ("production, storage, and offloading") of a fixed platform. They have been in use in the North Sea and other challenging offshore environments for the last decade.

The vessels are more than bo"boats" and are closer to luxury liners in size, complexity, and cost. The design, construction, and operation of these vessels have been perfected by dozens of successful applications in significantly more hazardous offshore environments.

The idea behind these floating "platforms," as it were, is to produce a field where it couldn't be produced otherwise. The difficulties that an FPSO typically provides a solution for are: deep water, small reserves, and remote developments.

An FPSO can provide an economical solution for fields that are in deep water where building a fixed platform is technically unfeasible or just too expensive. Where reserves are small, leasing a small FPSO can provide a solution that could never be solved with a costly fixed platform. In remote locations where tie-backs to fixed platforms (another oftused alternative solution) are impossible, an FPSO can be used to develop and produce a field that might otherwise have to be abandoned.



WINTERS—Cora Geneva Rucker Emmert, 101, died Thursday, January 17, 2002, the day before her 102nd birthday, at a local nursing home. On what would have been her 102nd birthday, January 18, 2002, her great-great-granddaughter was born in Oregon.

Geneva was born January 18, 1900, in Bruceville, Texas. She graduated from Bruceville High School as valedictorian at age 15 and received her teaching certificate at Mary Hardin-Baylor University. She married Jacob G. Emmert on July 22, 1921, in Bruceville.

Mrs. Emmert was a school teacher and principal. She was a member of the American Legion Auxiliary Unit #261 in Winters where she served as secretary and historian. She was a member of the National Retired Teachers Association and the First United Methodist Church in Winters.

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

His name is Joey. He's a beautiful boy who is in the second grade. Well built. Good looking. Outgoing. He loves to swim and will spend hours in the pool if you let him. But right now it's too cold to be in the pool, Minnesota's weather

does not permit it. So, if there isn't too much snow, Joey gets on his bike and rides and rides. Last Sunday he announced that he was going to "ride my bike." But in his hurry to get going, he couldn't find his boots so he put on a pair of sandals. Opentoed. The only trouble with that arrangement was that occasionally one would fall off. And that meant he had to hop on one foot or his stocking would get wet.

Joey is different. He loves to climb. And jump on the bed. When he gets up in the morning, when we are at his home, he hits the floor running, leaps down the stairs, flies into our bed and says, "Good morning Grandma Boo and Papa Jim." The first morning we were there, he then proceeded to sing "O Come, O Come, Immanuel" and expected us to join him. A little later he burst out with "This is the Day the Lord Has Made, Let Us Rejoice and Be Glad In It." If we didn't join in, he would put his face in mine and sing until I sang too. Joey is persistent. He is good to us. And he is good for us.

He loves school. And does well. His favorite friend is the custodian. And his teacher, well, he just loves her too. He gets along well with his classmates. And we are all so glad.

For, you see, Joey is autistic.

When he was quite young and his parents noticed that Joey was different, they took him to be analyzed...it was scary. His mother told me that they were told that "Joey won't be toilet trained until he is an adult," "Joey won't ever be able to ride a bike," "he won't be able to go to school, or ever be able to care for himself." She told me this as we were walking up the hill behind Joey on his bike as he demonstrated his skills and ability to balance so well while going up hill on the snow!

To be sure, he is different. But, he is special. And he is making progress. Strong as he is, he is a softy on the inside, and in many ways seems to have a special awareness of God. And what is important in our relationship to Him. Like when his little cousin was baptized. It was a special service, and along, one. Joey was well supplied with paper and things to play with... But then we started to pray the Lord's Prayer. Joey put down his stuff, folded his hands, and joined in prayer. And then, after we had said our "Amen," Joey clapped! For God. For the privilege of prayer!

He knows what's important. What's worthy of praise. He, the little learner, reminded me and taught me in that simple action what God is all about. The Scripture tells us that "a little child shall lead them." That Sunday, little Joey led...me. And, from that time on, the Lord's Prayer hasn't been the same old thing for me. It's been new every time. Just as it's supposed to be. Just as Joev showed me.



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



"We're healthy and I feel like we're coming together more as a team," Boxell said, "Hopefully, in the second half, this will carry over and we'll do even better."

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

Jan. 25, deadline to order SWCD windbreak trees

A tree standing alone adds certain aesthetic quality to rural living. But the systematic planting of trees in a windbreak becomes a management tool that affects every aspect of the farm or ranch.

Whether around a homestead, near cattle or bordering cropland, multiple row windbreaks act as a silent partner naturally protecting their investments. Windbreaks, in addition to reducing soil erosion, increase land value and crop yields, and reduce livestock

weight loss and mortality. Seedlings to produce such a conservation tree planting are produced by the Texas Forest Service at West Texas Nursery in Lubbock and are available for ordering this fall through the Runnels Soil & Water Conservation District (RSWCD). The deadline to order is January 25, 2002, and the trees will arrive on February 7, 2002.








