Home Motor Company's Demonstration Farm Successful

The Enterprise has watched with keenest and continuous interest the Home Motor Company's demonstration farm throughout the year.

We have watched the methods of cultivation from the beginning. The plowing preparatory to and preceding planting was done thoroughly. It was deep breaking and continuous listing. As a result the soil was thoroughly mulched before the seed were put in the ground.

Let it be remembered that this is the second year of this Company's demonstration farm. Two years ago when the tractor and plow were started in the field, it was thought by many that it would be a futile attempt at farming because of the deep seating and rankness of the Johnson grass. Indeed, the grass had such hold on the land it was enough to make one believe that the farm would never be tillable again.

The first year the tractor cultivating killed much of the grass and a partial yield of cotton was had. When plowing time came this year at the beginning of the year, every foot of the farm was broken deep again. Then it was listed and re-listed some six times. When planting time came the very best seed obtainable was secured for planting purposes.

After the cotton was up and ready for cultivating, there was never another idle moment with working the farm. The cotton

was plowed, and each time just a little more shallow until the last plowing was not much more than skimming the top of the ground. Many people have waited and watched for the outcome. There were many skeptics about tractor farming—some said, "it can't be did." But, the harvesting season is now on. Already about twenty five bales of cotton have been gathered and we believe, since going over the farm, Monday afternoon, with Mr. Knierim, manager of the Home Motor Company, there is more cotton yet to be picked than they have gathered.

In one field of one hundred and twenty seven acres, we believe they will get approximately fifty bales of cotton. The other field they have cultivated will not do so well, but it is purely due to the fact that the land is not adapted to cotton.

One thing is certain: The Home Motor Company have demonstrated that tractor farming is a success. They have also demonstrated that the sure way to kill Johnson grass is to go after it with a tractor. There is not enough Johnson grass on the field they have cultivated for two years to be visible scarcely to one's vision as he walks over the field.

And the cheapest farming for 1926 as we see it is tractor farming, for feed is for teams going to be so high, it will be almost prohibitive.

Going To Church A Bad Habit

An Episcopalian minister who is at war with his church men is quoted as saying:

"I consider going to a church and praying to a God to be bad habits."

It makes no difference how intellectually great that preacher may be, his assertion is too broad. Intelligent religion, faithfully lived up to, is always refining and ennobling in its effect upon, not only individual life and character, but the life and character of any community, or age, of people as a whole.

In this age of religious camouflage, there are instances of churches so low in their ideals of fidelity to religious principles that it is better to remain away from such a place than to go there for the purpose of religious worship. For, the shameful betrayal of the great principles of the Christ, the trampling underfoot of its rules and regulations the church in question has heralded so loudly to the world as the laws by which they are governed in the carrying on and maintaining the work and fellowship of the church; the hypocrisies of the minister in charge; the wilful disposition of a few leaders to make their wishes, whether right or wrong, the law of the church instead of fidelity to the established laws; the irreligious improprieties of its leaders or other members, which make such a church a stench in the nostrils of Almighty God and common decency; the lack of fellowship

(which, when it is what it should be according to the ideals of Jesus Christ with reference to the fraternal relations between men, is the most beautiful thing upon which the gazing angels ever looked) in which condition, every time its members and others go to the place of worship, they have to play the role of a hypocrite in their greetings of each other—when the members will go away and speak most shamefully of the leaders, and the leaders will go out and during the days of the week have a code of ethics towards some of the other members that would make a Digger Indian blush with shame; when members of the church are constantly and eternally back biting and

devouring each other and pouring out upon each other the slime of their filthy souls—great God, no, don't go to such a place to play the role of a worshiper, for if you do, you stultify your own soul and the minister's quotation above is true—it is indeed a bad habit to go to such a church.

But, if the church is one of the members of which love the sacred principles of Christ as they interpret them and love the established laws of their church, regardless as to what kind of government it may be, and who would rather die than so violate wilfully the laws of the New Testament and their church; whose members live clean, moral lives, and whose men and women have that modesty of life that keeps them from parading their goodness, in that pharisaical way, which makes them to say: "God, we thank thee that we are not as other men are," but who are quiet and unobtrusive and who walk humbly before the Lord and men; who truly love religion and are members of the church out of sincere motives; who seek to be real helpers in the great warfare of life; who fear God and love their fellows and they meet at the altar in the spirit of reverence for the divine and a spirit of brotherly love pervades them and they exchange greetings with each other, and indeed love each other and pray for each other and regard each other as brethren; whose men are pious and above just suspicion and whose hearts are "set on things above," and not on the lust and greed and the filth of this world, and they seek to be mutually helpful to each other—yes, a thousand times, to go to a church like that and worship is "like the dew of Hermon." And every time one takes advantage of such an opportunity, he only sets to playing the Aeolian harp of his own soul and there is always music for him sweet as "a song in the night," and he goes out to set a song of purity and cleanliness and piety and hope and good cheer in the heart of a sin scarred and wrecked race.

God, give us more churches like the last mentioned, for in them is wrapped up the destiny and happiness of the world!

Forest Fire Put Out by Heavy Ocean Fog

A heavy dripping fog rolled in from the Pacific ocean and put out effectively a fierce forest fire which had been burning for days in the Olympic peninsula southwest of Port Angeles, Washington. This is the only time recorded in northwest forestry of the occurrence of such a phenomenon. With no indication of rain and lacking water with which to fight the advance of the flaming menace, foresters watched the fire making progress toward the town of Quilcene, beyond which lay valuable tracts of big trees, when suddenly the wet fog descended. Like a huge gray cloud it settled down upon the forest, enshrouding everything. The fire fighters fled in terror lest they become bewildered and lost on the mountain sides. Soon the pungent smell of cedar and hemlock smoke disappeared and by mid-afternoon when the fog lifted, there remained only a few smoking dead logs, while all about the charred trunks of former merchantable trees dripped with water from the providential fire extinguisher.

Gulls' Breeding Ground

The numerous islands off the coast of Maine are one of the principal breeding colonies for gulls and here they build crude nests on the ground and in the evergreen trees. The young birds are clumsy, little brownish-gray objects and are often badly treated by the older ones. Indeed, many are attacked and killed, seemingly without reason, though this is perhaps nature's method of birth control. Those that survive the early weeks of life soon learn to take care of themselves, and by the time the southerly flight begins the young birds are fully prepared to fight the winter battle for food in New York harbor.

Rubber in Lignite

"Petrified" rubber has been found in German lignite, or "brown coal," it is reported at Jena, Germany. In lignite deposits queerly-shaped fibers known as "monkey hairs" are noted from time to time. Analysis showed that these were rubber, vulcanized over a great length of time because of the high percentage of sulphur present. In some lignite deposits the "monkey hairs" are like soft vulcanized rubber, in others like ebonite.

Animal Worship Not Yet Extinct in World

The idea has always been prevalent among primitive people that animals are endowed with souls that once inhabited human beings, says the Montreal Star. When a likeness is recognized between an animal and a friend who is dead, the animal is addressed as the person and honored with some sort of worship. Many tribes call themselves by the name of some animal.

The most civilized people among whom animal worship survives lie within the range of Brahmanism. Here the sacred cow is not merely to be spared; she is worshiped as a deity and bowed to daily by the Hindu. Perhaps no worship has prevailed more widely than the serpent. It has its place in Egypt and among the Hebrews, in Greece and Rome, among the Celts and Scandinavians in Europe, in Persia and India, in China and Tibet, in Mexico and Peru and in Africa, where it still flourishes in certain parts.

Many Small Additions to British Revenues

In the minds of most people the national revenue is linked almost solely with the millions derived from income tax, the duties on beer and spirits and customs dues. But the country's purse is augmented by many sources unrealized by the average person, London Tit-Bits says.

Prison gardens, for example, produce a small yearly revenue. Brompton cemetery burial fees add their quota to our money bags. Photographs sold at the National gallery and the British museum add a few hundreds a year, while the Tower of London contributes its gate money. At least £100,000 a year is derived from the Persian oil fields while dividends on our shares in the Suez canal amount to £500,000 a year.

Wrecks and derelicts driven ashore, flings of precious metals used at the royal mint, certain police court receipts, crown land rents—all these minor items help to pay our way.

A Tolstoi Tale

A veteran newspaper man was talking about conservatism.

"When I was a correspondent years ago in Russia," he said, "I once met Tolstoi.

"Tolstoi hated conservatism.

"The conservatives," he said, "declared that the liberation of the serfs would make things worse. As a matter of fact things are better now.

"In the old conservative days, before the serfs were liberated, all our beds were full of bugs, and when a guest visited some aristocratic home, the serf butler would be ordered to undress and lie an hour or two in the spare-room, so that the edge would be taken off the bugs' appetite, and the guest could sleep in peace."

Big Money for Heirlooms

At a famous London auction room the wonderful heirlooms of the Swathling family were sold under the hammer and were greedily purchased by collectors, says the London Daily Mail. The sale realized \$5,000 a minute and the total cash receipts for the day were close to \$360,000. The total sale realized \$460,000. Of particular interest was the Elizabethan rock-crystal ewer and cover, mounted with silver-gilt, with the Edinburgh hall-mark, c. 1565, by George Heriot, Sr., which fetched \$30,000. This fine piece was presented by Queen Elizabeth to John, Lord Erskine, second earl of Mar, for the baptism of one of his children about 1567.

Canada's New Industry

Canada has become Italy's rival as a macaroni manufacturer. Three years ago the Dominion imported 7,000,000 pounds of macaroni, principally from Italy. Last year it imported only a few hundred pounds. Canada's factories turned out 12,000,000 pounds. Exports increased from 319,000 pounds in 1922 to 2,229,000 pounds in 1923. The product went principally to the United States, Great Britain and Belgium.

The British now possess the former German African territory. Forty per cent of the people in the union live above an altitude of 4,000 ft.

Harvard's Herb Laboratory

The Harvard university botanic garden is to be turned into a test ground for all herbs suitable for the New England region. It will be a complete laboratory of plants grown in Northern gardens.

For Centuries Whale

Has Been Man's Prey

Considering the many centuries during which the whale has been pursued by man, and the growth of knowledge and mechanical appliances for its capture it is hardly to be wondered that the whale is in danger of becoming as extinct as the dodo and the ichthyosaurus, says the Montreal Star. Whaling was carried on to considerable extent during King Alfred's time.

The Atlantic right whale was hunted in the bay of Biscay as early as the Twelfth century. When few of these whales were left the Greenland right whale was sought. This was hunted first off Spitzbergen, from about 1610, then in Davis straits from about 1719, and finally in the north Pacific and Bering sea from about 1840. The sperm whale was pursued from about 1712. The whaling industry was revolutionized in 1865, when the modern harpoon-gun, which is a harpoon projectile carrying a charge of explosive, made it possible to capture the large and swift rorquals, or fin whales.

Marie has paid in full all the assessments for the year. Hayrick has paid salary and 50 per cent of Conference claims.

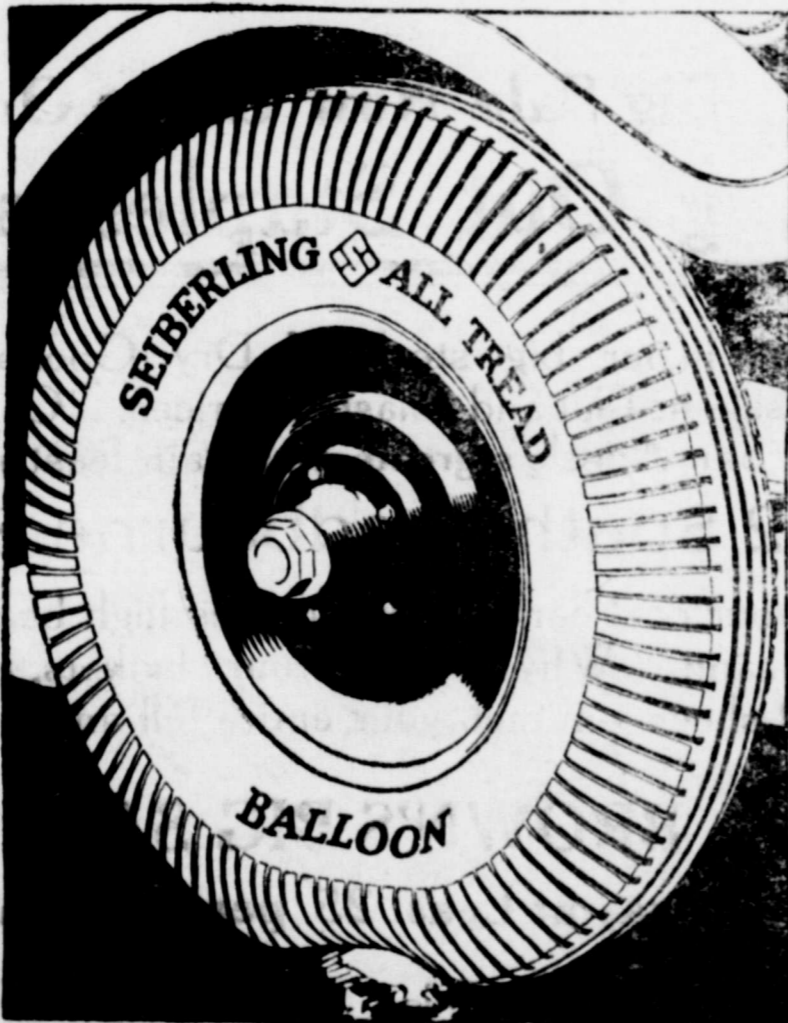

Well, I finally became president and now, after all my years in the railroad industry, I have still to find the 'mystery.'" —Wall Street Journal.

Veteran Violin Maker

Carlos Adams, of South Woodstock, Vt., is still making violins at the age of eighty-four. Though hampered now with partial paralysis in one of his arms, Mr. Adams has carved out and pieced together more than thirty violins of excellent tone since his sixty-fourth year. He even fashioned and made his own tools for carving out the fronts and backs of the violins. An Adams violin is hewn out with infinite patience and care from high-seasoned, 150-year-old spruce and maple timbers taken from the house and barn erected on his old homestead.

Vermont Planting Trees

In the last year the state of Vermont has planted more than 900,000 trees, representing 750 acres, according to Robert M. Ross, state commissioner of forestry, in his annual report, recently made public. This is a larger number than had been planted in any previous year, the call coming from owners of farm woodlots, from companies with large holdings of timber land, and from towns that have started town forests.

Greatest Coal Fields

The report of the Russian government commission, headed by Professor Obroutsheff, states that the coal fields recently discovered in Siberia cover an area of nearly 400 square miles, containing the greatest coal deposits in the world. The locality also contains extensive deposits of sulphuric minerals, possibly half a million tons of graphite, and numerous traces of platinum.
