Bronte on Air, Courtesy of Gas Company

Bronte has had many favors shown it by business firms and men of the surrounding towns and cities, all of which our thoughtful citizens always appreciate.

But, the greatest courtesy, perhaps, and the most unique consideration shown thus far, according to the thinking of The Enterprise, is that of the West Texas Butane Gas Company of San Angelo. Mr. Gay Copeland, manager of the West Texas Butane Gas Company, and his assistant, Mr. Vaughan Miller, have tendered Bronte the privilege of rendering a radio program, Saturday afternoon, over a hookup with KGKL at San Angelo.

Mr. Copeland, the manager of this Gas Company, is a hustler, and likes to get acquainted with and know people. He has a contract with KGKL broadcasting system at San Angelo. He has tendered his time over KGKL to Bronte for a program all of its own, at the time mentioned above. This is certainly generous and all our people will appreciate it. Mr. Copeland yields his time for business announcements over the radio to Bronte and besides he and Mr. Miller will come and bring their radio trailer and make the hookup with KGKL and the whole "big-eyed" world will hear something they never heard before, and that is a broadcast program "of Bronte, for Bronte and by Bronte."

The program will consist of an address by Mayor R. E. Cumbie, followed by a concert by Bronte's band, "the pride of the town." They will go on the air and let the nethermost parts of the earth hear for themselves that this town, called "Bronte," has "a bunch o' tooters" that for their size, and the size of the town, one will have to go a long way to find a town and a band that will excel them.

Mr. Copeland, the manager, in reality, owns the West Texas Butane Gas Company and hence it is his generosity that makes this remarkable program available to our people.

Mr. Miller has been a member of the highway committee of the San Angelo Board of City Development and to him is due much of the credit that highway 70 has become a reality and will soon be a paved highway from Bronte to San Angelo.

MRS. W. A. GLENN, DECEASED

The Enterprise carried a brief announcement last week of the death of Mrs. W. A. Glenn, who died early that morning, at the family home in Bronte. For the lack of time, we could give no biographical sketch of this truly noble woman.

Following is a sketch of the deceased, as we have gathered it:

Ollie Etta Swaim was born at Oxford, Mississippi, December, 26, 1860, making her to be in her seventy-sixth year when death came and took her away.

At the age of two deceased came with her parents to Texas, the family settling at Moody, thus becoming one of the pioneer families of Texas.

May 29, 1884 deceased was married to W. A. Glenn, at Moody, Texas. A few years later, in 1889, the young couple came to build their home and rear their children, in the West. They located at Ballinger, which then, was a small frontier town, only three years old. In 1902 Mr. and Mrs. Glenn came to the Bronte section of country, residing for a time first at Maverick then at Marie where Mr. Glenn owned and operated gas. Later they came to Bronte and have resided here continuously since.

To the union the following six surviving children were born: three sons, Cecil of Bronte, Hermon of Eldorado and James of Maverick; three daughters: Mrs. Josie Guitard of Waco; Mrs. Carrie Williams, Bronte, and Miss Gladys Glenn of Abilene. The children were all present for the funeral.

Besides the husband and children deceased is survived by a sister, Mrs. J. F. Lusk of Ballinger, and several grand children.

Deceased had been in failing health for some time and only recently had returned from a hospital at Ballinger and it was thought she was convalescing satisfactorily as could be expected, considering her age. But, in the early morning hours of April 2, 1937, when a tired world was asleep, taking its rest, the sleep that knows no awaking, came and closed her eyes to the objects and scenes of this life. But, in the land eternal her eyes were opened and she was privileged to look upon the beautiful things of heaven, "not made by hands."

The passing of this gracious mother and grandmother and devout, noble woman was with a struggle. Indeed, she only "fell on sleep"—and the ending of her earthly days was like her life—quiet, gentle and peaceful.

The writer came to know deceased and her husband first in 1900—hence, it is seen, that nearly forty years have passed! We were yet a young man, in our early twenties. We came to be pastor of the Ballinger Baptist church. We were young and inexperienced. Deceased was one of the older members of the church. She was then in middle life—she and her husband had upon them the rearing of their family. She and Mr. Glenn became our good friends. As a mother would give advice to a son, deceased was always willing to advise with us relative to the church and its work, as the young pastor sought advice—hence, we have only memories that are golden of those "beginning years" of life to us, of this gracious woman, as to her faithfulness to her home, devotion to her husband and children and loyalty as a friend to us as a

PIONEER CITIZEN PASSES

B. A. Taylor died at the family home, in the Juniper community, seven miles south of Bronte, Friday morning, April 2, 1937.

Interment was in the Mule Creek cemetery at Tennyson, Sunday afternoon, following religious services at the Tennyson Baptist church, conducted by Elder F. M. Powers of Hatchell and the writer.

Benjamin Albert Taylor was born in Massachusetts, January 30, 1852, making him to be in his eighty-fifth year when death called him from the walks of life.

January 30, 1881 he and Miss Loraine Edwards were united in marriage. The following year he and companion came to West Texas and cast their fortunes here. She preceded him in death seven years ago. Since that time deceased had hardly been himself. Approaching old age and the loss of the companion of his youth, seemed more than he could bear and he gradually pined away—old age and second childhood came on and he took but little interest in public affairs.

The young couple settled first in Runnels county, making their home at Old Runnels, before Ballinger was established, making them to be truly pioneers in this part of the West. In 1895 they moved to Coke county, buying and settling on the tract of land on which they built their home, and where they spent their lives, building their material possessions and rearing their children and at which place both died. For forty-two years deceased resided there. To them were born seven children who are as follows: Mrs. Annie Clifton, George and Ernest Taylor, Bronte; Ben Taylor, Fort Davis; Mrs. Sadie Jenkins, Oakland, California; Will Taylor and Arthur Taylor, Mule Creek, New Mexico. There are eighteen grandchildren.

In the passing of "Uncle Bat," as he was called by all who knew him another of the old pioneers has answered the roll call, having finished his work he has passed on to his reward.

The writer first met deceased in 1904. A friendship was formed that has not only survived but has ripened with the passing years. His was a spirit rugged as the eternal hills—if he was your friend, he was that regardless as to what the opinions of others might be—his fidelity was constant as the sun in its courses. Hence we sorrow personally over the passing of this old time West Texan and are thankful for such as he—for, they have bequeathed to those who are to follow a heritage as priceless as the wealth of the world.

N. Johnson Elected Superintendent of Schools Again

The board of trustees of the Bronte schools met Monday night and went into the election of a superintendent of the schools for the 1937-1938 term. The present superintendent, Prof. Nathan Johnson, was unanimously and enthusiastically elected—there was no consideration given anyone else. Prof. Johnson has directed the affairs of the school in such a way that his services are universally satisfactory. Prof. Johnson took charge of the schools during the 1935-1936 term, succeeding Prof. C. R. Owens, deceased.

All the other teachers for the ensuing year that were elected Monday night were those who are now teaching in the school. There were fourteen other teachers elected as follows:

Hull, Miss Martha Hunter, Miss Elizabeth Leonard, Mrs. Walter Bowden, Miss Faye Kirkpatrick, Miss Katherine Heaton, Miss May B. Roach, W. W. Mullens, Coach; O. C. Brinnell, and J. T. Henry, vocational agriculture teacher. The bandmaster, who is Martin Baze, and the scoutmaster, who is Waldo Fletcher, have not yet been elected, due to the fact, the board is waiting to determine the exact financial status of the school.

Likewise the home economics teacher, who is Miss Margaret Christie, has not been elected. The state district supervisor has to make an inspection of this department of the school and make a report before the board can elect a teacher.

The Bronte schools have a 515 scholastic enrollment for the ensuing year, which is six less than last year. Several families have moved out of the school district since the first of the year thus reducing the scholastic enrollment. Last year there were 34 transfers into the district and it is believed that number, and perhaps more will be transferred into the district by the time the date for transfers expires.

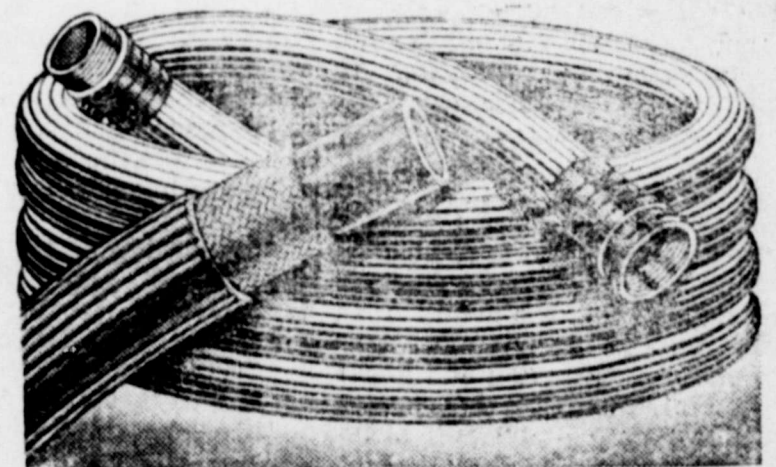

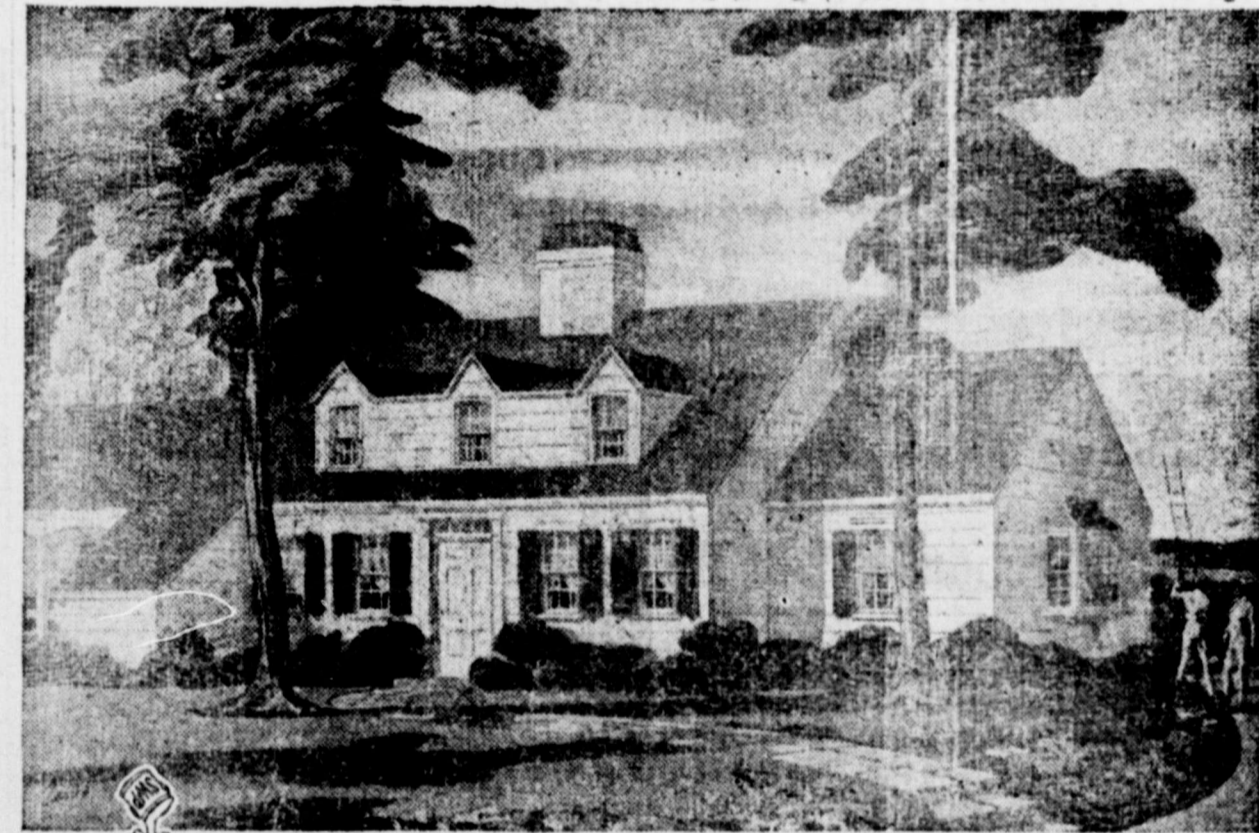

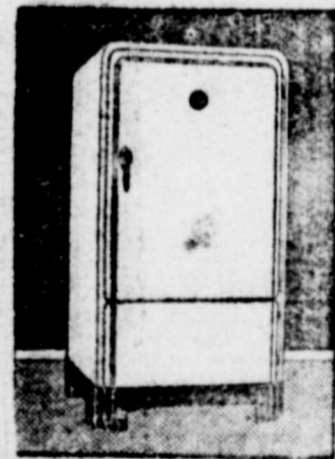
