R. J. Epperson, Bronte Postmaster, Dies Suddenly

All of Bronte was shocked Thursday morning when it became known that R. J. Epperson, postmaster at Bronte, died suddenly Wednesday night about midnight.

Deceased had been in feeble health, more or less, for some years—yet he was able most of the time, to transact the business of daily life. For some three weeks he had been confined at home much of the time, but his condition was not thought to be serious, and only Wednesday morning he expressed himself to friends that he was now on the road to recovery. Death was due to cerebral hemorrhage and the fatal hemorrhage had no connection whatever with the disease he had been struggling with for the past several years.

Interment was in fairview cemetery, late Thursday afternoon, following religious services at the Methodist church. The religious services were conducted by the pastor, Rev. Reginald C. Hardy, assisted by the pastor of the Bronte Baptist church, Rev. J. E. Eldridge. A beautiful floral offering was at the bier.

The pastor read the following biographical sketch of deceased:

"R. J. Epperson was born in Bell County August 6, 1890. He moved to Coke county in 1908 where he has lived since, except for two years when he was serving in the U. S. Navy during the World War.

"He was converted and joined the local Methodist church in 1912 and lived as a consistent member until his death. He was made a Mason January 23, 1926 and has remained in good standing ever since.

"He was married to Miss Mamie Grimes August 1, 1913 at Bronte.

"He has been in ill health for the past few years. He passed away June 5th just before midnight, the victim of a cerebral hemorrhage.

"He is survived by his widow and two sisters and six brothers. The sisters are Mrs. Walter Houck of Noble, Illinois and Miss Letha Epperson of Gatesville. Brothers are Owen of Coleman, V. T. of Dallas, Archie and Ivey of Gatesville, Walker of McGregor, and R. L. of Salem, Illinois."

The casket was draped with Old Glory and the body lay in state at the home until time for the funeral.

Following the religious services the Masons took charge and interred the body with the beautiful funeral rites of that order. When the Masons had concluded Edward Williams sounded taps and all that was mortal of the deceased Masonic brother and war buddy was left there, in the late afternoon, to sleep undisturbed until the dead shall rise.

Deceased at one time was mayor of Bronte which place he filled for several years. For the past several years he was postmaster at Bronte, having been given the appointment under the recommendation of Congressman Chas. L. South—and he was an excellent postmaster, always courteous and attentive to his duties, to both those serving under and with him in the post office and to all the patrons of the office.

The large attendance at the funeral from other cities, towns and communities of this part of West Texas attested as to the large circle of friends he had throughout West Texas.

Census Shows Bronte Population Has Increased

A preliminary announcement from the district supervisor of census, at Coleman, to The Enterprise shows that Bronte has grown since the census report of 1930 was made.

According to the preliminary report April 1, 1930 Bronte's population was 671. The report of April 1, 1940 shows that the town has 754 population. This makes the increase of population of the town during the decade to be 83, or an increase in percentage of more than 15 per cent.

Perhaps, the greatest fact the above discloses is that the rural population is being driven into town. To speak frankly about the matter it really does not show a healthy condition of the town and its immediate territory. While, of course, we do not know what the present census is going to show as to the status of the rural population in the Bronte section of the country, yet it is safe to state, it is our opinion that a decrease of the rural population will be shown, which explains the large increase in the town's population.

CHARLES BEST DIES AT IRAAN; INTERMENT THERE

Relatives and friends in and around Bronte were advised Friday morning of the death of Charles Best, who died early that morning in a hospital in that town.

At the request of deceased before he passed and at the request of members of the family the writer attended the funeral and had part in the religious services.

The religious services were held at the Church of Christ at Iraan, with Elder J. W. Roberts, minister of the church in charge. There was a large number of friends and acquaintances of the family in attendance. Elder Roberts read the Scriptures, offered prayer and read the brief biographical sketch below and spoke briefly. Then the writer, as an old time friend of deceased and of his family before him, spoke of the long friendship of the two families. The hymns of the church were tender and beautiful and the floral offerings likewise were beautiful.

The biographical sketch as read by the minister of the church follows:

"Charles H. Best, was born Dec. 18, 1894, in Gilmore, Erath County Texas. He passed from this life at 5 A. M. Friday, May 31, Age: 45 years, 5 months, 13 days. He had been in ill health for the last 6 months but not seriously until the past two weeks. He has lived in Iraan 8 years, coming here from Bronte, Texas.

"He is survived by his widow: one daughter, Mrs. Jack Rogers of Los Angeles, California; one son, Thurman Best of Iraan; two step-children, Alma and William Bryson of Iraan; two sisters, Mrs. Lee Rogers of Crane, Texas and Mrs. William Shane of Mineral Wells; one brother, Leonard Best of McCamey; one grandson, Jackie Charles Rogers, age one month, of Los Angeles California; his mother, Mrs. H. G. Guy, preceded him in death a little over a year ago, and his father several years ago. Besides all these, he leaves a host of friends and relatives to mourn his passing.

He was baptized several years ago into the Baptist church."

EXPOSURE FOR SUNTAN MAY BECOME SERIOUS

Austin, Texas, June 6—"Use caution in getting your suntan this season" is the advice of Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"Under a misconception as to the amount of sun they can take without ill effects, many persons thoughtlessly submit their unprotected faces, backs, and legs to over-exposure to sun and suffer painfully, sometimes seriously, as a result," Dr. Cox pointed out.

Restraint in acquiring a suntan is advised. Exposure of ten minutes the first day should be ample, and the amount of time spent in the sun can be increased on a day-to-day basis as the skin becomes accustomed to sunlight.

Advising sun-bathers to "learn their limits" Dr. Cox further pointed out that individual differences may determine the length of time that a person can stay in the sun without being burned.

Before becoming too ardent over sunbathing, one would do well to remember that many a vacation or weekend has been ruined because the blistering and illness-producing power of the sun's rays on tender skin was insufficiently appreciated.

Some persons are susceptible to sunburn but don't tan; other individuals tan over a longer or shorter period, but the same

RANCHES INVITED TO BRING CHUCK WAGONS TO REUNION

STAMFORD, Texas, June 4—It's getting to be an old ranch custom! After the spring round-up and branding are finished, bosses and cowboys load up the old chuck wagon and head for Stamford and the Texas Cowboy Reunion as a sort of vacation. There the ranch hands set up camp on a special reservation provided for that purpose. They eat at the chuck wagon, compete in the cowboy rodeo and take in the other attractions of the annual celebration.

W. G. Swenson, president of the Texas Cowboy Reunion, announced this week that all ranches are invited to bring their chuck wagons for the eleventh annual Reunion on July 2, 3 and 4. All provisions, including groceries and meats, after the wagons reach the Reunion grounds, are furnished without charge by the Reunion management. Employees and owners of the ranches bringing the wagons will be given chuck wagon passes. Visitors may have the novelty of eating at a chuck wagon but are required to pay for the meal.

Among the famous West Texas ranches which brought their chuck wagons last year were the 6666 ranch of Guthrie, Matador ranch of Matador, the Waggoner DDD ranch, Reynold Land and Cattle Company, Kent county; SMS Flattop ranch, Stamford; SMS Spur ranch, Spur; and SMS Throckmorton ranch. 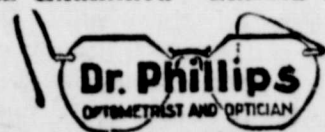
