## Soldiers from Camp Barkely Boost War Bond Sales Here

Saturday, September 18, 1943, will go down in the annals of Bronte as a "red letter day"—a new day, the like of which the oldest part of our citizenry even never witnessed, in this quiet, peaceful village.

The town has had many rallies through the years of its existence—rallies about everything from voting out "the town cow" to the election of William Jennings Bryan on his "thou shalt not crucify silver on a cross of gold" platform.

But, Saturday, it was different—it was "rally day in the 3rd War Loan Drive"—in other words, the rally was for the specific purpose of our people doing their part to keep Hitler and other would-be dictators from taking our most priceless heritage—our liberty, away from us. The soldiers came to town—they came with different kinds of warfare armament—the baby jeep, the amphibean jeep, the tank and the tank destroyer—kinds of warcraft, concerning which not even our older folk, much less the youngsters were not informed.

While there was fun and amusement for the kiddies in riding the jeeps and tanks, among the older there was a serious vein. The soldiers were "just like our home boys," dressed in uniform. They were courteous and polite to all and took pride in their weapons of death—and each one knew his particular arm of warfare like a college professor knows his abs.

There were 14 soldiers in the group. They came from Camp Barkely, through the efforts of Frank Keeney, president of the Bronte Community Service Club, Bruce Cliff of Robert Lee, and a few others. A detachment of same size and kind spent the day also at Robert Lee, concerning which we have had good reports. At supper Saturday evening the visiting soldiers were guests of the Club, with several local citizens attending the supper at the Cactus Cafe. The soldiers were taken to the homes of the people to spend the night. They were likewise entertained by the Club at breakfast Sunday morning.

There was a booth on the streets in the afternoon for bond sales in charge of the ladies. Quite a number of sales of bonds and stamps were made. To Saturday night about \$40,000 of bonds had been sold.

While we do not want to sound a discouraging note, yet the above amount of sales is a long, long way from the goal of Coke county's quota, which is \$157,000.

E. S. Sandusky died of heart attack at his home in Merkel, at 3:30 o'clock, Sunday afternoon, September 19, 1943.

Interment was at Merkel Tuesday afternoon, following religious services at the Merkel Church of Christ, by the minister, Elder Claud Smith.

Deceased was a native of Kentucky. He was born June 8, 1859. He and Miss Nellie Korkar married in Kentucky August 30, 1888. His companion survives him. Mr. and Mrs. Sandusky observed their 55th wedding anniversary, last August 30th. They came to Texas in 1892, locating in Hunt county, where they resided for nine years. Then, they came to Coke county, near Bronte, where Mr. Sandusky engaged in farming and stock-raising. Some years ago they moved to Merkel where they have since resided.

**STATE HEALTH OFFICER WARNS AGAINST NEGLECT OF COMMON COLDS**

Austin, Texas, September 23—With the advent of fall and the attendant seasonal changes of weather, common colds become much more prevalent and widespread in the state.

Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, has issued a warning against the careless treatment of any respiratory illness since they can and frequently do result in the dreaded complication, pneumonia. He emphasized the fact that pneumonia usually strikes with little or no warning, following a simple cold, an attack of influenza or some other respiratory infection.

"A cold or any other infection of the breathing passage, especially if accompanied by fever, demands immediate attention of the doctor," the state health officer said. "To try to fight such a disease without bed rest and by means of self-medication may endanger life unnecessarily."

According to Dr. Cox, prevention is better than cure and in order to avoid colds, influenza, and pneumonia he advised building up normal physical resistance by sufficient ventilation, adequate nourishing food, outdoor exercise and sufficient sleep and rest. "However," he added, "if, in spite of such care, respiratory illness develops, a family doctor should be called immediately."

The fact that pneumonia is definitely a communicable disease is often overlooked, Dr. Cox stated, but this should be in mind so that the danger of passing the disease from one person to another can be eliminated.

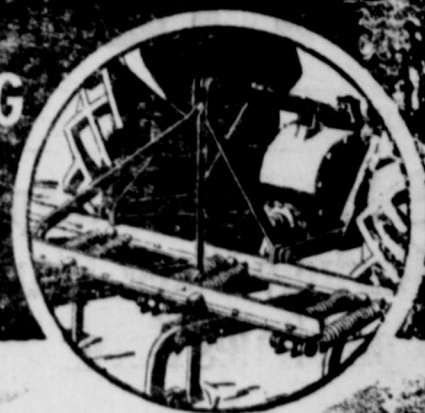

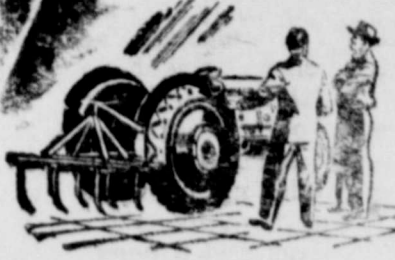

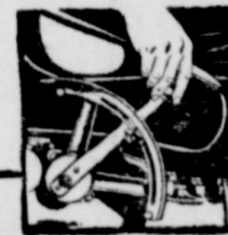

## FARMERS ORGANIZE COOP. ASSOCIATION

At a mass meeting, held at the court house, Wednesday, September 15, farmers and ranchers of Coke county organized a cooperative for the purpose of handling feeds and other farm and ranch supplies. The new organization will be known as Coke County Cooperative Association.

This cooperative will be chartered under the laws of Texas governing coops. Each member will have one vote and common and preferred stock will be issued at \$1.00 per share. Any farmer or rancher is eligible for membership.

It has been shown that farmers and ranchers banding themselves together can exert more power in obtaining supplies than each one acting singly. However, membership in the coop does not prohibit anyone from purchasing his supplies elsewhere. The farmer or rancher will profit according to the amount of business he does with his coop.

There are many advantages to be gained from a cooperative organization of this kind.

## FARMERS KEEP 1943 COTTON RECORD

Farmers are asked to keep record of their 1943 cotton production, and it is highly important that these records be kept accurately, according to R. B. Allen, Chairman of the Coke County AAA Committee.

Mr. Allen explained that in past years, ginners have cooperated with the AAA by furnishing detailed records of cotton production for each farm, but that this year records will not be obtained from ginners, due to the suspension of marketing quotas.

In the past, records of production have served as a basis for determining the yields used in marketing quota program, crop insurance programs and in determining AAA payments.

"It is to a farmer's best interest that an accurate record of his 1943 cotton production be kept because this record may be needed in future AAA programs," Mr. Allen said. He said that each farmer should keep each gin ticket, bale receipt, or for lots of seed cotton sold. The AAA has offered to keep these records for any farmer who wishes to deliver or mail them to the county office.
