Coke's 7th War Loan Drive to be Officially Launched May 14

L. T. Youngblood, Drive Chairman for County, Has Organization Complete; \$15,000 of Series "E" Bonds Already Sold

If "a good start" omens anything, the 7th War Loan Drive in Coke county, is scheduled to reach its goal in a prompt and good way.

The drive throughout the nation is set to start officially Monday morning, May 14, and will continue for 6 weeks, closing Saturday night, June 30.

L. T. Youngblood, president of the First National Bank, has been made county chairman for the drive. Mr. Youngblood has been busy perfecting his organization for the drive.

The personnel of the working organization is as follows:

T. A. Richardson, Vice-Chairman and Chairman of West side of county; Bruce Cliff, McNeil Wylie, Marvin Simpson, Otto Wojtek, Vera Martin, J. T. Harmon, Collins Savner, Ben Brooks, C. E. Arrott, Carrie G. Williams, Jeff Dean, Frank Keeney, J. M. Rippetoe, S. C. Savner will be chairman of the south side of the county.

All bonds sold since April 9 will apply on the county's quota which is \$60,000 of the Series "E" bonds, as The Enterprise understands it. Already \$15,000 of bonds have been sold which will apply on the county's quota, leaving, as is seen, only \$45,000 at this time of this Series to be sold.

"We have never failed," said Mr. Youngblood, "and we must not fail now—and if everyone who can and should buy bonds, will buy as they should, we will make our quota. I sincerely get the cooperation of each and all to make the drive successful and that as quickly as possible."

Bronte Cemetery Buys Adjoining Tract of Land

The committee in charge of Bronte's cemetery has bought an adjoining tract of six acres of land, lying just north of the cemetery.

Frank Keeney, discussing the matter with The Enterprise editor stated that the land is not needed now—"but," said Mr. Keeney, "the time is coming when it will be needed and the committee thought it advisable to buy at this time, while now it is available. We are so hedged in that the tract is about the only available land for cemetery purposes, lying next to our cemetery."

The committee charged with the affairs of the cemetery as to its upkeep and management states that the cemetery dues are \$2.00 a year per family. Dues have not been paid for some time, but the committee now insists that all pay their dues—for, the money is very much needed for the fund with which to buy the tract that has just been purchased by the committee. The committee also solicits donations to the fund for the purchase of the tract of land just bought. If you are interested and can make a donation to this fund the committee will very much appreciate it.

FARM GASOLINE

The farmer who needs gaso-
line to operate a tractor, or
other piece of farm machinery
or equipment may apply this
season as last, to his War Price
and Ration Board, for his off-
highway ration.

He estimates the amount of
gasoline he will need for the
next six months, and the Board
issues him the approved amounts
in two instalments of 'E' and 'B' coupons. The first
instalment amounts to 70 per
cent of the total. The remain-
ing 30 per cent is issued if and
when needed.

This year farmers, and other
users of off-highway gasoline,
will be asked to keep a delivery
record, on which the supplier
will enter all purchases made
with 'E' and 'R' coupons. Begin-
ning May first the delivery rec-
ord form will be issued by the
Boards to non-highway users
with their ration coupons.

A year ago the civilian supply
was in serious danger. Now,
such such steps as coupon en-
dorsement, scientific tests at
verification centers, inventory
deductions from dealers who
have turned in stolen or coun-
terfeit coupons, are helping to
plug black market leaks. The
