

and 58 per cent of those are Mestizos. It is estimated that Panama has about 175 Germans and 1,000 citizens of German descent, plus 600 Italians and 400 Japanese. Its official language is Spanish.

In 1942 Panama had 230,000 acres under cultivation, and was growing rice, corn, coffee, sugar, tobacco, beans, and tropical fruits. Cattle raising is also important, and the Government is encouraging the raisng of beef and dairy cattle

It was just before Pearl Harbor, or on October 9, 1941, that President Arnulfo Arias was replaced by Ricardo Adolfo de la Guardia. Arias (who recently figured in this revolt) had made far-reaching reforms which generally were considered totalitarian in character, and had arranged for a new Constitution. When he left Panama to visit in Havana, Cuba, without securing permission, his place was declared vacant and de la Guardia then assumed office.

Arias later went to Argentina, and did not return until about two months ago. In the meantime, de la Guardia left office last spring and was replaced by Enrique Jimenez as President. When Arias did return, he sought to gain power once more, only to be defeated in his attempts.

Thus you have a deposed President trying a revolt to regain power, but this effort has failed.


