Steers Beat Bronte 14-0 Friday Night

The first night football game in Bronte saw the Robert Lee Steers trounce the Bronte Longhorns, 14 to 0, here Friday night in a non-conference game.

The Steers showed their power in the first period of play when Bill Blair blocked a Bronte punt only ten yards from the pay dirt. Royce Smith carried

the ball off left tackle for the first counter made by the Steers. The extra point was made by Frank Percifull, who went around left end to make the score 7-0.

Blair starred again in the fourth quarter when he intercepted a Longhorn pass, and galloped 32 yards for the second Robert Lee touchdown. The try for the extra point was called back and Robert Lee was penalized for being off sides. However, on the second try, Smith tossed a pass to Joe Thetford for the point, making the score stand at 14-0.

Bronte's most serious threat came in the third quarter when Wayne Arrott completed a pass from Charles Westbrook and gained quite a bit of yardage. Bronte's passing was going good again in the fourth period when Percifull intercepted for the Robert Lee eleven.

Bronte's team will rest next weekend, but Friday, October 15, the Longhorns will tangle with a team of Eldorado High at Eldorado. Next home game will be October 22 when Roby invades local territory.

PAUL GOOD NOW COLLECTING TAXES

Sheriff Paul Good was in The Enterprise office Monday morning and announced that he is now collecting state and county taxes for the coming year.

The sheriff said that he wished to remind taxpayers that if they pay their taxes early they will get a discount. Those who pay in October will be entitled to a three per cent discount; those paying in November will be allowed to deduct two per cent, and those who pay in December will be discounted one per cent.

Good also asked that taxpayers be reminded that their statement this year does not include poll taxes. He explained that he has recently received a ruling from Austin which prevents poll taxes being listed on the statements. He suggested that when taxpayers pay their state and county taxes that they be sure to ask about payment of poll tax. In past years this tax has been listed on the total amount due, and the sheriff said that he would hate for anyone to lose their right to vote because of an oversight of this kind.

District Court To Convene On October 11 At Robert Lee

Court for the 51st Judicial District of Texas will convene at Robert Lee Monday, October 11, with Judge J. F. Sutton presiding.

State Approves Bridge Building On Sterling Road

Texas Highway Department officials approved seven bridges in Coke county on the Robert Lee - Sterling City road, in a meeting at Austin Saturday. Included among the approved structures were one 125-foot bridge and two 100-foot bridges. This is another step in the completion of Farm Highway 387, which will connect Bronte and Robert Lee with towns west of here without making the long run around by San Angelo.

The first 12 miles of paving on the highway east of Sterling has been completed up to a mile west of the Coke county line. The paving on the second stretch of 13 miles has not been contracted but it is believed by highway department officials that it will be completed by the time the bridges are finished.

The east end of the segment from the 13-mile stretch on into Robert Lee is still unauthorized, but local officials believe that it will be approved in the near future.

New Street Lights To Be Erected By West Texas Utilities

A contract was signed Friday night, October 1, between the City of Bronte and the West Texas Utilities Company for the erection of 20 new street and alley lights in the city by the utilities company. Mayor H. O. Whitt announced that all the members of the city council were present for the meeting and agreed to the contract by unanimous consent. West Texas Utilities was represented by Local Manager H. A. Springer and District Manager W. O. Wallace of Ballinger.

Five new lights will be installed on the main street of Bronte in the first two blocks west of Highway 270. Eight lights will be erected on the U. S. Highway from the block containing the post office and First National Bank down through the block where Karen-Gay Hospital is located. Two lights in each of the alleys behind buildings on Main Street and three lights on Church Street will be installed.

The lights on Main Street, three of which will be in the main business block, and two of which will be in the block where the new Texas Theatre is located, will be mounted on poles 26 feet high and will be attached to a 6-foot bracket. One of the new lights on Church Street will be located on the corner by the South Texas Lumber Company, and one will be in front of each of the two churches on that street.

New lights on the highway will be spaced a block apart and will be of the white-way type. The new lights in the alleys will simply be a replacement of any needed parts on the present lights.

West Texas Utilities has agreed to remove the present lights in the center of Main Street and erect the new system for the privilege of furnishing the city with electricity. Mayor Whitt said, "This improvement is free of charge to the city, except for an increase of \$12.05 per month for the added electricity which will be used," the mayor said.

The city council also voted to accept payment of the two per cent gross receipts tax paid by the utilities company once each month. The city has been collecting this tax on a yearly basis, but it was decided that monthly collections for use in paying the electricity charged to the city would be preferable to the method now being used, Whitt pointed out.

The utilities company pays this tax for the privilege of using city property for the placement of poles and other equipment.

Work on the project is expected to start immediately and the system should be completed December 1. This improvement will add immeasurably to the attractiveness of Bronte, as well as to remove the traffic hazards caused by the lights in the center of the main street. The city council as well as the West Texas Utilities Company is to be commended on this fine work.

Bob Davis Resigns As Coke Co. Judge



R. L. (Bob) Davis announced Wednesday that he has turned in his resignation as county judge of Coke county, effective October 15, to the commissioners court. The court will meet in Robert Lee Monday, and will probably act on the resignation.

Davis announced that he is resigning to assume a position as city secretary at Pecos. He is a former resident of Pecos and attended public schools there.

Judge Davis has been very active in civic affairs and has served as an official in the Robert Lee Jaycees, American Legion, WOW and has participated in Boy Scout work and Masonic work.

Davis was serving on his first term as county judge and his term would have expired January 1. He succeeded McNeil Wylie for the office and would have relinquished the office to Jeff Dean, who won the office from him in the July primaries.

During his term of office, Davis is credited with the remodeling of the county courthouse, the building of a five-office courthouse annex and initiating a new bookkeeping system for the county. Just recently, he and the commissioners court voted to issue time warrants to build a Coke county hospital at Robert Lee. The vote in the commissioners court was tied and Davis cast the deciding vote for the hospital.

He is a veteran of World War II and served on a minesweeper in the Pacific with the U. S. Navy. He has served as secretary of the Texas Ex-officio Superintendents' association.

Mr. and Mrs. Davis and small son will move to Pecos soon.

V. D. PRICE CALLED AS BAPTIST PASTOR

Engineers Surveying Percifull Lease Prior To Locating First Offset

Corporation engineers of the American Republic Company were on the Jess Percifull place Thursday surveying the lease prior to staking the location for that company's No. 1 Percifull well, an offset to the Hickok & Reynolds and Dan Auld No. 1 E. C. Rawlings.

It was also reported that the American Republic Corporation is negotiating with George Callahan of Abilene to do the drilling, although at press time Thursday no contract had been let.

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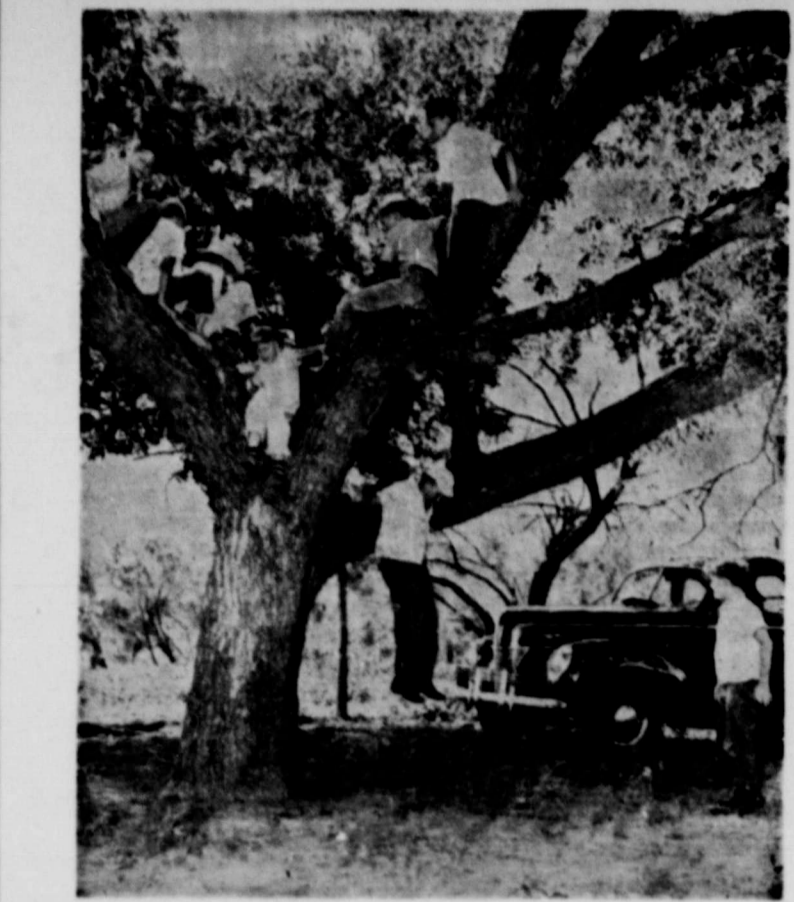
