BRONTE'S NEW LIGHTS BURN WEDNESDAY NIGHT

Miss Ella Clyde Black and Mrs. Joe Bronte's new street lights burned for the first time Wednesday night. Dec. 3: Mrs. Sam Fowler dismissed. Work on the project was completed Wednesday with the removal of the Dec. 4: Mac Mathis, Douglas Baxold street lights in the center of Main street.

The new lights were put up by the West Texas Utilities company. They consist of five lights on Main street, eight lights on Highway 277 and two lights in each of the alleys behind the stores on Main street, and three lights on Church street. The utilities company erected the lights in return for the opportunity to furnish the city with electricity.

The lights are on 26-foot poles and are attached to 6-foot brackets on top of the poles. Removal of the old lights removes the traffic hazard they caused, and the new lights add a great deal to the appearance of Bronte at night.







The crop can be handled one of two ways the second year. First it can be grazed until sometime in June. We need to know right away who ants to buy and how much. If normal rainfall is available, it will make a good seed crop by late summer. Second it can be grazed on until early fall, Colvin points out.

To get the best results from Madrid sweet clover, land owners are urged to innoculate the seed with culture A. The innoculant is Nitrogen-fixing bacand Dad. More than 100 4-H boys teria that is placed on the seed and planted into the soil with the seed. The bacteria forms nodules which add girls' game and two boys' games. the girls supply the pies for a good nitrogen to the soil and is immediately available to the small seedlings during adverse weather.


