Lone Star Gas Co. Propositions City Officials on Piping Bronte

Mayor H. O. Whitt announced Wednesday that the Lone Star Gas Co. has offered to pipe the City of Bronte with natural gas if certain conditions can be met.

Whitt said that the company will have to secure 150 potential users who will put up a \$10 meter deposit before the company will pipe the town. Lone Star charges this deposit for all new users on their lines.

BRONTE TAKES 8 FIRST PLACES IN DISTRICT 18-B LEAGUE MEET

Bronte school students copped eight first places in the District 18-B Interscholastic League meet held last Friday at San Angelo College. Four blue ribbons were taken in literary events and four in athletics. Three hundred and fifty contenders participated in the contests. Bronte's winners made a total of 61 points in the literary events.

Robert Lee made the highest number of points at the track meet, but Earl Rusk was high point individual of the day. He made fifteen and one-half points and set a new record in the high hurdles with 15 seconds flat.

Bronte winners in the literary meet and their placings are as follows: elementary girl's declamation, Mary Ann Grey, second; elementary boy's declamation, Don Glenn, first; sub-junior girl's declamation, Carolyn Kemp, second; sub-junior boys declamation, Gene Walker, first; high school ready writing, Marian Griffith, first; grade school ready writing, Peggy Griffith, third.

Gwendolyn Earnest and Doyle Adair tied the Mertzson contenders for second place in the spelling contest. Willie Mae Cole and Carolyn Nardell won first place in the debating contest. In the numbers sense contest, Eddie Roe Alexander won

Whitt said the gas company officials told him the \$10 deposit will be refunded to local people if the deal falls through. Furthermore, he said, it will be refunded at the end of one year, with six per cent interest, after Bronte residents start using gas.

Whitt said the minimum charge of the company will be \$1.40 a month. The gas company will run a pipe line up to each property line and the only expense to customers will be the running of the line on up to the house which is to be furnished with gas. Lone Star officials said the company would change any gas appliances from butane over to natural gas free of charge.

1560 Car Licenses Issued in County

Sheriff Paul Good said Wednesday that he has issued 1560 license plates to date for the year 1950. Of this number, 1150 were for passenger cars, 290 were for farm vehicles and 120 were for commercial vehicles.

The sheriff said that this brought approximately \$25,000 into the county treasury. This money derived from the sale of the plates goes into the road and bridge fund.

This number is about the same as for vehicles registered in 1949, Good said.

184 Vote Cast In Trustee Election

The heaviest vote in years in a school election was recorded Saturday when six members of the present school board were returned to their posts and one new member was elected to the board. One hundred and eighty-four votes were cast at the election held in the Bronte city hall.

School board members who were reelected were Mack Powell, W. W. Millikin, Cecil Kemp, D. K. Glenn, W. H. Maxwell, Jr., and Jesse Parker. Sid Evans was elected the seventh member of the board.

Others on the ticket were C. L. Brown, Cullen Luttrell, Aubrey Denman, Clifford Clark, Charlie Boecking, James Lee, Noel Perci-full, R. T. Caperton, Bill Wrinke, Bon Spoons, John Coalson and R. H. Sims.

Vote on those elected was: Parker, 116; Glenn, 111; Powell, 103; Maxwell, 98; Kemp, 89; Millikin, 89; and Evans, 77.

4 Rawlings Completed; Locations N.E. of Bronte

Completion was expected Thursday for the Hickok & Reynolds No. 4 E. C. Rawlings. Good recovery was reported on a drillstem test run earlier this week. On the test the tool was open only ten minutes and observers believed the well would have flowed if the tool had remained open awhile longer. This well is a twin well to the No. 1 Rawlings, Bronte Field opener.

Humble No. 1-B J. L. Brunson was drilling Wednesday at 3,420 feet in lime and shale. It is located 510 feet from the north and 600 feet from the west lines of the 120 acre lease in section 5, C&MRR survey.

Three new locations were staked recently in the Fort Chadbourne field. E. A. Poe of Abilene has scheduled two 5,600 foot wells. Both have an elevation of 1,972 feet. Poe-Murray No. 3 Odom Estate will be 330 feet from northeast and northwest lines of a 244.98 acre lease in sec-

tion 287, G. Carroll survey, approximately 1,150 feet northeast of the same operator's Poe-Murray No. 1 Odom, a producer.

Poe-Murray No. 4 Odom Estate will be 330 feet from northeast, 1,716.8 feet from northwest line of the same tract as the No. 3 Poe-Murray-Odom venture.

A few scattered written votes were cast also.

C. Compton survey. This well will be a north offset to Hiawatha and Plymouth No. 1 Tad Richards which extended the field one and one quarter miles southwest from Humble No. 1-C Odom.

Hiawatha and Plymouth No. 2 Tad Richards was drilling below 2,326 feet in lime and shale.

Southern Mineral and Seaboard No. 1 Mrs. Mary Greenland, wildcat two and one half miles southeast of the same operator's No. 1 Reed, Ellenburger producer, was drilling at 3,360 feet in lime early this week.

Dorsey Hardeman Seeks Reelection As State Senator



SENATOR HARDEMAN

Dorsey B. Hardeman of San Angelo has announced for re-election as Senator for the 25th District.

Hardeman was first elected Senator in 1946 following his return from three and one-half years spent in military service.

Senator and Mrs. Hardeman reside in San Angelo with their two young sons, Mark and Bryan.

Hardeman is engaged in the practice of law with Judge Carl Runge under the firm name of Runge & Hardeman. The firm maintains offices in the McBurnett Building, San Angelo.

Senator Hardeman served as Mayor of San Angelo for two years and was then elected State Representative without an opponent. He was re-elected in 1940 and again in 1942 to the House of Representatives. Hardeman resigned from the Legislature and enlisted as a private in the Army. After several months enlisted service he was sent to Officer Candidate School and received a commission in the Judge Advocate General's Department. He was honorably discharged as a Captain in February, 1946.

In the Senate, Hardeman is considered a leader for constitutional government. He is a member of the powerful Finance and State Affairs Committee and is Chairman of the Constitutional Amendments Committee and Vice-Chairman of Civil Jurisprudence Committee. Hardeman also held membership in several other standing Senate committees.

In addition, Senator Hardeman is a member of the powerful Senate General Investigating Committee and also is a member of the Legislative Budget Committee.

Mr. Hardeman said that he expected to make an active campaign in an effort to visit with as many citizens

32 Foot Airborne Boats Undergo Tests By Army

If experiments now being conducted with a 32 foot aluminum cargo launch work out as expected, the Army's Transportation Corps Board will be able to transport a sea going cargo fleet to any place in the world in a matter of hours. Although planned for use as a workaday freight craft, availability of such a fleet for the evacuation of Dunkirk would have greatly simplified that operation and saved many lives.

The problem of portability was solved by building the experimental craft in three sections which can be connected in a matter of minutes by use of but eight bolts. All three sections fit snugly in a Fairchild "Flying Box Car."

The boat, of all-aluminum, aircraft construction, weighs 3,036 pounds empty and will make better than 10 miles an hour lightly loaded. With a useful load of 5,000 pounds aboard, it draws but 24 inches of water and the up-swept reinforced bow permits beaching under its own power.

Designed particularly for cold weather use, canvas canopies over rear and center cockpits offer protection to crew and cargo. A 60 horse power marine engine provides power.

The rear section, containing the engine and all controls, may be disconnected and used as a marine tractor to propel rafts and barges.

The craft has a beam of 8'6" and height of 4'4". The forward section is nearly flat and two runners facilitate skidding across the ground.

The test craft was built by the Edo Corp., Queens, New York, boat builders. If it stands up under the exhaustive tests, a fleet of air borne boats will eliminate one of the most annoying bottlenecks of World War II operations when on island hopping and other operations, small cargo craft had to run in under their own power or be brought in by larger ships.
