The highway officials said Coke county's program of farm to market Fred Bedford, W. H. Rampy, Floyd County has been extremely fortunate in securing \$713,000 which has been spent in the county during the past six years for farm to market roads. This figure is much more than was spent proportionately in other counties of the area, they said.

The state men also brought out that approximately \$70,000 will be available for Coke County during the coming two year period. In addition to the section of the Bronte-Winters highway, the officials recommended that the two miles of road from the highway up through Silver be paved. They estimated these two projects will cost about \$55,000, leaving \$15,-000. It was recommended that this ioney be used to replace two weak oridges between Robert Lee and San Angelo.

If the Coke County section of the Bronte-Winters road is built, Coke County will have to supply the right of way and fencing. Judge Dean said that county officials are hopeful they can obtain the right of way at a reasonable cost, so this matter will not stand in the way of building the road if it is approved by the state.

Judge Dean also said it is unlikely hat the Runnels County section of the road will be built during the coming two year periol, but that officials feel if the Coke County part of the road is completed, it will speed up completion of the Runnels County






