## LONGHORNS PUT UP FIERY FIGHT BUT LOSE TO HERMLEIGH TEAM

The fiery Bronte Longhorns of Coach Jack Price, put up a terrific battle before bowing out to the big and powerful Hermleigh Cardinals, 19-7.

The title-bound (if Stanton doesn't slow them down) Cardinals had a 21 pound per man weight advantage over the Longhorns.

Bronte could not go after taking the kickoff, and were forced to punt. Hermleigh was quick to cross the Longhorns' goal. Dickie Wall skirted his own right end for 30 yards and a touchdown. The half ended with Bronte trailing, 6-0.

Gerald Sandusky was the talk of the town all through the game. Besides his powerful running, he got off some good punts, made unbelievable pass catches and was a terror on defense. Billy Paul Thomason, J. Lee Ensor and Marlin McCutchen were the other defensive standouts.

Hermleigh's Dickie Wall smashed over from the one foot line in the third quarter to give the Cards a 12-0 lead. In the fourth stanza, Doyle Newman skirted his own left end for nine yards and a touchdown. Billy Hudnell plunged over for the extra point to give Hermleigh a 19-0 advantage.

Hermleigh kicked to Bronte and the ball came to rest on the Longhorn 26. McCutchen hit for 3 to the 29, then passed to J. Lee Ensor who

made a beautiful catch and ran to the 49. Sandusky picked up 6 to the Cards' 45, then made an astounding catch of a pass manufactured by McCutchen, on the 22 and bulled his way to the 19. From there he carried to the 18, then to the 13, crashed to the 9 for a first down. Then he went to the 2, picked up a yard and a half to the half-yard line, then climbed off right tackle for a score. McCutchen plunged over for the point and all the scoring was over, Hermleigh 19, Bronte 7.

Top defensive play of the game was a bone-chilling, low driving tackle laid on Mr. Billy Hudnell by one J. Lee Ensor, defensive left half.

## SCS OFFICIAL GIVES SUGGESTIONS FOR INCREASING COTTON ACRES

Louis P. Merrill, regional head of the Soil Conservation Service, has some timely suggestions for farmers who are considering expansion of their cotton acreage in 1951. Merrill fears that some farmers, with the lifting of government cotton restrictions, may undo much of the good conservation work they have accomplished unless they choose their cotton land wisely and take steps to protect it.

Here are Merrill's suggestions for the farmer planning to increase his cotton acreage:

1. Put cotton only on land that is suited to cotton. Cotton land should be productive enough for a profitable yield and not easily eroded.

2. Keep cotton off land where cotton root rot is common.

3. Think it over before plowing up good stands of grass. Farmers often get more from grass than from cotton, especially when they make full use of opportunities for grazing and seed harvesting.

In most areas, information on land suited to cotton is available, Merrill said. Landowners can make use of the help that soil conservation districts can give them in deciding what land can produce cotton profitably and without damage. In the plains areas of Texas and Oklahoma, nearly 5,000,000 acres of land now being cultivated are top shallow or unstable for cotton, a crop offering almost no resistance to the forces of erosion.

Legumes and other winter cover, planted immediately, would be worked into the soil next spring. These crops improve the soil, protect it against erosion during a danger peri-

od and offer winter grazing in addition to increasing the yields of the cotton crop that follows, Merrill said.

It is seldom wise to follow cotton with another crop of cotton, Merrill pointed out. However, when it is done, a legume cover between crops of cotton will help to control erosion, increase productivity and reduce cotton root rot.

Farmers have been getting more grass conscious in recent years, the regional director said. More than 250,000 acres have been put in native grasses along in Oklahoma and Texas during the last two years and still additional acreage in introduced grasses. On nearly all of this land grass for livestock is the safest and the most profitable use, and to plow up such plantings with the questionable prospect of a high cotton yield would be poor business, Merrill added.

Several grasses fit in well with rotations that include cotton, Merrill said. Some of these grasses are blue panicum, weeping and sand lovegrass and King ranch bluestem.

Merrill also urged that farmers keep in mind the other practices that are useful in conservation farming. Planting cotton in alternate strips with tall-growing crops such as grain sorghums is essential in helping to control wind erosion in sandy lands. Stubble mulching, contour cultivation and terracing help conserve moisture and prevent erosion.

Soil conservation districts can help farmers needing assistance in making decisions on what lands to plant to cotton and how to use these lands to best advantage, Merrill concluded.

## W. H. RAMPY TELLS LIONS CLUB OF RISE IN COST OF GOVERNMENT

State Representative W. H. Rampy of Winters told members of the Bronte Lions Club Wednesday that the people in the State of Texas cannot have increased services from their state government without paying the bill.

Rampy said that about \$1,000,000 was lost to the state when the people voted out the ad valorem tax last year. He pointed out that some source of addition tax money has to be raised to take care of this loss as well as the increased costs.

The representative said some legislators have mentioned a gross receipts tax and state income tax, but that, at the present time, he is opposed these two methods of increasing state revenue. He said he looked with more favor upon a natural resources tax if it can be worked out equitably.

Rampy stressed the fact that costs of government are on the rise and that increased taxes of some kind is the only way the legislators have of meeting these costs.

He also brought out the fact that a re-districting of the state will be necessary when the legislature meets next year. This district, composed of

Coke, Runnels and Concho counties, will have to add territory, as its population is not now sufficient to comprise a representative district. Representative Rampy said he would like counsel and advice of people over the district in determining what county should be added.

Mayor Jackson of Winters accompanied Rampy to Bronte.

## \$291,144.25 Is Collected By Paul Good to Nov. 1

Sheriff and Tax Assessor-Collector Paul Good said this week that up to November 1, \$291,144.25 in taxes had been collected by his office.

This sum is the major part of all the

taxes coming in to the collector's office. Total figure which was assessed county taxpayers was \$329,722.38. Of the amount collected, \$107,680.50 was county ad valorem tax, which

will be used to operate the county government during the next year. School taxes collected by Good amounted to \$110,199.78. Total collected for the state was \$73,263.97.

Of the \$110,199.78 school taxes, \$80,000.00 goes to the Silver district. There are five other common school districts in the county from which taxes are collected. Both Bronte and Robert Lee are independent school districts and collect their own taxes.

The Upper Colorado River authority receives \$27,559.47 of the state tax money to use in its program of improving the water resources of this section.

With only \$38,578.13 in taxes left to collect, Good said that he was very well pleased with the way Coke County people had come in and taken care of their tax obligations early in the paying period.

## Union 5-B McCutchen Flows Heavily On Test

Oil news in this area during the past week or so has centered west of Bronte where a producer has been completed in the McCutchen Field.

Union No. 5-B Daisy McCutchen has been completed after flowing at the rate of 40 barrels per hour from 3,980 to 3,995 feet. On the test mud surfaced in 13 minutes and oil started flowing in 14 minutes. Gas had shown at the surface in two and one-half minutes. There was no water. The No. 5-B McCutchen is an east offset to the No. 1-B McCutchen, the field opener.

Open flowing bottomhole pressure was 1,120 pounds, shutin pressure after 15 minutes was 1,540 pounds.

On another drillstem test from 3,995 to 4,005 feet, gas came to the surface in eight minutes and recovery was 360 feet of slightly oil and gas cut mud, 1,787 feet of clean oil and 120 feet of oil and gas cut mud.

Another interesting development in the Coke County oil picture was the staking of Union No. 1 City of Robert Lee. It is located one and one-quarter miles southeast of Robert Lee on one of the town's water reservoirs and will be 330 feet from the south and east lines of section 1, J. W. Hall survey, abstract 1342.

The No. 1 City of Robert Lee will be three miles southwest of Union No. 1-B McCutchen and two miles southwest of No. 1 Jim McCutchen, a failure.

Five miles east of Bronte, J. W. King, Jr., and DeSoto Oil Co. No. 1 Brookshier Estate has been plugged and abandoned at 5,452 feet. The wildcard was located in Runnels County.

Humble No. 1 E. H. Schuch, wildcard southwest of Bronte near the Tom Green County line was continuing to test this week. It was a failure in the

Ellenburger and was plugged back to the Pennsylvania. Some oil has been recovered in tests in this section.

In the Fort Chadbourne Field, located northeast of Bronte, Humble No. 13 Sallie Odum has been completed for a daily flow of 336.43 barrels of 45.2 gravity oil, plus .9 per cent water. Gas-oil ratio was 773-1. The well flowed from open hole between 5,424 and 5,445 feet. The section was treated with 2,000 gallons of acid.

Burdell Oil Co. No. 2 Z. Sowell was completed for a 24-hour flow of 118.80 barrels of 45 gravity oil. Gas-oil ratio was 700-1. The well is located about twelve miles northeast of Bronte.

Fred Manning No. 14 S. L. McNay flowed 120 barrels of 49 gravity oil in 24 hours. Gas-oil ratio was 800-1. The well was acidized with 5,000 gallons.

## COKE COUNTY WILDLIFE GROUP MEETS WITH SILVER RANCHMAN

The Coke County Game Management Association met on the C. E. Mathers ranch, near Silver, Tuesday. E. H. Schuch was elected president, Gerald Allen vice-president and Jeff Dean was retained as secretary-treasurer. The semi-annual affair was made up of barbecue supper and a program.

Schuch succeeds Harry Weaver, rancher and architect, as president of the association.

County Agent Travis Hicks exhibited a map showing that 238,000 acres of Coke farm and ranch land are now included in the agency which promotes development and conservation of land and wildlife and control of predatory animals.

The predatory animals, particularly the influx of bobcats which have been killing large numbers of sheep and goats the last few years, were the target of the day.

Judge Dean said that the government trapper moved over from Sterling county during the warm months and caught 10 bobcats as well as scores of foxes, coons and lesser predators.

The livestock and poultry growers in the group looked with favor on legislation or tariff moves that could keep out cheap Russian and other foreign furs and raise the price of domestic pelts, thus increasing the trapping pressure to what it was a few years ago.

The association's predator control fund was shown by Deanto be in need of financial help and a committee of five was assigned the ways and means task. J. R. (Bob) Mims, who ranches near Water Valley, was a

speaker, recounting the changes in West Texas geography, economy and wildlife during the 67 years he has been around.

C. N. Webb, James Arrott and Jack Corley of Tennyson invited the association to hold its spring barbecue with them. Members accepted the invitation.

Guests were present at the barbecue from Bronte, Tennyson, Blackwell, Robert Lee, Water Valley, Edith, Silver, Sanco, Colorado City, Winters, Alpine and San Angelo.

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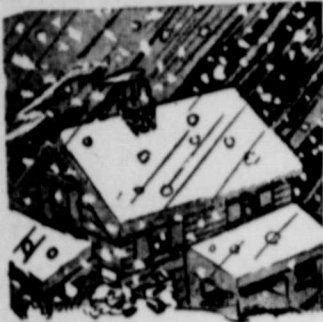
