# Our Washington Newsletter

Crop Insurance is proving successul as a result of an experimental program begun three years ago. Before then an insurance program applied to cotton and wheat turned out to be too expensive and Congress ordered it dropped.

The experimental plan which followed has been closely watched to see if such a program, carefully supervised and operated, could be actu-

Last year the reports of the previ ous year's experiment looked good. More counties were added to further test the plan. The Federal Crop Insurance Corporation has recently announced that a net profit was made during the past year, as was true the year before.


Today, the insurance experiments are applied to cotton, wheat flax, beans, corn, and to multiple coverage of all crops produced on a farm. New rops are added each year.

It may be a bit early to become too optimistic, but every indication points to a permanent, actuarily sound, crop insurance program, within reach of the average farmer who desires to insure his crop against the hazards of drouth, grasshoppers, insects, flood, hail, and other uncertainties that plague the average producer.




