## Local Teachers Elected To Serve Another Year

J. L. Carroll, present superintendent of the Bronte schools, was re-elected and his contract extended one year at a meeting of the board of trustees last week. Carroll's term,

which still had a year to go, will run through the 1952-53 school year. All of the Bronte teachers were re-elected for another year at the meeting. A spokesman said they were re-

-elected provided that they can meet any change in requirements by the state board of education. In case the standards for teachers are raised, the teachers are expected to meet the requirements in order to teach next year.

Re-elected to teach in grammar school were Mrs. Vetal Flores, Mrs. George Thomas, Mrs. George Anderson, Mrs. Lore Phillips, Mrs. Chet Holcombe and Miss Betty Sanderson. Departmental, junior high and high school teachers re-elected were: Vershal Smith, English, history and band; Mrs. J. T. Henry, commercial subjects; Gordon Greel, science; Frank Miller, math; McAfee Daniel, English; Mrs. Royce Fancher, home making; J. T. Henry, vocational agriculture; Jack Price, grade school principal; W. H. Gaddy, high school principal; and J. L. Carroll, superintendent.

Some trouble is being encountered establishing the county line boundary between Coke and Runnels counties in the oil fields north of Bronte. Some of the producers in that area are being claimed by both counties and surveyors are not agreed on the exact boundary locations.

Mrs. Wornock Hipp, W. W. Millikin and J. T. Henry composed the nominating committee. The new officers will be installed at the next meeting of the organization on Tuesday night, April 10.

## COKE COUNTY'S VALUATION NEAR \$15 MILLION MARK FOR THIS YEAR

It was announced this week that the tax valuation of property in Coke county will approach the \$15 million dollar mark this year. At this rate, the valuation is increasing about \$3 million per year.

Frank Eudy, representative of Thos. Y. Pickett & Co., evaluation engineers of Fort Worth, presented the figures to the commissioners court Monday.

The Fort Worth firm showed an estimated increase of \$2,400,000 on oil properties in the county, due to the completions of 53 wells during the past year. The 1950 total taxing valuation was \$12,358,940, and in 1949 was a little more than \$9 million. The oil industry in the county furnishes about two-thirds of the taxes.

## Road Funds Still Go to Counties

With the Graham Bill doomed to failure, county road funds will likely continue to accrue and be apportioned to counties as has been done in the past.

The bill, which raised much opposition from county officials, was referred Monday by the House of Representatives to the Agriculture committee, where it is presumed it will die. No further opposition to the distribution of the surplus funds is expected.

These monies come to the counties for road building and repair from gasoline taxes. Half of the amount in the fund is used to retire old county and local road debts and the other half is placed at the disposal of the county judge and the county commissioners for road work.

Recent figures released by the Board of County and District Road Judges, charged with administering the fund in Austin, show that Coke county has spent \$3,559.88 in retiring old bonds and that \$11,109.70 is available to this county, a total of \$14,669.64.

County Judge Jeff Dean and Commissioners Otis Smith, Claude Ditmore and T. R. Harmon recently went to Austin, along with hundreds of other county officials from over the state, to state opposition to the Graham bill which would have taken the money away from the counties and turned it over to the State Highway department. Dean made another trip to Austin this week for the Monday hearing.

## NEW TWO WAY RADIO PURCHASED FOR USE OF SHERIFF PAUL GOOD

After their meeting Monday morning, Coke County Commissioners Otis Smith, Claude Ditmore, T. R. Harmon and J. W. Service, along with Sheriff Paul Good, went to San Angelo and purchased a two-way radio system for the sheriff's department.

One receiver and speaker will be placed in the sheriff's office at Robert Lee and another one will be placed in the new car which the county recently purchased for Good's use. The new service will be tuned into

the Highway Patrol station in San Angelo. The receiving and sending antenna will be on the water tower on the square.

This will make it possible for Sheriff Good to communicate with his office as well as with other law enforcement agencies any time that he wishes to do so.

The commissioners court decided that the saving in long distance telephone calls would pay for the new apparatus in a short time, in addition to adding much to the efficiency of the law enforcement department of this county.

In their meeting Monday morning the commissioners approved bills for the county and attended to routine business.

The clothes, were found along with the car which she was driving just inside the lane leading from the highway to her father's house.

An unidentified man, driving a truck reported Thursday afternoon that he picked Mrs. Brock up Thursday morning and carried her to Ballinger and that the last time he saw her was about 11 a.m.

Law enforcement officers in this area were searching for her but no trace had been found as The Enterprise went to press.

## TEACHERS ATTEND BROWNWOOD MEET

W. N. Gaddy and J. L. Carroll attended a meeting of the Texas teachers association last Friday in Brownwood at the high school there. Gaddy was a delegate from the Coke County teachers association and Carroll represented the rural administrators. Mrs. Carroll also attended the meeting.

Carroll said that all the teachers from Robert Lee were present at the Brownwood meeting but that all of the Bronte teachers were unable to go due to the fact that the schools are behind with their classes. If school had been dismissed for Bronte teachers to attend, Carroll said, classes would have had to be held on Saturday.

One of the main addresses heard by the teachers was Dr. T. B. Havins, social science teacher at Howard Payne, who spoke on education in the Texas Prison System. He told the schoolmen that most of those in prison ranged from grade school educations to illiterates. Most of them, Havins said, were underprivileged as children, and he charged the schoolmen to help unfortunate children.

Also brought out in the meeting was the fact that since 1945, college freshmen, as a whole, are unprepared to do college work. The educators were urged to make school work more exacting to help correct this situation.

## Two Elections In Early April

### TRUSTEES TO BE ELECTED APR. 7

A trustee election to fill three vacancies on the school board will be held Saturday, April 7. The terms of W. H. Maxwell, Jr., Cecil Kemp and Sid Evans are expiring this year. Persons wishing to run for the places should contact County Judge Jeff Dean at least five days before the election. Or, Supt. J. L. Carroll said that any person's name may be placed on the ballot by a petition of five qualified voters requesting it from the county judge.

The present board has already petitioned that the following names be placed on the ballot: Sid Evans (re-election), Matthew Caperton, J. L. Brunson, Ashby Dezman and Ben Ogledy.

W. W. Millikin, Jesse Parker, Mack Powell, and C. L. Brown are the other members of the board whose terms do not expire this year.

Board members and Supt. Carroll urged that school patrons show some interest in the election and fill the vacancies with qualified men.

### TWO NAMES ON CITY BALLOT

Only two names will appear on the ballots to be used at the city election Tuesday, April 3. Councilmen H. A. Springer and Sam Spruell will be up for reelection to the places they now hold.

March 3 was the deadline for filing for the city council places and nobody seemed to want the job, so the incumbents' names were placed on the ballot.

Spruell said that everybody in town had a chance to get his name on the ticket, and since nobody was interested, he hoped there would be no criticism of the administration during the next two years.

Spaces will be left on the ballots for any write-in candidates for whom voters may care to cast their vote.

Other council members whose terms have not expired are J. B. Mackey, Joe George Wilkins and J. P. McGuire. Mayor H. O. Whitt also has another year to serve.

The election will be held at the city hall.

## \$250 Needed to Fill Quota on East Side

H. A. Springer, county chairman for the American Red Cross, said Wednesday that the drive is lagging a little, with about \$348.35 being collected from the East side of the county. A quota of \$600 has been set for this side of the county.

George Thomas, county fund chairman, urged persons to make their contributions early. Officials of the drive want to wind up their campaign by next Tuesday.

No report from Robert Lee had been received Wednesday. R. S. Young is in charge of the drive on the west side of the county.

### Lions Hear Representative

Miss Melba Turiff, field representative of the American Red Cross, spoke at the noon meeting of the Bronte Lions club Wednesday. Miss Turiff said that the Red Cross is playing a bigger role than ever before — that it has been charged this year with training some 20,000,000 persons in first aid; 300,000 persons in home nursing and about 150,000 nurses aides. These trained personnel will be available in any disaster.

She also stated that, for the first

time, each state will have its own disaster plan and that the Red Cross is the official agency for putting the plans into effect. She said that Texas has one of the first and best disaster plans of any state.

Under the disaster plan, the state is divided into districts, identical with the public safety districts in Texas. Red Cross trained personnel and Red Cross funds are always available to the local units, in case of disaster.

## SGT. FLOYD MURTISHAW ARRIVES IN BRONTE AFTER KOREAN DUTY

Sgt. Floyd Murtishaw arrived in Bronte last Saturday night after serving eight months on the Korean front. He has been in the U. S. Army in the Orient since the outbreak of hostilities there last summer.

In giving an account of his trip home Murtishaw said that he left his outfit on Feb. 26 and traveled by jeep for about 25 miles where he caught a plane headed for the southern part of the Korean peninsula. However the plane was unable to land and had to fly on to Tokyo. Then, he had to fly back to Korea to pick up his orders. Doubling back to Tokyo, he left the Japanese city at 2:55 on March 3 and arrived at Midway at 2:55 on the same day; from there he flew to Honolulu, T. H. and arrived six hours later.

After a 48 hour layover in Honolulu, Murtishaw once again boarded a plane and the next stop was in California. He arrived at Sweetwater about 9:30 p.m. where his family met him.

Murtishaw said that he left his outfit at Yong Dong-Po, Korea, and that everything was "ech-bong" (very good) when he left.

He said his present orders are to report back to the Korean front after his leave is up, but that he was going to try to get some "state side" duty for a change.

He also promised to come by The Enterprise office before his leave is up and give a complete story about his experiences in the Far East.

He is visiting his parents, Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Murtishaw, and other relatives here in Bronte.

**Our Washington Newsletter**

Crop Insurance is proving successful as a result of an experimental program begun three years ago. Before then an insurance program applied to cotton and wheat turned out to be too expensive and Congress ordered it dropped.

The experimental plan which followed has been closely watched to see if such a program, carefully supervised and operated, could be actually sound.

Last year the reports of the previous year's experiment looked good. More counties were added to further test the plan. The Federal Crop Insurance Corporation has recently announced that a net profit was made during the past year, as was true the year before.

Today, the insurance experiments are applied to cotton, wheat, flax, beans, corn, and to multiple coverage of all crops produced on a farm. New crops are added each year.

It may be a bit early to become too optimistic, but every indication points to a permanent, actually sound, crop insurance program, within reach of the average farmer who desires to insure his crop against the hazards of drought, grasshoppers, insects, flood, hail, and other uncertainties that plague the average producer.

In charge of Accounting in the Crop Insurance branch office in Chicago is Wilbur Brown of Richland Springs. Brown came to Washington last week to attend a business meeting and make a report to the top men in the Insurance Agency.

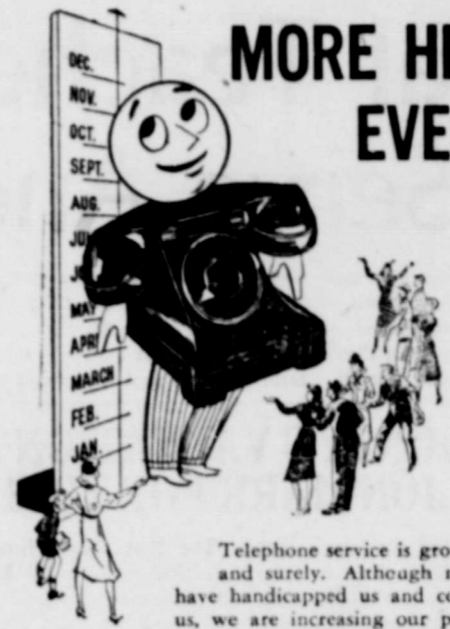

ROAD BEAUTIFUL

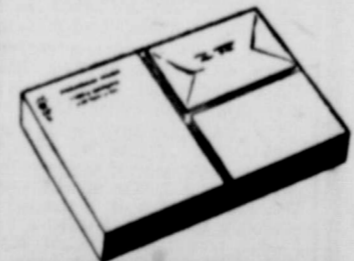
