Chinchilla Growing Is New Industry for Bronte Section

The Sims started out in their venture in August, 1952, when they bought a pair of the beautiful little animals from the Chapman Chinchilla Farm, located at Big Bear Lake, Calif. The original pair cost \$1650.00, but almost \$5,000.00.

The chinchillas are housed in a small corner room of the garage at the Sims place. Their homes are wire cages and the temperature of the room is kept from 68 to 74 degrees. They eat a special pellet food, supplemented by hay and oat straw. Annual feed bill for one of the animals is \$3.50 to \$5.00 per year. They clean themselves in a dust bath which contains an extra As most everyone knows, chin-

Stock Being Built Up

The stock of animals in this country is getting built up now now they have six of the animals to the point that some breeders and figure their herd is worth are planning on pelting a few animals this year, and once again, ladies in the higher income brackets will be able to wear chinchilla coats and capes. However, the supply will continue for several more years to be very limited. Estimated chinchilla population of North America now is 200,000.

Chinchillas are very clean animals, the Sims say, and are very fastidious about taking several baths a day. The animals fine sand known as blue cloud. are monogamous, and after a mate is selected, the pair settle down together for life. Sims said that some mixed breeding has been attempted but it is not successful. Separate housing units are provided for each family.

A litter consists of one to four babies, the average being two. The babies are well developed at birth, having a full set of teeth, open eyes and a full coat of fur. Since chinchillas often breed within 24 hours after the birth of a litter, it is possible to produce three litters a year, but two are more common

Coat Sells For \$70,000

Sims said there are only four or five chinchilla coats in this country at the present time. The newest one reported belongs to Rita Hayworth and was purchased by her ex-husband, Aly Khan, before their divorce for \$70,000. A full length coat requires 125 pelts.

Blue Gold Chinchilla Farm is the name of the Sims establishment. Reginald Chapman, son of the man who introduced the animals to this country, visited them a few weeks ago and re- 25 Year Award ported that their stock is some of the best he has seen anywhere.
