Area Oil Activity Showing Increase

Union Oil Co. has injected new life into the oil picture in this vicinity with their announcement that they will drill five core tests in the area west of here. Four of the tests will be between here and Robert Lee and the fifth one will be southwest of Robert Lee.

Drilling has already begun on E. C. Rawlings in Section 447. It is on the north side of the highway at Seven Mile Hill. Other tests are to be made on Burt Smalley, Jim McCutchen and the Elizabeth McCutchen Estate. The fifth test is to be on the Stroud place southwest of Robert Lee.

2559 Acres Is Coke Wheat Allotment

Recent proclamation of a national wheat marketing quota by Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson means that wheat farmers will soon be called on to decide whether to use controls in marketing their 1954 crops.

Claude K. McCan, Chairman of the State Production and Marketing Administration Committee, reminds farmers that a referendum on the quotas will be held August 14. At least two-thirds of the farmers voting must approve quotas before they can be put in effect.

At issue also is the level at which the government will support the price for the 1954 wheat crop. Legislation directs supports at 90 per cent of parity if quotas are approved. However, if farmers disapprove marketing quotas, the support drops, according to law, to 50 per cent of parity to those farmers who comply with their wheat acreage allotments.

Officials point out that the Secretary had little choice in the matter of issuing the wheat quota proclamation. Legislation directs that such a proclamation be made whenever the total supply of wheat exceeds the normal supply by more than 20 percent. The normal supply consists of estimated domestic consumption plus exports plus a 5 percent reserve.

The supply of wheat this year is now estimated at about 1.760 million bushels, about 370 million more than the quantity at which a national marketing quota proclamation is mandatory.

All wheat farmers who are subject to quotas are eligible to vote in the wheat referendum. A farmer is subject to the quotas generally if the acreage classified as wheat on the farm in 1954 is more than 15 acres, or if the farm has a normal production of 200 or more bushels on the acreage planted for harvest.

Wheat acreage allotments will be in effect for the 1954 crop of wheat. Allotments are not affected by the outcome of the quota referendum.

COKE ALLOTMENTS

J. E. Quisenberry, of the Coke County PMA Tuesday received the county wheat acreage allotments from College Station.

He said the county allotment is 2559 acres for 1954 and said that the allotment represents about 72 percent of the usual number of acres planted here.

Loans Can Be Secured From Government

Special loans have been authorized by Congress to provide assistance for farmers and ranchers in the drought area of the Southwest. The loans will be handled by the FHA, which is headed by Paul Shillingburg of Sweetwater. Shillingburg is in Robert Lee at the agricultural building each Thursday from 10 a. m. to 2:30 p. m. Interested persons may contact him at that time.

Loans in amounts of \$2,500 or more can be secured at five per cent interest for periods up to three years for the purchase of feeds and other operating expenses, and can be renewed under certain conditions. The money so obtained cannot be used to pay debts which the borrower already owes.

Noted World-Wide Evangelist to Hold Revival in Bronte

"Man's Way Out," a color travelogue of the Old World, will be shown at the out-door, under the stars revival meetings at the First Baptist Church. These 16 mm Color-Sound Film are in four different reels and will be shown after the evening messages on Monday and Tuesday, Thursday and Friday nights, August 3 and 4, 6 and 7.

The pictures were taken by Dr. Rudolph Q. Harvey, world-wide evangelist of Waco, Texas, who recently returned from an extended evangelistic preaching crusade in 24 foreign countries.

Dr. Harvey is well-known in East Texas. Reared in Edinburg, he was a building contractor by trade with his father. He held several unusually successful pastorates in Texas during his 16 years as a pastor. As an evangelist now for about 3 years, he has led most successful revival campaigns throughout the state and in 16 other states. He led Navarro Mills, Texas, in the greatest revival in the history of the town. There were 84 conversions, most of whom were grown men and women. More than 220 attended prayer meeting each night. In one service alone there, there were 34 adults who professed faith in the Lord Jesus Christ.

As an independent Baptist evangelist, Dr. Harvey traveled at his own expense, and was welcomed by the people of more than 24 foreign countries he visited. "Especially were they glad to see and assist me when they learned that I was from Texas, he smiled, explaining he wore a broad-brimmed Texas-style hat on his trip.

Evangelist Harvey, eager to learn the feelings toward the United States of the European and other countries where he visited, interviewed people of all classes and station. Evangelist Harvey stated that not only religious leaders, but business men, scientists, people from all walks of life, including our own men in uniform, firmly believe Christianity the only effective effort in fighting communism and freeing people from its grip and, at the same time, leaving a permanent effect.

The City of Bronte has provided a place to dump trash, located southwest of town near the river. Mayor Whitt urges that citizens use the place provided and not be cluttering up other residents' premises.

Jo Dell Walton Ties for Third In Track Meet

Jo Dell Walton of Bronte tied for third place in high jumping in the senior division of the Women's National AAU track meet at San Antonio last weekend. She also finished in a three-way tie for fifth place in the junior division high jumping. Jo Dell received an NAAU medal in both of these divisions.

Duoda McQueen of Lake View placed fifth in the baseball throw and was the only other Bluebonnet entry to place in the big track meet. The meet has entries from all over the U. S.

Jo Dell, who will be a senior in Bronte high school next year, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. S. Walton. Mary Ann Gray was the only other Bronte girl to enter the tourney.

Blondy Cross, of the San Angelo Standard Times, who accompanied the West Texas team, reported in his column that the Bluebonnet girls, competing for the first time, were competing against girls and women who were much more experienced and had been in training over a longer period of time. He felt the girls did extremely well. "Much of the National field of contestants," he wrote, "was composed of feminine athletes who not only train the year around but compete in track and field tourneys the year around." The Bluebonnet girls plan to continue training and to enter the big tournament again next year.

AREA RECEIVED SOME RAIN LAST FRIDAY NIGHT

The area around Bronte received rain last Friday night, even though the town itself got only about 1/2 inch in a hard shower. Water superintendent Otis Smith reported that Oak Creek lake was up about two feet, very close to where it was when Bronte started taking water from it.

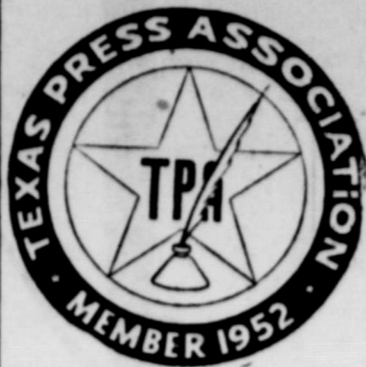
