

## Championship Game Played Here With Robert Lee Tonight

Tonight Bronte's Longhorns will have a chance to win the pennant in District 7-B football. The Longhorns take on their perennial opponents, the Robert Lee Steers, and a win will give them the district flag.

With only three teams in the district, Bronte has defeated Trent, the other team in the conference. Trent, on the other hand, has defeated the Robert Lee outfit. A win by Robert Lee tonight would throw the contest into a three-way tie.

Dopesters say that the Longhorns are favored to take the Steer team, but this game is one that is always difficult to forecast. Bronte won over the Robert Lee team, 28-6, in a non-conference game earlier in the season.

The Longhorns were idle last week and should be in top shape for the game tonight. Game time is 7:30 p. m.

In case of a three way tie in the district, the championship is

to be decided by the records the three schools have against opponents who were in last year's district. It is expected next year that the district will be reshuffled and will be the same as last year, with the exception of Coahoma. Coahoma will play Class A football next year.

## Oil News

M. C. M. Oil Co. et al of Dallas have filed application to drill a 5,700-foot rotary wildcat in eastern Coke County, four miles northeast of Bronte and two miles west of Runnels County line. It will be drilled as the No. 1 J. R. Johnson.

Drilling, on the 320-acre tract, will begin at once. Location is 1,980 feet from the north and west lines of 393-1A-H&TC.

The prospector is 3/4-mile south and slightly east of A. A. Cameron - Edna Butner, wildcat failure abandoned Oct. 5, 1952, at 5,730 feet. The Ellenburger was topped at 5,605 feet on elevation of 1,931 feet.

It is also 3 3/8 miles southeast of the two-well North Bronte (Ellenburger) field.

### TWO EXTENSIONS

Two Coke County field gained extensions recently.

The Wendkirk (Cisco) field was extended 1/4-mile east-southeast with completion of Kewanee Oil Co. 1-B Wend, located in Thos. Hennessy survey 1, six miles southwest of Bronte, for a daily flowing potential of 142-40 barrels of 39.7 gravity oil, no water, with gas-oil ratio of 177-1. This is the field's fourth well.

Production was through a 10-64-inch choke from open hole between 3,673.60-181 feet. Tubing pressure was 300 pounds; casing pressure, 230 pounds. Completion was natural.

Casing (77-inch) was cemented at 3,673.60 feet.

Top of pay was picked at 3,673 feet on elevation of 1,830 feet.

The North Bronte (Ellenburger) field was extended 1/4-mile east with completion of John J. Eisner 1 Spencer, located in 364-1A-H&TC, three miles north of Bronte, for a daily flowing potential of 138 barrels of 49-gravity oil, no water, with gas-oil ratio of 117-1.

Production was through a 16-64-inch choke and perforations between 5,701-14 feet. Tubing pressure was 130 pounds; casing pressure, 90 pounds. Completion was natural.

Top of pay was picked at 5,700 feet on ground elevation of 1,924 feet.

Casing (5 1/2 inch) was cemented at 5,717 feet. Total depth is 5,717 feet.

### CONDOR TSST

Condor Petroleum Co. of Abilene has taken over a Coke County wildcat, the Round Top Oil Co. 1 Norton Properties.

Condor will drill the test as its 1 Norton Properties. Contract depth was changed from 6,000 feet to 5,800 feet.

Location of the project is 1,980 feet from south and west lines of L. N. Taylor survey 4, eight miles northeast of Bronte. It will be

## CITY STREET WORK IS NOW UNDERWAY

Work is now underway on the streets of Bronte, with county road machinery doing the work. Main part of the project is building up the roadbed and opening drainage ditches on the Main Street east of Highway 277. The ditches are being opened up to the creek in the east part of town, in order that water will not be backed up into the business district of town.

Mayor H. O. Whitt said that the work is being done with county road machinery, with no cost to the city. The Mayor added, however, that the city is assuming all responsibility for the work and that any complaints concerning it should be made to him rather than the men who are doing the work.

Whitt said that some work on other streets is to be done while the machinery is working in the city.

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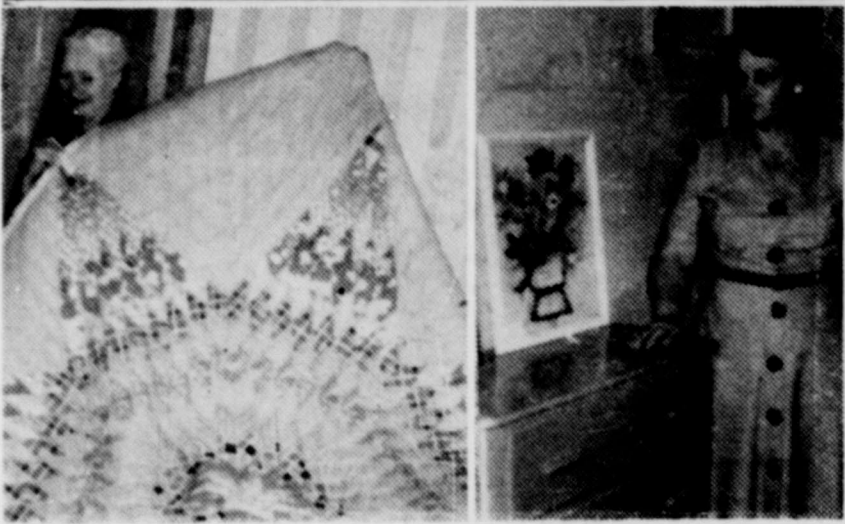
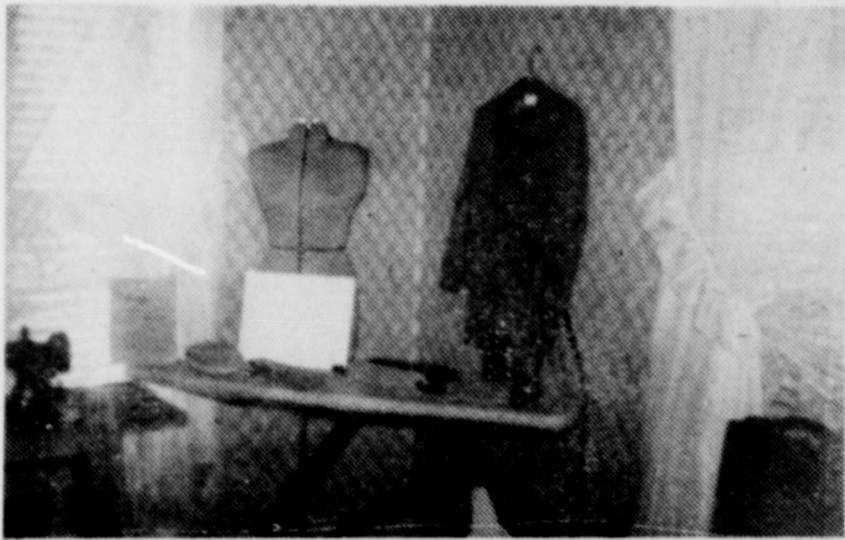

a lot of Johnson grass and other  
pasture a week earlier, Fort  
Worth had its largest run of the  
year on Monday.

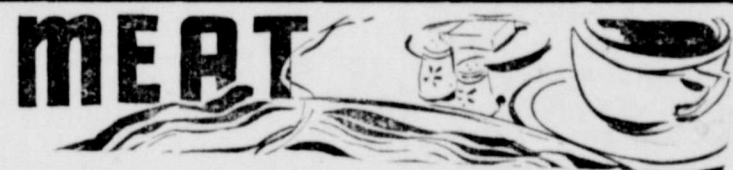

### Healthy Child Requires Well Balanced Diet

AUSTIN, TEXAS — In speaking about the food requirements of a child enjoying maximum health, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, emphasized the importance of a well rounded diet and stated that a healthy and well nourished child enjoys life because he is physically fit.

Stressing the importance to health of an adequate and well balanced diet, Dr. Cox stated further that when a child is in good health, his appetite is good, elimination regular and sleep is sound and untroubled.

"A child's appearance can usually help parents to judge the state of his nutrition. A well nourished child has good skin color and there is a moderate padding of fat over the bones and muscles of the arms, legs and body. Muscles are well developed and strong. Teeth are good and the gums firm and pink," Dr. Cox said.

That finicky appetite or a tired feeling after a little exertion indicates a possible malnutrition and the child should see the family physician. Poor appetite can also mean the beginning of an illness and possibly that the child does not require as much food as he is being urged to eat.

Required as a diet for the preschool child and those of school age, Dr. Cox included milk, vegetables, eggs, meat, fish or cheese, cereal and bread and added that cod liver oil and other vitamin preparations are important in winter and early spring but should be prescribed by the family physician.
