Mrs. Lum Lasswell New Teacher

Bronte School trustees met last Monday night and elected Mrs. Lum Lasswell as a new teacher for the Bronte grade school. She will begin duties next Monday, which starts the second semester at the local schools.

Supt. J. L. Carroll was named by trustees to serve as census trustee. Laws governing the census have been changed and the census this year will be taken in January instead of March, as formerly.

Persons who have children starting to school next fall are asked to come by the superintendent's office and register for them.

Trustees, at their Monday night meeting, voted to enforce the state compulsory attendance law. This law requires that every child in the state who is between seven and sixteen years of age shall be required to attend the public school in the district to which it may be transferred for a period of not less than one hundred and twenty days. The period of compulsory attendance begins at the opening of the school term unless otherwise authorized by the district school trustees and notice given by the trustees prior to the beginning of the school term and extending through the term.

The law further states that any child not so exempt may be excused from temporary absence due to personal sickness, illness or death in the family, quarantine, severe weather which hampers regular means of travel or for other unusual causes, provided that the excuses are in writing and signed by the parent or cause may be investigated by guardian of the child. Any excuse of the authorities.

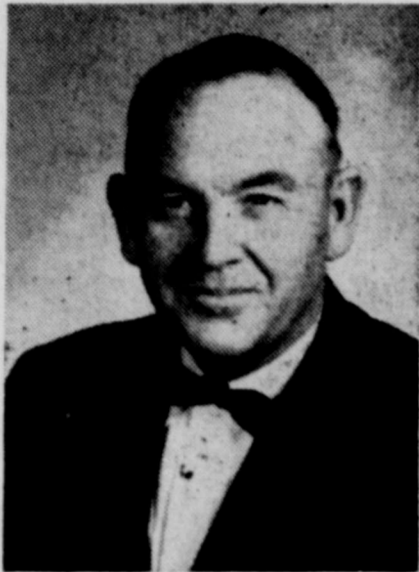

The local pastor stated that his continual regret was that every Christian in Bronte, regardless of church affiliation, could not have been present.

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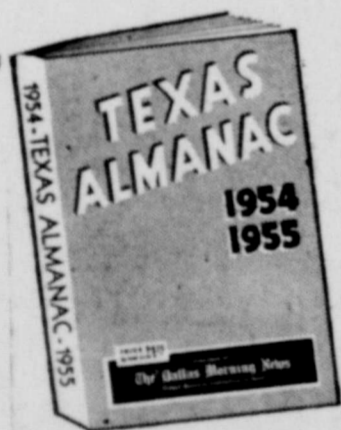

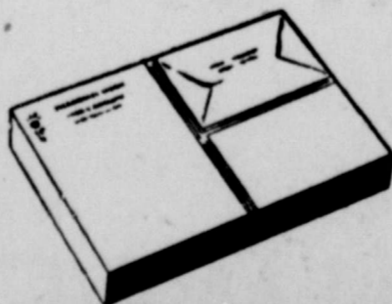

REPORTS**

NEW SESSION: As a member of the Senate and of the House of Representatives, I have been on hand for the opening of a good many sessions of Congress. It is an experience that never fails to thrill me.

As the gavel fell on Wednesday, January 6, to signalize opening of the second session of the 83rd Congress, I felt a renewed pride in being an American — in being Senator for the great State of Texas.

Our representative form of government is the finest that any nation has ever devised. We must preserve and maintain it.

ISSUES: At least thirty-five subjects of major importance are due to come before this session.

Some of these matters — such as the farm program and the Reciprocal Trade Agreements program — are of direct and vital significance to Texas. Congressional action on taxes, defense, foreign aid, social security and many other issues will affect the lives of all Americans.

Through the cooperation of your home town newspaper, I will do my best to keep you informed through this column about these issues and my own views regarding them.

COTTON ACREAGE: A matter of urgent concern to Texans

is expected to receive immediate attention from the Senate Committee on Agriculture.

This is the bill, passed by the House in the last session providing that the national cotton allotment shall be 22,500,000 acres for this year. That would increase the Texas allotment by between 1,500,000 and 2,000,000 acres.

The bill, as it now stands, also permits the county committee — with approval of the Secretary of Agriculture — to apportion the county allotment on the basis of farm cotton acreage history for the past three years, rather than on the basis of a uniform county cropland factor.

It provides that for this year and next any cotton acreage voluntarily surrendered to the county committee may be reapportioned to other farms without reducing the allotment in future years for the farm surrendering the acreage.

Every cotton farmer in Texas knows how badly an increased acreage allotment is needed. Quick action is necessary to do us any good this year.

POLL TAX: January is poll tax payment month. I like the slogan of the Lufkin Post of the Veterans of Foreign Wars. This is it: "Let Your Americanism Show — Pay your Poll Tax!"

Remember — bad government is caused by good citizens who fail to vote.

BIRTHDAY PARTY: Lady Bird and I skip far more Washington parties than we attend. But there was one the evening of the day Congress opened its session that we wouldn't have missed for anything.

It was a birthday reception for that beloved and respected Texan, Sam Rayburn of Bonham. Many, many friends were on hand to extend birthday greetings to this great statesman and grand human being.

PRORAM FOR AMERICA: Both House Democratic Leader Rayburn and I attended a meeting at the White House the day before the session opened for a discussion with President Eisenhower of some parts of his legislative program.

With Congress so evenly divided — with the Democrats actually having a numerical majority in the Senate — the Administration wants and needs Democratic support for its program.

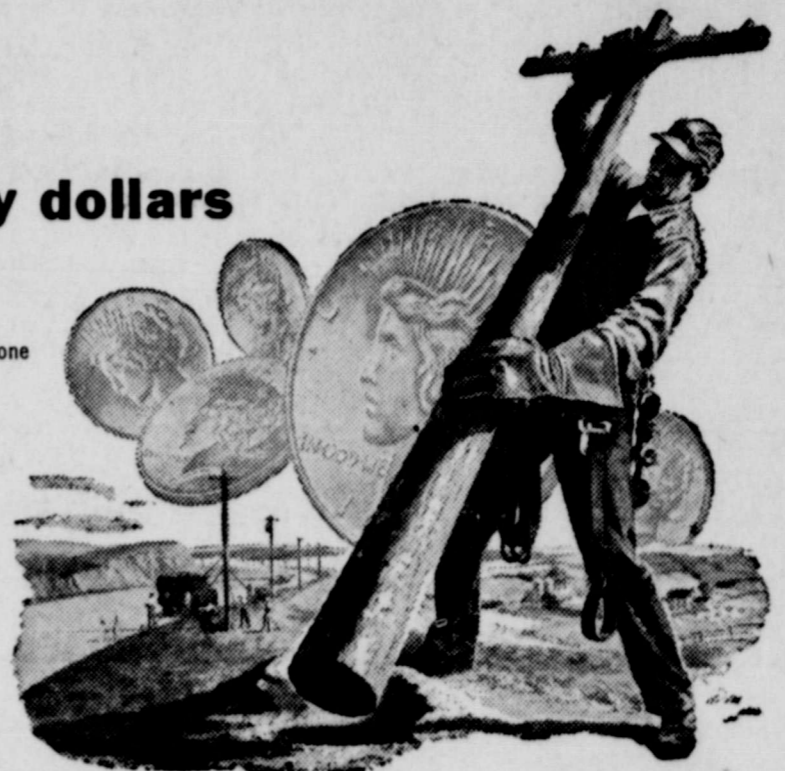

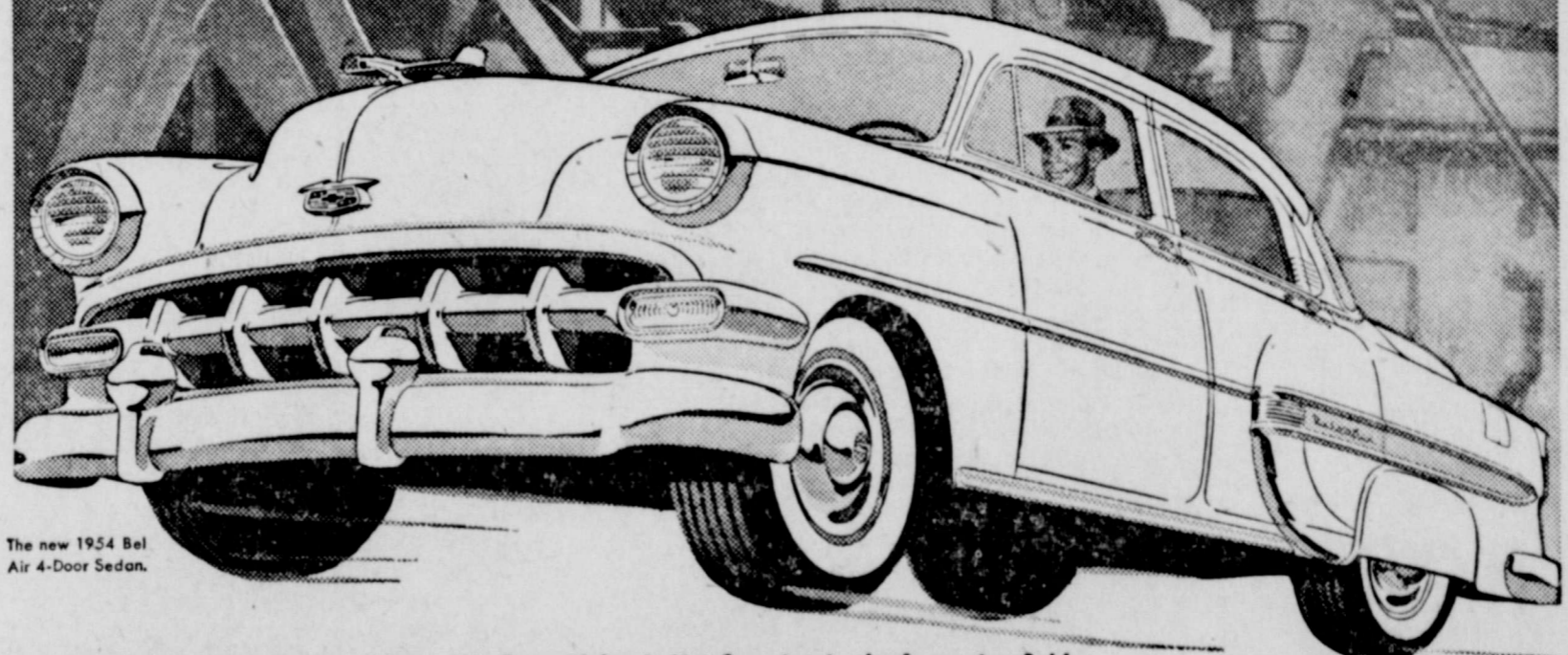
