Council Employs Engineers to Study Sewer Situation

The Bronte city council in a regular meeting last Friday night, hired a Fort Worth engineering firm to make a preliminary survey on the possibilities of installing a sewer system in the city. The action was taken after a number of citizens had requested the council to investigate the matter.

The engineers firm, Scott, McDonald & Harrell, had two representatives present at the meeting. They presented plans of sewer systems in towns of similar size to Bronte and discussed the matter with council members.

Their offer was to make the survey with no obligation to the city unless the sewer system is actually installed. The engineers said they believed that should a system be installed here, it would provide a substantial savings to residents, inasmuch as they would not have to bother with upkeep and repair on septic tanks.

They also mentioned the sanitation angle of having a sewer system and said it would greatly reduce the number of flies and other insects. They expect to present preliminary plans to the council in the next two or three months.

Council members discussed the need for more fire hose and routine bills were approved before the group adjourned.

COUNTY AUDIT IN THIS ISSUE

Coke County Commissioners Court is publishing in this issue of the Robert Lee Observer and The Bronte Enterprise a copy of the annual audit of the county's business. The audit was made by the Neimer Audit Co. of Lubbock and covers the period from Jan. 1, 1953, to Dec. 31, 1953.

Commissioners said they wanted the report published in order that Coke County taxpayers may see just how their tax money is being used.

The report covers each fund which is under the supervision of the court as well as a report on the Coke County Memorial Hospital.

The financial condition of the county, as can be seen from the report, is good. Only account which is overdrawn is the Road and Bridge fund. The overdraft on it during 1953 was decreased from \$35,138.65 to \$24,362.81. Most all of the other funds have a large surplus in them. Total balance on hand December 31, 1953, was \$256,180.75.

In addition to the reports on each fund, a recapitulation of the entire county business is carried in a separate table. Another table shows the amount of indebtedness at the beginning of the year, the amount paid on both principal and interest and the balance left at the end of the year.

Local residents who are interested in how their tax money is being spent will want to inspect this report.

Bronte Area Receives Up to 2 Inches of Moisture This Week

The area around Bronte received another good rain this week, with measurements running from one-half to more than two inches.

The rain seemed to get lighter as it went north until it reached the Blackwell vicinity. From there on to Maryneal it was heavier than here.

Gauges here in Bronte showed from 1 to 1½ inches. C. E. Arrott, who lives south of the riv-

er, reported over two inches. Otis Smith, located just north of town, said he received a half inch. Mrs. Vic Haselden, who lives northwest of Bronte, also received a half inch, she reported. C. C. Glenn measured 1.2 inches at his place at Maverick.

The rain came at just the right time. Most all the farmers around here had their crops up and pretty well cleaned out. They were ready for the rain.

Water Supt. Otis Smith reported that Oak Creek Lake was up some. He estimated the rise at from six to eight inches. At any rate, he said, the lake is higher than it has ever been.

Other towns in this vicinity had more violence with the rain than did Bronte. San Angelo had over a million dollar damage caused mostly from hail and partly from water and wind. Hailstones as big as baseballs were reported there.

Robert Lee also received some hail along with high wind, but it was not so severe as that which struck San Angelo.

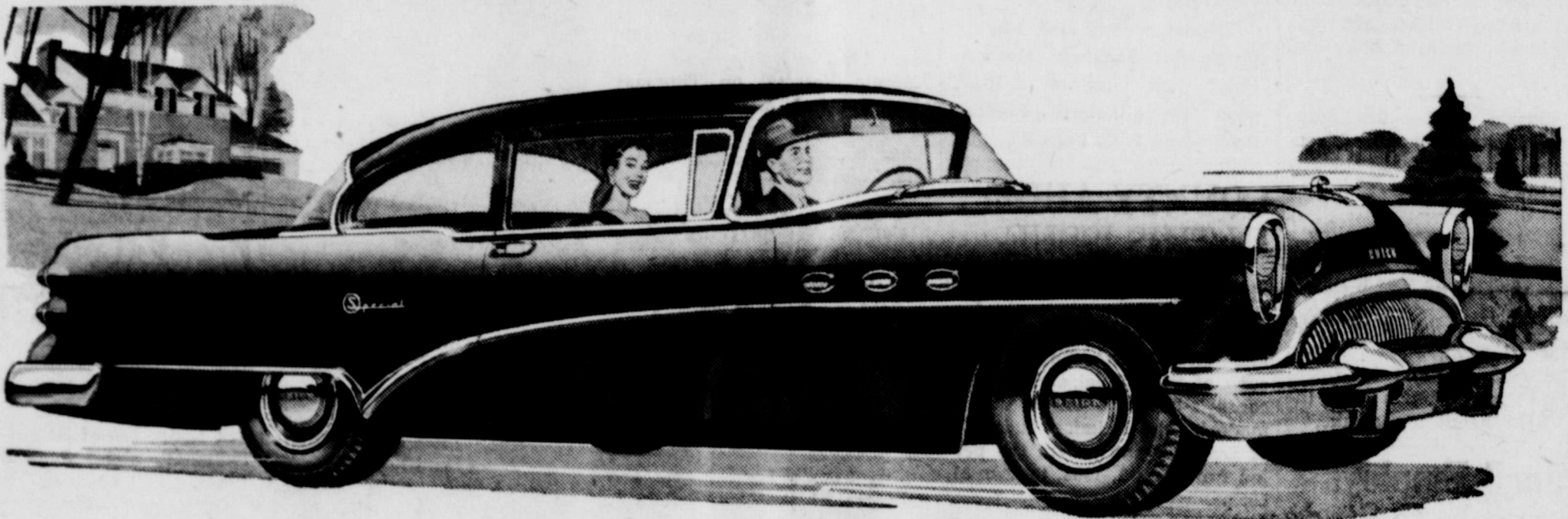

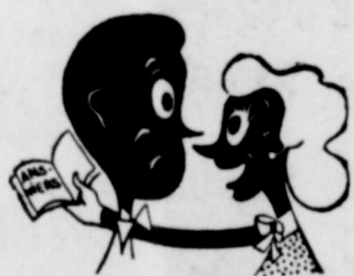
