The east side of the county raised \$927.17, while the west side collected \$1,235.33. The east side campaign was concluded with the Tad Richards Barn Dance which brought in \$175.00.

Robert Vaughan of Robert Lee, chairman of the Coke County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, also expressed his gratitude to the people of this county for their generosity in supporting the 1958 March of Dimes.

Oden said that half of the money raised will be sent in to the National Foundation, where it will be used for research and treatment of cases in areas where local funds have been exhausted. The remaining half of the money will be retained by the local chapter for use in treating polio cases in this county. Three polio cases, two at Bronte and one at Silver, have been receiving aid the past year.

National officials of the Foundation in announcing this year's drive, urged everyone to contribute liberally, since much research on the Salk vaccine remains to be done. Patient care is another big item in the national budget, and plans to do research on other virus-caused diseases have been announced.

## '58 Wool Incentive Program Similar to '57 Plan

The 1958 wool incentive program recently announced by the U. S. Department of Agriculture will be similar to the program in effect during the current marketing year, C. E. Arrott, Coke County ASC chairman, reported.

As previously announced, the shorn wool incentive price in 1958 will be 62 cents per pound as during the past three years. The payment rate for shorn wool will be the percentage required to bring the national average price received by all producers for sales during the 1958 marketing year up to the 62-cent incentive level. The payment rate for the 1956 marketing year was 40 per cent.

Producers who market wool during the 1958 marketing year will be eligible for a payment which will be an amount equal to the percentage rate times the proceeds from the sale of their wool. Payments will be made on the 1958 wool in the summer of 1959, when

### Services for Mrs. J. H. Clark Held Here Sunday

Funeral services for Mrs. J. H. Clark, 71, were held from the First Methodist Church in Bronte at 3 p.m. Sunday. Mrs. Clark died in the Bronte Hospital Saturday after a long illness. She was a resident of Ballinger.

The Rev. Lin Loeffler, local pastor, was in charge of the service. He was assisted by the Rev. Gene Robertson, Methodist pastor at Norton. Burial was in the Wingate cemetery, under direction of Clift Funeral Home of Bronte.

Mrs. Clark, who was the former Miss Blanche McKown, was born Aug. 19, 1886, in Williamson County. Her father came to the Oak Creek community in 1898, and members of the family were among pioneers of this area. She and J. H. Clark were married Dec. 15, 1904, in the Oak Creek community and made their home there until about 1½ years ago, when they moved to Ballinger. They were in the farming and ranching business.

Mrs. Clark joined the Methodist Church when a young girl. Her membership was in the Bronte church.

Mrs. Clark had been in poor health for the past 30 years, and had been seriously ill and hospitalized several times prior to her last illness, when she spent 47 days in the hospital.

Survivors include her husband; two sons, Clifford Clark of Bronte and Neal M. Clark of El Paso; one daughter, Mrs. D. W. Turner of Ballinger; one sister, Mrs. Ernest Seay of Stephenville; three brothers, John McKown of San Antonio, Harl McKown of Norton and Jim McKown of Lovington, N. M.; eight grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

Pallbearers were Pete Gentry and Bill Landers, both of Bronte, Hadley Richards of Robert Lee, Bud and C. H. McKown of Lovington, N. M., and Mac Carter of Ballinger. They are all nephews of Mrs. Clark.







## H D Agent's Column

Coke County Home Demonstration members left Sunday to attend the District Planning Meeting in Johnson City on Monday. The purpose of the meeting was to plan the Spring District THDA meeting which will be held on April 16 in San Angelo. Those who planned to make the trip were Mrs. Jahew Jameson, THDA chairman, Mrs. Pat Rives, HD Council chairman, Mrs. Lee Weigel, Mrs. George Conner and myself.

Plans are being made with Miss Eudora Hawkins of the West Texas Utilities Co. to conduct a Driver's Reeducation Clinic in Robert Lee on March 7, at 1:30. This clinic will be open to the public so mark the dates on your calendar and plan to attend. The clinic is being sponsored by the Home Demonstration Council.

I have had a number of requests to include recipes in my column so this week, in view of the fact pork is a good buy and now is such a nice time to be eating it before warm weather sets in, I am giving you a recipe. This recipe is not only good, but attractive when served.

### Lemon Pork Chops with Pepper-Rice Rings

4 loin, rib or shoulder pork chops (about 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> lbs.)  
1/2 teaspoon paprika  
1/2 teaspoon salt (for chops)  
Dash of pepper  
1/2 cup raw rice  
1 medium onion  
4 thin lemon slices  
1 large green pepper, cut cross-wise in 4 thick rings  
2 1/4 cups (1 No. 2 can) tomato juice  
2 teaspoons sugar  
1/2 teaspoon chili powder  
1 bay leaf, finely crushed  
1 teaspoon salt (for tomato juice)

Trim excess fat from chops; slash fat edges 1 inch apart. Rub with paprika, salt (for chops) and pepper. Rub heated large skillet with piece of cut-off fat; brown chops slowly on both sides. While chops brown, parboil rice in boiling salted water for 5 minutes; drain. Reserve for filling pepper rings. Cut one slice from center of onion; separate into rings. Re-

serve for garnishing chops. Chop remaining onion, combine with reserved parboiled rice. Add lemon slices and onion rings to chops in skillet. Arrange green pepper rings around chops; fill with rice-onion mixture. Season tomato juice with sugar, chili powder, bay leaf and salt; pour into skillet to depth of 1/4 inch. Simmer, covered, 1 hour, or until chops are tender. Add remaining tomato juice, as needed, to keep liquid 1/4 inch deep during entire cooking time. Arrange chops on heated platter; transfer rice-stuffed pepper rings to platter with pancake turner; spoon tomato pan gravy over chops and rice.

#### COKE SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

Present Supervisors — C. N. Webb, Chairman; W. E. Burns, Vice Chairman; D. K. Glenn, Secretary and Treasurer; Robert Walker; Bryan Yarbrough.

The following farmers and ranchers have made application for planning assistance under the Great Plains Conservation Program. M. J. Krall, who farms west of Robert Lee; Otis Smith D. K. Glenn and Howard Brock of Bronte; Dwight Jones who ranches in the south part of Coke County and F. S. Price who ranches in the western part of the county.

Many inquiries have been received recently as the Great Plains Program gains momentum. The following questions and answers may help explain some of the hows and why of the program.

What is the Great Plains Conservation Program? It is a program designed to help speed up the application of permanent con-

servations measures on farms and ranches in ten Great Plains States, in which Coke County is a designated county. The total program includes cost sharing, credit, and technical assistance in soil and water conservation.

Am I eligible? To be eligible a participant must own, or otherwise control for the period needed to carry out a plan of operations on a farm or ranch in a designated county.

Where do I apply? Participants may apply at the local Soil Conservation Service Office located in the Court House in Robert Lee.

What are the provisions of the program as to plans, cost share and practices? To participate in the program a workable plan of operations that incorporates needed land use changes, needed cropping and grazing systems, and needed soil and water conservation practices in proper combinations, must be developed. The participant has a maximum of 10 years and a minimum of 3 years to carry out the program.

Practices eligible for cost share include: Initial establishment of permanent vegetative cover as a part of an improved cropping system or as a needed land use adjustment. Improvement of vegetative cover on rangeland by artificial reseeding for soil protection.

Seeding waterways, shaping waterways, terracing, diversion construction, channel lining, drop inlets, chutes drop spillways, lining irrigation ditches, wells for livestock water, farm ponds, permanent fences and brush control.

For further information concerning the program contact the local soil conservation service.
