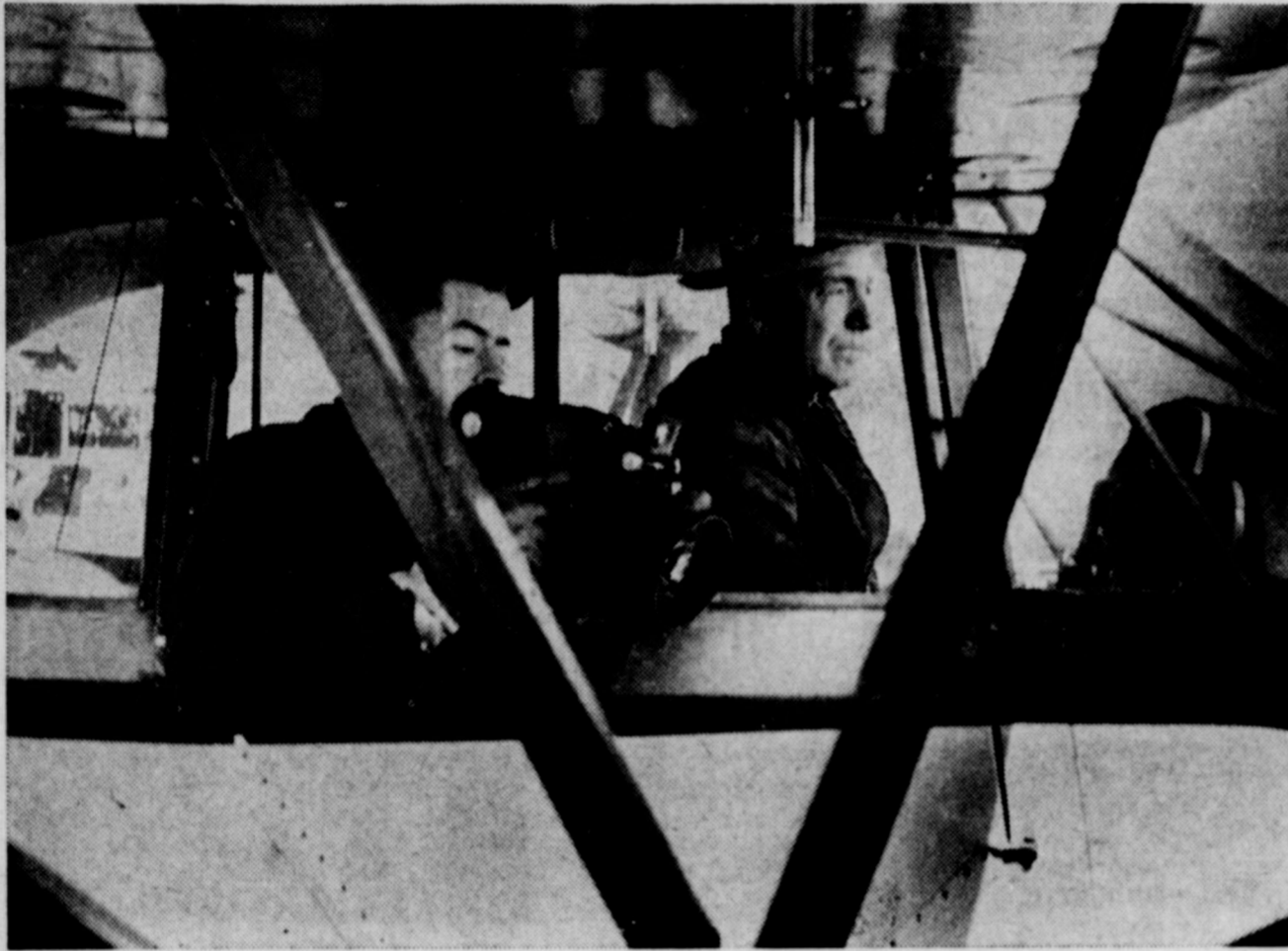

Two other young men, selected by the Navy and Marines, were chosen from other towns.

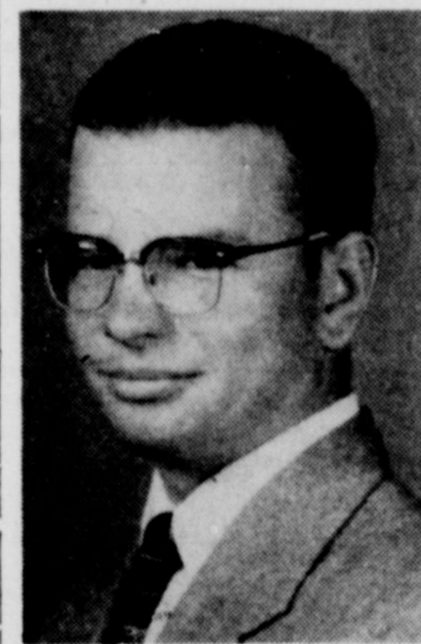
Selecting the winners began several weeks ago when written tests were given to all senior boys all over West Texas. A spokesman for the Army said some 2,000 boys from eight counties in West Texas took the tests. Each boy indicated his preference as to his favorite branch of service and the selection started from there. After tests were graded, the top five from each division were selected on the basis of the written tests, personal interviews, scholastic rating in school, participation in community affairs, initiative, personality, patriotism and extra activities.

From the top five in each group, the final selections were made.

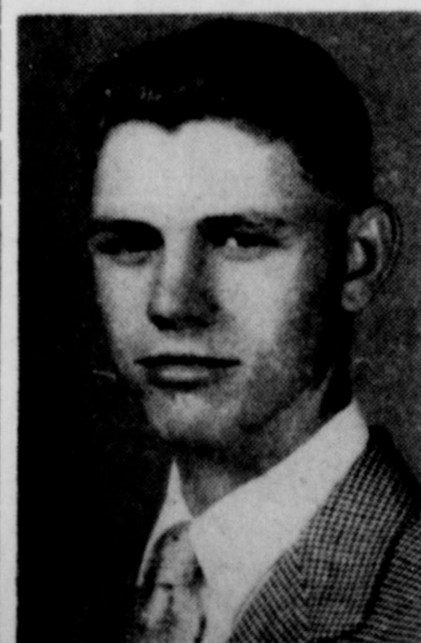

Kickapoo Project Study Slated Soon

A study to estimate the cost of building the flood control project on the Kickapoo Creeks has been tentatively set for the latter part of June or the first part of July, by the state soil conservation office.

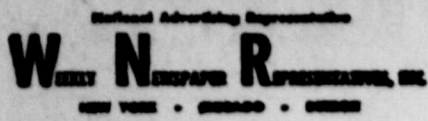
In a letter from State Conservationist H. N. Smith to F. S. Higginbotham of Bronte, chairman of the steering committee working on the project, it was stated that the crews of men capable of making such a survey now have a heavy work schedule. The letter went on to say, however, that "we will plan to give you an estimate and will make an effort to schedule such a survey just as soon as it can be arranged."

A great many people in the Bronte community are interested in the Kickapoo project. Engineers say that if the project is properly constructed and maintained the problem of the two Kickapoo Creeks' flooding the City of Bronte will be solved.

Farmers and ranchmen living on the watershed are particularly interested in the project because of the vast amount of water and soil which would be saved.

In various meetings held here concerning the project, persons living in areas where such practices have been put into effect are loud in their praise of the good which is done.

Projects of this kind are now financed 100 per cent by the federal government as part of its program to conserve the natural resources of the United States. However, some local financing is desirable, in order to speed up the planning and construction. Coke County Commissioners Court has indicated a willingness to provide the local funds needed.

Midland Man Dies Here

Layton Allen Webb, 34, Midland oil attorney and former Fisher county attorney, died in the Bronte hospital Saturday night. He became ill while unloading his fishing equipment at Oak Creek Lake late Friday afternoon and was rushed to the hospital where he lived about 30 hours. His death was attributed to a hemorrhage of the esophagus.

He was born and attended high school in Roby and attended Texas Tech and the University of Texas. He served as a captain in the Air Force in World War II, after which he began practice of law in Roby and also served as county attorney.

He moved to Midland in 1953 and at the time of his death was division attorney for Sinclair Oil Company there.

Funeral services were held in First Methodist Church in Roby last Monday.

He is survived by his wife and a daughter, Cindy Lou, nine-months old.

May 5 Deadline for Candidates to File

May 5, next Monday, is the deadline for candidates to file for offices to be voted on in the Democratic Primary on July 26. Candidates who have not filed by next Monday will not have their names included on the printed ballot.

Political activity in Coke County is unusually heavy this year with most all positions being contested.

The county situation so far has shaped up as follows:

For county judge, the incumbent, Jeff Dean is opposed by Ernest Ivey.

For county and district clerk, J. L. Tinkler, incumbent, is opposed by Charlie Boecking.

For county treasurer, the incumbent, Mrs. Gertrude Gray, has two opponents, Mrs. Lillian Caraway and Mrs. A. L. Forehand, the latter announcing this week.

For Commissioner, Precinct 2, Howard Brock, incumbent, is opposed by C. E. McGuire.

For Commissioner, Precinct 4, Claude Dittmore, who presently has the job, is the only county candidate who did not have an announced opponent on Thursday morning.

For Justice of the Peace, Precinct 2, the incumbent, C. E. Bruton, is not seeking re-election. However, a big slate of five local men have announced as candidates for the job. They are Earl

D. (Pete) Nutter, C. L. (Charlie) Knierim, B. G. Timmons, George Wrinkle and Jess Liles.

Some contests are also shaping up in state contests. Only this week Sen. Ralph Yarbrough announced he will seek a full term in the U. S. Senate. Dallas multimillionaire William Blakney is opposing him. Blakney was interim senator for a few months between the time Price Daniel resigned to serve as governor and the time Yarbrough was elected.

Price Daniel has announced for re-election as governor. Opposing him so far are W. Lee (Pass the Biscuits, Pappy) O'Daniel, former governor, senator, floud salesman and insurance executive; Alvis Vandygriff, Austin attorney; Joe Idwin, Dallas insurance and real estate man; and Don Booker, Orange insurance man. Edwin S. Mayer of San Angelo and Sonora, announced Wednesday that he is a gubernatorial candidate on the Republican ticket.

A. J. Bishop, Jr. of Winters was also unopposed Thursday morning in his bid for re-election to the Texas House of Representatives from this district.

Likewise, no opposition has been announced for Dorsey Hardeman, incumbent, for state senator from this district.

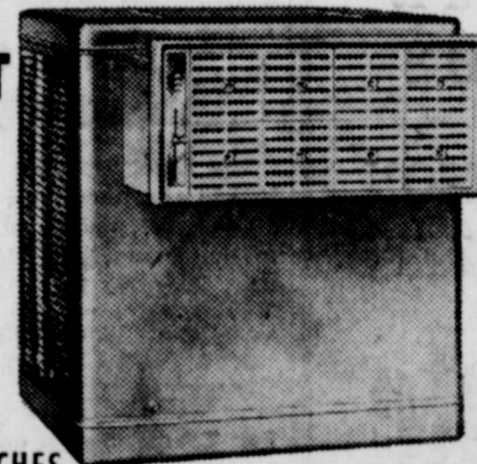

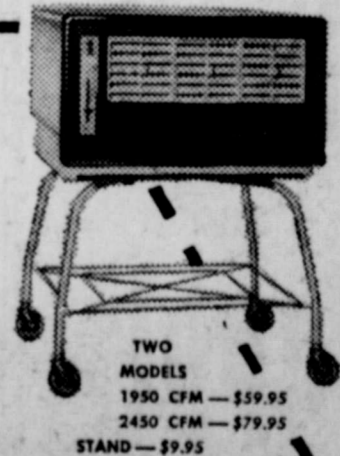

Texas Highway Map for 1958 Is Free for Asking

Austin, Texas—It's here! It's new! It's free!—The Texas Highway Department today released the big new 1958 Official Highway Travel Map. Maps may be obtained by writing the Texas Highway Department, Austin 14, Texas, or at the Highway District Offices and Travel Information Bureaus. County tax offices have map cards available for requesting copies of the map.

The Official Highway Travel Map is used by all state and governmental agencies in Texas for determining highway distances, mileages, zones, and like information. The same map is used by Texas tourists seeking roads to recreational and historical attractions throughout the state. The reverse side of the map reflects in full color some of the outstanding scenic and recreational facilities in Texas.

Texas' new 1958 travel map is the answer to today's demand for more and more travel information. The steady growth of Texas from a state with a population of slightly over seven million just ten years ago to its present estimated population of more than nine million is reflected by the information shown.

The number of cities and towns indicated on the 1948 map was 567. Today, there are 1,812—an increase of 1,245. State and U. S. highways have been increased by 2,026 miles, and farm-to-market roads from 620 miles to 17,126 miles—a 16,506-mile increase. The map reflects a total of 43,292 miles of highways.

Roadside parks, long cherished by Texas highway users, were not shown on the 1948 map. Today, 1,026 roadside parks are pinpointed as pleasant stopping places. Divided highways also show a

JUDGE JOE GREENHILL FILES FOR SUPREME COURT POST

Joe Greenhill of Travis County announced his candidacy this week for his first elective term as associate justice of the Supreme Court of Texas.

Greenhill was appointed to the State's highest civil court last fall after 20 years of varied trial and appellate courts experience.

Greenhill came up from the ranks in Supreme Court work and has had extensive experience with the Court, having served for two terms as briefing attorney. STUDENTS TAKE TEST FOR SCHOLARSHIPS

Eight students at Bronte High School took the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test on April 29, it was announced Wednesday.

An estimated \$5 million in Merit Scholarships and other awards are at stake in the national competition, now beginning its fourth year. Some \$12 million in Merit Scholarships have been awarded in the first three years of the program.

Merit Scholarships are provided by some 80 corporations, foundations, professional societies and individuals, as well as by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation itself, which conducts the competition.

The test is a three hour measure of educational growth and aptitude. Emphasis is on broad intellectual skills, and on understanding and ability to use what has been learned, rather than on sheer knowledge of facts.

This is the same scholarship which Bobby Hester of Bronte won last year. His particular scholarship was provided by the General Motors Corp. Hester is attending Texas A&M and has made an outstanding record.

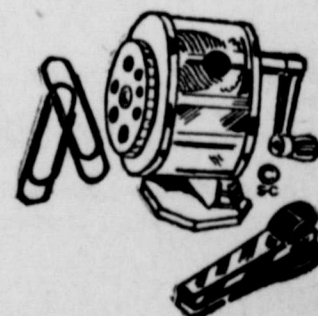
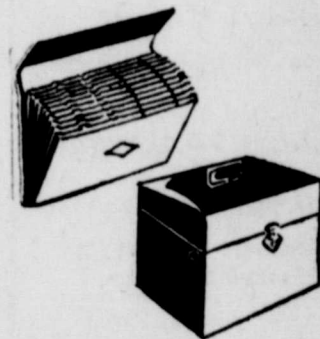
