School Starts Tuesday, Sept. 2

The extensive preparations necessary to opening a new school term were being completed late this week by Bronte School officials. Main item of business for the school board and administrative officers of the school was the election of a science teacher. This was done Wednesday afternoon and completed the faculty for the 1958-59 term.

Douglas Whittenberg, recently of Lake Arthur, La. was named science teacher, replacing Oscar Dorsey, who resigned. Late last week Grade School Principal Norman Porter was elected head football coach, a position also left vacant by Dorsey's resignation. Porter's appointment left the high school girls coaching slot vacant and High School Principal Joe B. Simpson was named to that position. He is also assistant football coach.

The school term will open Tuesday, Sept. 2, with buses making their regular runs. A teachers meeting has been called by Supt. Garland Black for 8:15 a. m. It

will be followed at 9 a. m. by a general assembly of students, parents and teachers. A short schedule of classes will be run following the assembly and will be continued on Page 5

Porter Named Head Coach; 26 Boys Out for Practice

Twenty six boys and a new head coach were on hand for opening day workouts last Monday as the 1958 football season got underway for the Bronte Longhorns.

Norman Porter takes over the coaching duties vacated when Oscar Dorsey resigned. Coaching is by no means a new task for Porter as he has held down several coaching jobs before coming to Bronte in 1957. After graduating from Trinity University, Porter started his coaching career at Burbank in San Antonio and then moved to Pleasanton High School to coach junior high football at his alma mater of high school days. Coming to Bronte last year, Porter undertook the job as Jr. High coach and head basketball coach of the high school team.

Porter graduated from Pleasanton high school and attended Uvalde Jr. College before enrolling at Trinity University. Following up his high school football, he lettered at Uvalde and also Trinity. He also has one year of service ball in the Armed Forces to his credit, giving him plenty of experience for the coaching job.

Joe Simpson remains as assistant coach. He is a graduate of Llano High School and graduated from college at San Marcos where he played varsity football. Simpson has also been named head coach of girls basketball.

Blackwell Lions To Sell Barbecue During Weekend

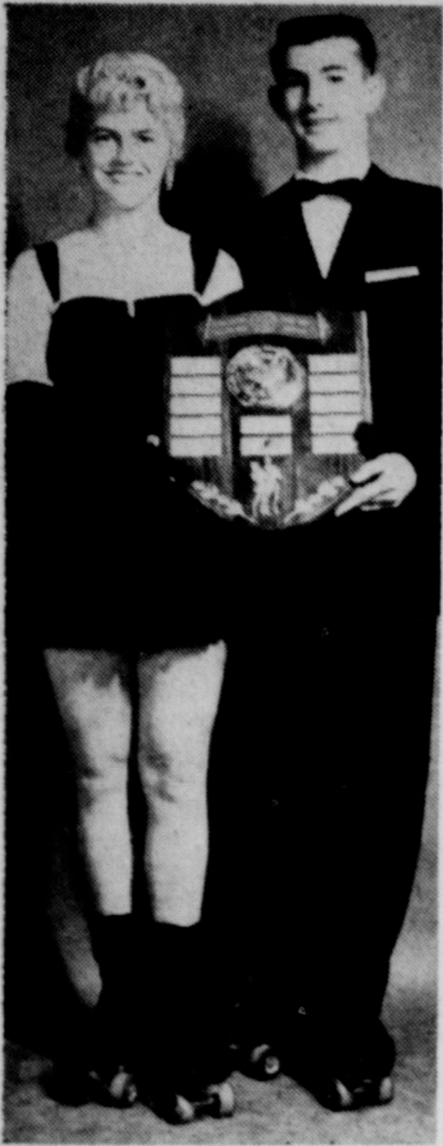

Humble Makes Radio, TV Plans For SW Conference

To celebrate its 25th year as sponsor of Southwest Conference football broadcasts, Humble Oil & Refining Company is adding a new feature to this fall's football presentations. It is a videotaped "Game of the Week" to be presented each Sunday afternoon during football season with Kern Tips narrating.

Besides the 11 videotaped games, there will be 70 radio broadcasts and four live telecasts of Southwest Conference games.

The videotaped games will offer many of the advantages of live telecasting, in fact most viewers cannot distinguish between the two. Each game to be recorded on tape will be selected by Conference representatives and will be telecast at 5 p. m. (CST) the day after the game is played. It will be seen over a 28 station network in Texas and New Mexico. This program will give viewers a 45-minute version of the game as it would have been if telecast "live."

Live telecasts include the Baylor-Texas Tech game, October 18; the SMU-Georgia Tech game, October 25; the Rice-Army game, November 8; and the TCU-Texas game, November 15. These four games, selected by the Conference, will be telecast over a network of 24 TV stations.

More than 130 radio stations in Texas and New Mexico will be used for radio broadcasts of games played by the Southwest Conference, Texas Western and New Mexico University. These will originate from 25 stadiums in 16 states.

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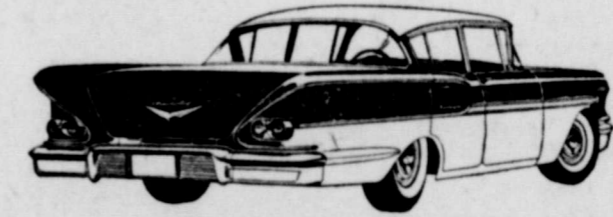

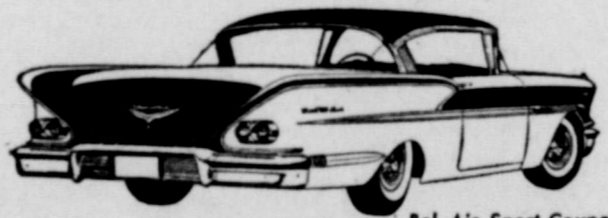

COKE SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

Willis W. Smith, south of Robert Lee, has just completed building 1.2 miles of terraces and 1152 feet of diversion terraces.

Earl Roberts has just completed 764 feet of diversion terrace on his farm south of Robert Lee. He has also bulldozed about 45 acres of mesquite and other brush on the pastureland.

R. E. Hickman is now constructing a 6,474 cubic yard pit type pond for livestock water on his place southwest of Bronte.

Walter King, southwest of Blackwell, is constructing approximately 3.5 miles of terraces on his farm.

F. S. Higginbotham is preparing to construct a 6,474 cubic yard type pond on his farm north of

Bronte.

The local Soil Conservation Service in cooperation with the Coke County Agricultural Agent has a grass plot located on the south corner of the Court House block in Robert Lee. Grasses growing in the plot are sideoats grama, green sprangletop, blue grama, switch grass, giant sandbur, trichloris, little bluestem, Arizona cottontop, and cane bluestem. Farmers and ranchers interested in planting native grass for seed production are urged to stop by the grass plot and observe the growth characteristics of the different grasses.

DO NOT SHOOT MORE THAN TEN DOVES PER DAY

Austin, Aug. 25. — Don't be confused, it may cost you a fine for killing too many doves, according to the director of law enforcement of the Game & Fish Commission. The North Zone season opens Sept. 1.

This year's hunting regulations, approved by the U. S. Fish & Wildlife Service, permits a possession limit of 20 birds after the first day. This does not mean, the director warns, that a hunter can go out and kill 20 birds in one day and get by with it.

The daily limit is still 10 birds. However, after the first day a hunter may have two days' possession, provided he doesn't have them on his person or in a manner to indicate they were all killed on the same day.

"The dove is a migratory bird and as such comes under final federal control," the chief says. "This year the possession limit has been modified, as well as the season lengthened. A good dove crop indicated early this year is responsible."

The chief also warned that new licenses must be obtained before hunting Sept. 1. These licenses are required for all hunters between the ages of 17 and 65 who hunt out of their own county. The new licenses are now available from game wardens, sporting goods stores and county clerks.

New fishing licenses also will be required at the same time.

29 Motorcides Predicted For Labor Day Period

"The prediction of 29 motorcides for the forthcoming three-day Labor Day period in Texas will bring an extensive traffic law enforcement program for the holiday weekend," said Major Wilson E. Speir, Regional Commander of Region 4, Texas Department of Public Safety.

Operation Motorcide will be in effect from 12:01 A. M. August 30 through 11:59 P. M. September 1. During this period Patrolmen of the Motor Vehicle Inspection and License and Weight Services will bolster the force of the Texas Highway Patrol in enforcing our traffic laws.

"We realize," Speir said, "that this is the last holiday weekend

during our vacation season and before school starts, therefore traffic will be heavy on most of our highways. Our patrolmen are scheduled to work all hours of the day and night during the Labor Day weekend and to cover as many miles of our highways with the most effective enforcement program possible."

"The prime objective of our Patrolmen during Operation Motorcide are of two purposes, protection of the motoring public from accident prone drivers, and service to the public. Each of our Patrolmen recognizes his responsibility to the motorist and he will do his utmost to make driving in this area a pleasant experience."

"Excessive speed and driving while intoxicated are the leading causative factors in fatal accidents during holiday periods, therefore Patrolmen will concentrate on these violations."

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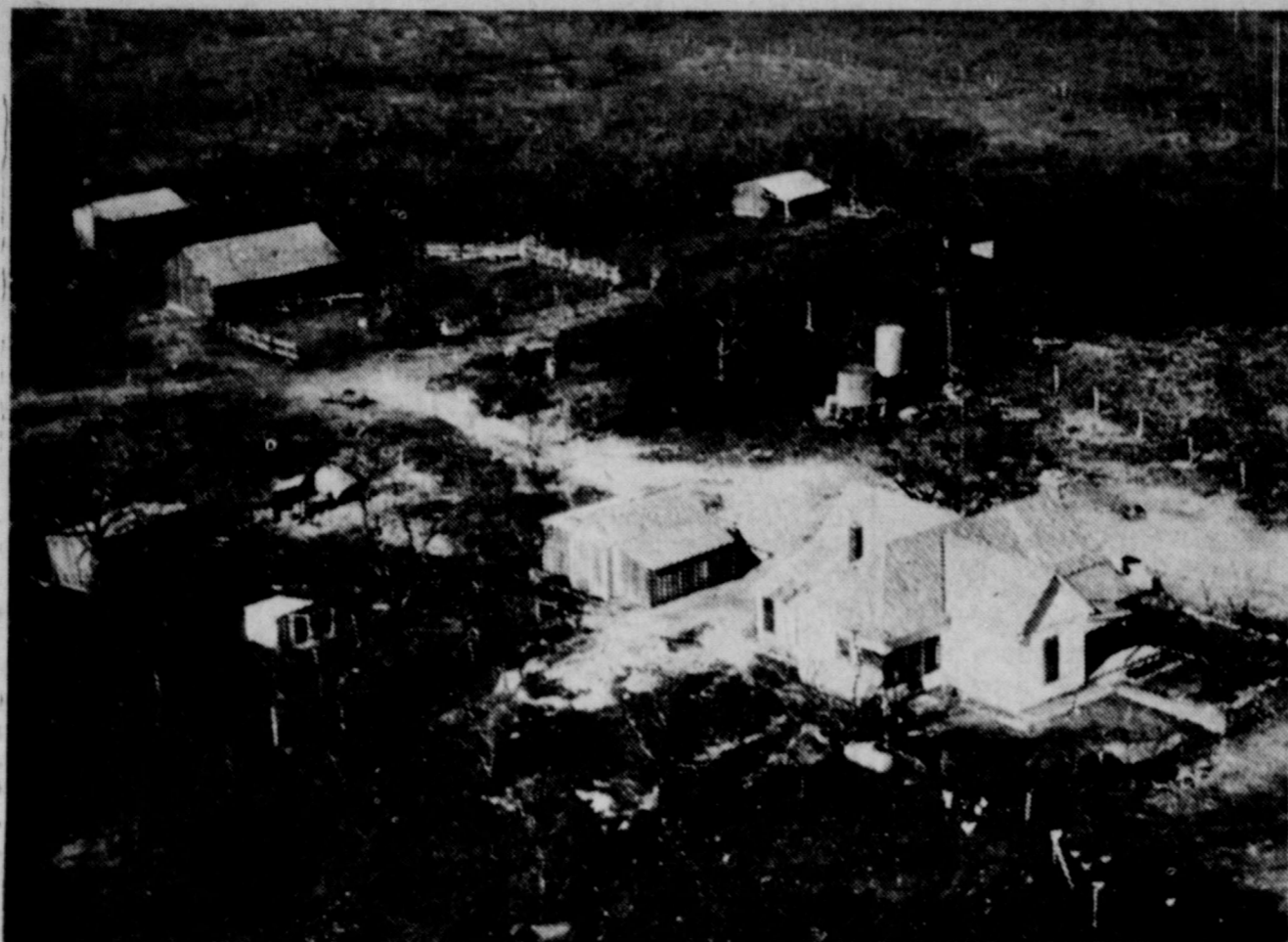

Nearly 700 ballots were cast in Coke County whose voters favored Robert W. Hamilton over J. Edwin Smith for Associate Justice of the Supreme Court Place 1, the only state-wide contest. The vote was 457 to 110.

Only four voting boxes were used, two in both precincts where the JP races were to be decided. A few voters from other boxes cast ballots in the supreme court runoff.

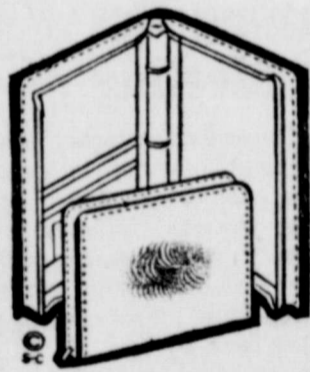

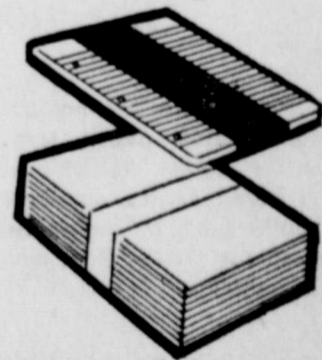
