## Swimming Pool Opens Friday; Formal Opening Announced

An official opening in observance of the fifth anniversary of the county park and pool will be held Saturday, May 20. The public is invited to attend the affair beginning at 2:30 p. m. However, the pool will open this Friday, May 12, at 4 p. m. and swimmers are invited to be on hand at that time.

Aubrey Denman, park and pool caretaker, said this week that the pool will be open during regular hours Saturday and Sunday and will open after school all next week. Denman has already opened the pool for several private class parties during this week.

Quite a number of improvements

have been made during the winter at the park and pool. All the equipment has received a new coat of paint. Grass is gradually coming through at the ball park across the street from the park proper. A fence now completely encloses the ball park, and two sets of bleachers have been erected for the use of ball fans. Denman expressed his thanks to Commissioner Howard Brock and his road hands for their work on paving the street going by the ball park. The pavement has long been needed, due to dust raised by cars passing by.

Other improvements include another picnic table near the barbecue pit, another table and benches for children, and a long serving table. A canopy, 16x50 feet, has been built over three picnic tables.

Of special interest to the kids are another merry-go-round and a new horizontal ladder (monkey bar). A number of guard posts have been erected at strategic spots to protect park property, and four speed traps have been built to insure that users of park facilities obey speed rules.

J. T. Henry and his agriculture boys have built a sign and erected it on U. S. Highway 277 at the corner of Motel Victor. The sign directs the way to the park. Mrs. Brunson, 78, died Tuesday at 11 a. m. at her home following a heart attack. She had not been ill prior to the attack.

Born Jan. 3, 1883, in Erath County, she was Bessie Creswell before her marriage. She was the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. R. L. Creswell. She and Dave C. Brunson were married in Erath County on Sept. 30, 1900. They moved to Bronte in 1914 and have lived here since that time. Mrs. Brunson was a member of the First Baptist Church of Bronte.

Survivors include her husband; six sons, Bill of Beaumont, Ivan of Sweetwater, J. L. of Bronte, Rance of Mertzon, D. C. of Wichita Falls, and Heidel of Bison, S. 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## Farm Bur. Selling Fire Extinguishers

Inauguration of a new service-to-member program by the Coke County Farm Bureau has been announced by the organization's president.

Farm Bureau members can purchase 2½ pound dry chemical fire extinguishers which normally sell for \$18.50 from Coke County Farm Bureau members for only \$9.50 each, a savings of \$9.00. Secretary Mrs. C. E. Arrott may be called for the extinguishers.

The local Farm Bureau is cooperating with the Texas Farm Bureau farm safety department in

this state-wide fire protection program. \$100 million annually.

"Purpose of the new service is to strengthen our rural fire prevention program, thereby reducing the loss of life and property," Mrs. Arrott said. "This is not a profit-making project and we are not conducting this program to compete with merchants selling fire extinguishers. Our only objective is to provide each and every farmer in the county with adequate fire-fighting equipment at the lowest possible cost."

In stressing the importance of adequate fire-fighting equipment, Mrs. Arrott said that from 750 to 1,000 persons die each year in the nation from farm fires and that farm property losses run well over

The fire extinguisher available through Farm Bureau comes complete with mounting bracket and is good for combatting oil, gas, and grease fires and knocks down grass, wood and fabric fires. Also the unit, which is fully charged and ready to use, is safe to use on electrical fires. It is completely safe and non-toxic, Mrs. Arrott said.

Most local fire stations can recharge the extinguisher, but if this service is not available, the unit can be sent to the Texas Farm Bureau in Waco for recharging. Since the unit contains no water it will not freeze. It is Underwriter and Coast Guard approved.

## H D Agent's News Dept.

By CAROLE HOOPER

I was in Abilene last Thursday and Friday attending an Equipment Training Workshop. Included on the program were sessions on laundering and small electrical equipment such as toasters, coffee-makers, mixers, irons and such.

The session on laundering made me realize how much is involved in proper laundering methods. For instance, I was under the impression that you have to have suds before cleansing can take place. Suds are caused by a chemical which is added for that purpose only because the housewife demands suds! So this means that very possibly some of us are guilty of using too much detergent. How much detergent does it take for a load of laundry? In order to dissolve fats, oils and heavy soil and keep them in suspension while washing, there must be a sufficient amount of detergent. Basic requirements of detergent for average soil are 3/8 cup for tumble action washers and 3/4 for agitator washers. For heavily soiled clothes or extremely hard water use more detergent. For small loads and lightly soiled clothes use less detergent.

I plan to work with as many 4-H girls as possible with their records before the end of May. Record keeping is an important part of each 4-H members project. If records are not kept up to date, it can be rather difficult and time-consuming. We hope to have all records up to date before the summer work, such as Clothing workshops and Dress Review, begins.

The date for the training meeting for Foods Leaders has been changed to Friday, May 12 at 10:00 A. M. in my office. This training will be on Uses of Aluminum foil.
