How much detergent does it take for a load of laundry? In order to dissolve fats, oils and heavy soil and keep them in suspension while washing, there must be a suffirequirements of detergent for av erage soil are $3 / 8$ cup for tumble action washers and $3 / 4$ for agitator washers. For heavily soiled clothes or extremely hard water use more detergent. For small loads and lightly soiled clothes use less detergent.
I plan to work with as many $4-\mathrm{H}$ girls as possible with their records before the end of May. Record keeping is an important part o each $4-\mathrm{H}$ members project. If records are not kept up to date, it can be rather difficult and timeconsuming. We hope to have all records up to date before the summer work, such as Clothing workshops and Dress Review, begins.
