Next Wednesday, Jan. 31, is the last day you can pay your poll tax for 1962. For your convenience Tax Assessor-Collector O. B. Jacobs will have a deputy at the First National Bank in Bronte today and tomorrow. Be sure to pay your poll tax. You know in advance that this will be an important political year, because of the precinct, county, district and state elections. Then, you never know what else may come up, to be decided by qualified voters.

In addition to the biennial election this year, the annual elections for places on the city council and school board will be held in April.

You won't have any say in any of these matters unless you have a poll tax receipt.

#### Qualifications for Voting

In order to vote in the upcoming elections the following qualifications are required:

Be a citizen of the United States.

Be at least 21 years of age.

Be a resident of Texas one year next preceding election.

Be a resident of county six months next preceding election.

Be a resident of the precinct in which vote is cast.

Have a poll tax receipt or exemption certificate. (Over-age exemption certificate not required in cities of less than 10,000 population).

They are designed to end the disastrous flooding which has done millions of dollars worth of damage to the City of Bronte and the surrounding rural area. Cost of the six structures is estimated to cost more than \$1 million.

## 48 Coke Firms Listed in 1962 Dun & Bradstreet

A. J. Hemphill, district manager of the Fort Worth office of Dun & Bradstreet, Inc., recently announced statement requests were mailed to businesses in Coke County. He said figures obtained from a physical count of the Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book for January, 1962, totaled 48 manufacturers, wholesalers, and retailers in this area.

Hemphill stated that business concerns in all parts of the United States are asked by Dun & Bradstreet for copies of their financial statements. This year requests are being sent to approximately three million business concerns — to the small store worth a few thousand dollars as well as to businesses worth millions.

The Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book lists those manufacturers, wholesalers, and retailers who seek or grant commercial credit, but it does not include some of the service and professional businesses such as beauty and barber shops, security dealers, and real estate brokers. Therefore, the figures for total business in the United States would be higher than the three million quoted above.

During the past year, Hemphill added, 41 changes were made in the Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book listings of Coke County businesses, including 12 names added, 14 names deleted, and 15 changes in the ratings of continuing businesses. The changes occurring in Coke County are about even with the rest of the country, where a change of business significance is counted about every five seconds.

When the owner or officer of a business enterprise fills in and mails his financial statement to Dun & Bradstreet, it becomes part of the credit report on his business and a factor in determining the credit rating of his business.

Back of each listing of a business in the reference book is a Dun & Bradstreet credit report. The report includes the following: a history of the business (who owns it, who runs it, and how long it has been operating); a description of what the business does and how it does it; a financial section which usually includes the latest financial statement; and a record of how the business pays its bills.

## County Agents News Column

Several dozen named cotton varieties are offered for sale in Texas, and the cotton producer's success may be greatly influenced by the variety he selects.

To provide the producer with information that will help him make the best choice, the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station has been actively engaged in the testing of cotton varieties for the past 60 years. A recently released bulletin, the fourth in a series of 3-year summaries, summarizes the data obtained from tests con-

ducted during 1957-59.

Because of the great diversity of soil types, climate and production practices in Texas, variety test sites have been established in practically all land resource areas of the state. The entries included in the various tests differed from year to year, although certain designated varieties were included in all years to provide a consistent basis for comparison.

Data reported in the new bulletin, B-983, "Performance of Cotton Varieties in Texas," include yield of lint per acre, lint percentage, boll size, staple length and fiber fineness.

In order to present a comprehensive summary of varietal performance, the data have been summarized for various cotton production areas in Texas. These areas are closely related to the land resource areas of the state, although certain production areas have been combined. The area summaries given include only those varieties which were grown at all locations.

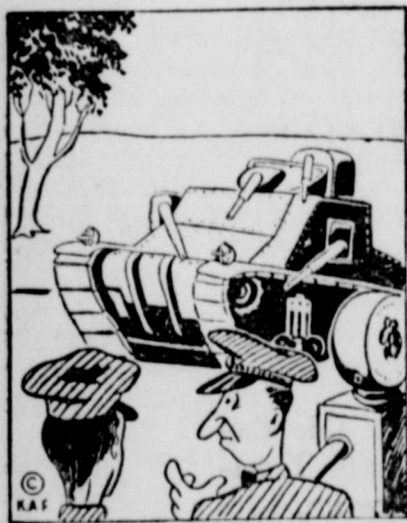
