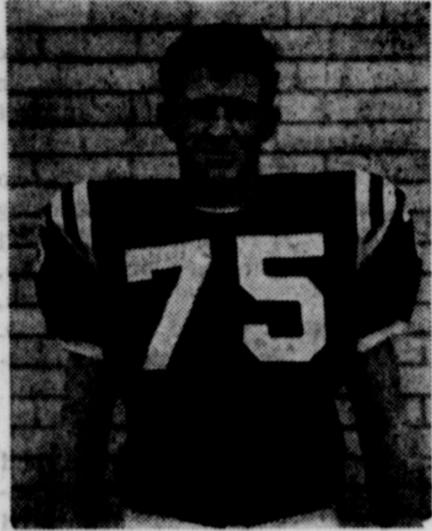

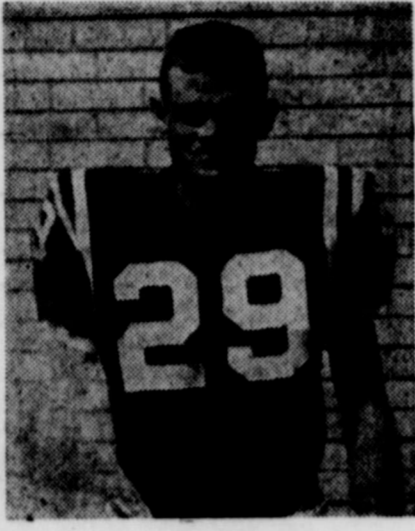

Arrott, Corley Sign with SMU

Jack Corley and Dee Arrott, standout Longhorn football players the past three years, have signed pre-enrollment applications with Southern Methodist University in Dallas. The two Longhorns were approached by several other schools, but both decided on SMU. Arrott is a side-stepping tailback and Corley played tackle on offense and guard on defense.

Both Corley and Arrott were on the District 5-B all-district team selected after the 1961 season. They were also both picked on the Abilene Reporter-News and San Angelo Standard-Times all area teams.

Both of the future SMU Mustangs tower above six feet tall. Corley weighs close to 200 pounds

Arrott's 1961 season didn't pile up any records for the outstanding Longhorn back, as he was out of the lineup a lot of the time with a knee injury. In the games in which he played, however, he was an outstanding yardage and point maker, and was the spark plug of the Longhorn offense.

Corley's 1961 performance was an inspiration to all his fellow players. He racked up 146 unassisted tackles, better than 12 per game during the past season. Nobody knows how many holes he opened up for the Longhorn offense.

Coach Bob Howard said that one or both of the Bronte players had received offers from Texas University, TCU, Texas Tech, Baylor, Arkansas, A&M, Tennessee and West Texas State, in addition to SMU.

Arrott and Corley will receive 4 year scholarships to the Dallas school. They will sign completed contracts later in the year, after school boy sports are completed for 1962.

Arrott and Corley are cousins, and both are cousins of Benny Corley, outstanding former Longhorn, who now does the punting chores for Baylor.

Hayden Fry, former head coach at Baylor, has assumed that same position at SMU. He is reported to have been deeply impressed with the ability and aggressiveness of the latest two additions to his 1962 freshman squad. Fry made his judgment of their ability from films made of Longhorn games.

Effort Asked in Screw Worm Control Program

Stockmen and sportsmen of Texas and the Southwest have been requested by the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation to "pull all stops" immediately in their drive to control and possibly eliminate the costly screw-worm.

J. O. Rudd, chairman of the Coke County Screwworm Control Program Committee said he had been advised by the Foundation's Board of Trustees that the long-sought goal of a screwworm-free Southwest would be a possibility for 1962 if full advantage is taken of the hard freeze of two weeks ago which dealt the flesh-eating parasite a very crippling blow.

Rig Purchased By Local Firm

An oil well drilling rig was recently purchased by Karl Hoblitzelle and Ronald R. Perkins of Dallas for use in their operations in this area.

According to Royce Lee, a local representative of the firm, the new equipment consists of a Bethlehem SS-55 drilling rig, powered by two twin GMC Diesel engines. The derrick is a 127 foot Lee C. Moore structure.

February is Heart Fund month. Proceeds go to the Heart Association and its affiliates and chapters for research into diseases of the heart and blood vessels. Officials of the organization point out that these diseases are the Nation's Number One health enemy, accounting for 54 per cent of all U. S. deaths.

The association carries out a year-round program of research, education and community service to combat these diseases. According to a recent report more than 65 million heart fund dollars have been invested in research since 1948.

Local residents are urged to give generously when approached by a Heart Fund volunteer worker.

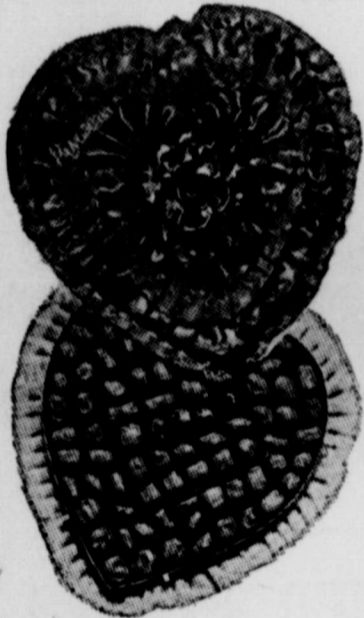
