
An angle for you to consider when you decide how much to contribute is a comparison in fire insurance rates. We bothered Mr. and Mrs. E. F. Glenn long enough this week to get some comparisons on rates in Bronte and Robert Lee. For insurance purposes, Bronte is considered an unprotected town; Robert Lee is classed as a protected town. The various factors involved in setting the key insurance rate in the two towns gives Bronte a key rate of 93 cents, while Robert Lee has a key rate of 44 cents. In addition to this difference, Robert Lee residents enjoy a 20 per cent credit for their good fire record, while Bronte people have to pay a five per cent penalty because of our poor fire record. 

Mix two envelpoes of unflavored gelatine, 3/4 cup sugar and 1/4 teaspoon salt together thoroughly in the top of a double boiler.

Beat together 2 egg yolks and 1 cup liquefied non fat dry milk (as directed on milk package), or skim milk. Add to gelatine mixture and cook over boiling water, stirring constantly until gelatine is thoroughly dissolved in about

Remove from heat; add 1 teaspoon grated lemon rind; cool.

Stir in 3 cups creamed cottage cheese (24 oz.) sieved, 1 tablespoon lemon juice and 1 teaspoon

vanilla. Chill, stirring occasional- NEWS FROM ly until mixture mounds slightly when dropped from a spoon.

Fold in 2 egg whites, stiffly beaten.

Beat ½ cup ice-cold water and 1/2 cup nonfat dry milk solids together with a rotary beater until stiff and mixture stands in peaks. (This takes about 10 minutes with hand beater). Fold into gelatine

Turn into an 8" spring form pan and sprinkle top with a mixture of 1/3 cup graham cracker crumbs (4 crackers), 1/8 teaspoon cinnamon and 1/8 teaspoon nutmeg.

Chill until firm. Makes 12 servings. 155 calories per serving.




