## Childress Firm Low Bidder on Two Dams

Lyles & Davis of Childress was apparent low bidder Tuesday on two more flood control dams on the Kickapoo Creek watershed north of Bronte. The firm is presently building the first two of six dams to be constructed. The Childress firm's bid was \$123,819.78.

The only other bid was \$135,771.20 from T. L. Free Construction Co. of Earth. Engineers estimate on the cost of the two dams was \$125,478.00. The bids opened Tuesday were for dams at sites 3 and 6.

Site 3 is located on the Edward Rawlings ranch, while site 6 is on property of Mrs. Edna Butner. The latter structure will back water up the creek on the Tad Richards estate and on Mrs. Irene Morrow's land.

Lyles and Davis have just about completed work at site 1, on the Barton Waldrop property, and are expected to complete site 4, on W. D. (Pete) McDonald, within 60 days.

## Rev. Neely New Lions Club Boss

Rev. Auburn S. Neely, pastor of the First Methodist Church, was installed as new president of the Bronte Lions Club in installation ceremonies last Thursday. The installation was held at the regular meeting of the club at the Methodist Church.

Other officers installed included: H. O. Whitt, secretary-treasurer; J. A. Percifull, first vice president; Linton Crow, second vice president; C. E. Bruton, third vice president; Bob Wilson, tail twister; Joe Wolf, Lion Tamer. New two year directors are W. D. (Pete) McDonald and W. E. Jacoby. T. F. Sims is a holdover director, and J. T. Henry was elected to a one year directorship, succeeding E. F. Glenn, who resigned the position. D. K. Glenn is also a new member of the board of directors by virtue of his office as chairman of the crippled children's program in Bronte. His position is a new office in the Lions Club set-up.

A spokesman for the local Lions Club said a busy year is in prospect for the group. The Lions Club is the only men's service organization in Bronte. Meetings are held in the fellowship hall of the Methodist church, with members of the WSCS serving the meal.

## Charles Oliphant Off to Indonesia

Mr. and Mrs. Charles Oliphant and boys of Houston arrived in Bronte last week for a visit with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Modgling. Mrs. Oliphant and boys will make their home with the Modglings for about six months while Mr. Oliphant is employed in Indonesia.

Mr. Oliphant is a spring graduate of the University of Houston and has accepted employment with an oil company and will help with the development of an oil field in Indonesia. He left Bronte Sunday for San Francisco, where he will train for a week, then fly to Singapore.

The dams are being constructed with federal funds, after a survey showed that millions of dollars worth of damage had been done in this area from the rampaging creeks during the last several years. Money to make the survey was taken from county tax money.

The project took many years of work by many people, and was pushed from the beginning by the Bronte Lions Club. Supervision of the project is handled through the Soil Conservation Service, working with the water district.

## Bronte Firms to Close for July 4

Most Bronte business firms will close for a holiday next Wednesday, July 4. So far as The Enterprise has been able to determine, the only businesses that will be open are service stations and cafes.

Included in the list of places which will close are the post office and bank, whose holidays are set by federal regulations. The city hall will also be closed.

The Enterprise and possibly the Cactus Cafe will probably be the only firms open on Main Street. Since the holiday falls on the newspaper's press day, employees of The Enterprise will take Friday, July 6 for a holiday.

Mrs. Dolan Mackey, owner of Betty's Beauty Shop, announces in this paper that her shop will be closed the first part of next week, opening again Thursday, July 5.

Kemp's Cleaners will be closed for a week beginning July 9 and ending July 14, according to Cecil Kemp, owner. The week will be used for a vacation.

## Spotted Showers Fall in This Area

Reports on showers Monday night and Tuesday gave Bronte a half inch of rain. Some reports from outlying communities showed a heavier fall of moisture.

A cloud Monday night dumped about an inch south of Bronte in the Tennyson area. Further east, in the Brookshire community, J. W. Caudle reported an inch of rain.

Oak Creek Village, south of Blackwell, had a reading of .8 on the rain gauge.

Clouds south and southwest of Bronte Wednesday afternoon gave some basis to believe the weather man, whose Wednesday report was "possible widely scattered showers."

## City Hall Bond Election Called

### Bronte Councilmen Issue Statement On New City Hall

To The Citizens of Bronte:

The City of Bronte is in dire need of a new City Hall and Fire Station. The Council has investigated the possibility of incorporating the two into one building along with some other much needed facilities consisting of office space for the Justice Court, Deputy Sheriff, and Department of Public Safety. The County Sheriff's Department and Department of Public Safety were enthusiastic about the plans, but requested that two "hold-over" jail cells be included. Plans were re-drawn and presented to the Commissioners Court for the purpose of renting office space and the jail cells. The vote was unanimous and recorded in the minutes as such for the County to pay the city a monthly rent not to exceed \$100.00 dollars per month for the above space.

After considering several finance plans it was recommended by Mr. Jack Brown and Mr. Louis Gayor of San Angelo that the best and most economical way would be by voting a bond issue for \$18,000.00. Payments on this bond would average \$1,394.20 per year, leaving about \$400.00 dollars the city would actually be spending each year after deducting the rent payments from the County.

It is the opinion of the City Council that we will probably never have another opportunity to secure a City Hall and Fire Station at such a small investment and cost to you, the tax payers. This bond can be paid without any additional taxes being levied.

Bronte's city council passed a resolution at a meeting Monday night calling an election to vote on bonds for building a new city hall. Amount of the issue as set forth in the notice of election is not to exceed \$18,000.

The proposed new structure will be 80 by 27 feet and will contain offices for law enforcement officials, the city secretary and justice of the peace. In addition, the center part of the building will have parking space for two fire trucks. Two holdover jail cells, a meeting room, rest rooms and a small kitchen make up the remainder of the building. The city owns a site immediately north of the post office, and it is proposed to erect the building there.

Coke County has agreed to pay the city \$100 per month rental for offices for a deputy sheriff and justice of the peace and for the jail cells. This amount, along with the rental now paid for the present city hall, will come close to making payments on the bonds, city councilmen say.

A statement signed by Mayor J. A. Stephenson and all members of the council, setting forth the plan for financing the building is being published alongside this story. The council members say that no increase in taxes will be required to retire the bonds.

Jack Brown, San Angelo investment counselor, told the city dads that he had never heard of a better deal than the agreement the city has with Coke County for retiring the bond issue. Brown also told the council that he is of the opinion that the present tax levy of 40 cents on the \$100 valuation being assessed for retirement of sewer tax bonds can be lowered to 35 cents this year. The sinking fund set up for paying the bonds is sufficiently large to make such a tax reduction advisable at this time, Brown pointed out. The council seems to look on the tax reduction favorably.

Another route which could be taken to finance the city hall would be to issue time warrants to raise the money. No election is required for the city to issue time warrants, but Brown told the council that the interest rate on them would probably run six per cent, while they could probably sell the bonds at 4½ per cent interest. Going the bond route on the financing will save the city considerable interest, he said.

Noah Pruitt Sr. will be election judge. Person living within the city limits who won taxable property and have rendered it for taxation will be eligible to vote in the bond election.

### HELP NEEDED FOR WESTEX BOYS RANCH

Edward Rawlings is wagon boss for Coke County in the annual drive for funds for Boys Ranch, located in Tom Green County. Rawlings said that donations of money or livestock will be most welcome.

Ranchmen and farmers who have animals to donate to the Ranch may contact Rawlings. He will pick them up and take them to a sale where they will go to the highest bidder. No charge is made by the auction companies for selling the animals.

## Subscription Special Starts Mon.

The annual subscription special of The Bronte Enterprise will begin Monday, July 2. A reduction of 50 cents on all subscriptions will be allowed during the month.

expired, the subscriber may take advantage of the cheaper price to extend his paper from its expiration date.

Ben Oglesby, publisher of The Enterprise, said this week that everyone should take advantage of the special, particularly in view of the fact that "we are studying the effect of increased postal rates on our subscription revenue and in all likelihood will increase the regular price on the paper after the July bargain days are over."
