Interest Develops in City, School Politics

Interest has picked up considerably in the forthcoming school trustee election during the past week. A total of five names have been filed for places on the ballot to be used when two board members will be elected.

Names which have been placed on the ballot in the last few days include Jacob Bruce Morrow, Bill Thomas, E. L. Champion and Conda O. Richards. Morrow and Thomas are currently serving on the board and are running for re-election.

Prior to publication of last week's Enterprise, Davey Crockett's name had been placed on the ballot by petition, making the total of five candidates.

The trustee election will be held the first Saturday in April which will be April 4.

Trustees who have additional time to serve on the board are A. E. Bell Jr., Joe Rawlings, James Wells, Horace Taylor and Edward Cumbie.

Contests Develop For City Posts

Contests have developed in the forthcoming city election for the post of mayor as well as for city councilmen.

H. O. Whitt's name has been placed on the ballot by petition this week, to create a contest between him and Royce Lee. Lee's name was placed on the ballot by petition last week.

Petitions have been filed placing four names on the ballot for the three city councilman jobs which become vacant this year. Those petitioned to run are Elmer Hurley, Martin Lee, J. O. Pitts and Billy Joe Luckett.

Luckett is the only candidate who is presently serving on the council. The other two whose terms expire this year are Cecil Kemp and Matthew Caperton.

Present Mayor Norman R. Kiker is not running for re-election. Holdover members of the council are Royce Fancher and C. E. Bruton.

Other candidates who wish to run for council or mayor have until Saturday, March 7, to file. A candidate may file his own name or it may be filed by a petition signed by at least five qualified voters.

The city election will be held Tuesday, March 7, at Bronte city hall with Noah Pruitt Sr. serving as election judge.

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Snake Hunters Coming To Coke This Weekend

A host of visitors are expected in Coke County Saturday and Sunday when the Bronte Jaycees' First Annual Rattlesnake Roundup will be held.

Besides the hunt itself, which will get underway each day at 8 a.m., an exhibition will be held each afternoon in the Stock Show Barn in Robert Lee.

If the crowd is sufficiently large, a snake handling show will be unreel once an hour. Bill Ransburger, noted snake handler of Sweetwater, has been retained by the Jaycees to be in charge of the show. As a special added attraction, Shelly Downs, world-famous reptile specialist of Gainesville, Fla., will be on hand for the two-day hunt and will take part in some of the shows. He told the Jaycees at a meeting Tuesday night that he would bring with him some cotton mouth moccasins and some alligators to use in his exhibitions.

Admission to the show pavilion will be 25 cents for adults and 10 cents for children. This price will entitle visitors to view the hundreds of snakes which will be brought in by the hunters, as well as to see the shows by the two noted snake handlers.

City-Wide Cleanup Campaign Proclaimed for Next Week

A general cleanup for the City of Bronte has been recommended by Mayor Norman R. Kiker and the city council, for next week, March 9 through 14. The mayor has proclaimed that week as Cleanup Week, and urged that all residents of the city participate.

Bronte Lions Club and Jaycees are cooperating in sponsoring the cleanup, and will observe Saturday, March 16, as a special day during the week to assist fellow citizens in cleaning up the town. Special jobs, such as burning

off vacant lots and hauling off trash, will be done during the day. Anyone who is in need of these special services is invited to call City Secretary Mrs. Helen Kirkland, who will make a note of it, and have a working team call at the places where needed. Bronte Volunteer Firemen will also be on hand to assist in burning off vacant lots.

Mayor Kiker, in proclaiming Cleanup Week, said he is hopeful that every resident will take advantage of the week and special

services offered to make his premises look better. "A clean town is a nice looking town," the Mayor said, "and with the cooperation of everyone next week, we will be able to improve the looks of Bronte a great deal."

Sponsors of the cleanup also mentioned that the operation will not only make the city more attractive, but, with warmer weather not far away, a clean town is less likely to have places where disease germs, mosquitoes, flies and other insects can breed.

at Mackey's Feed & Supply or at the Sparks station in Robert Lee. Landowners who wish to have their places hunted should also sign up at one of these two places. A large number of farmers and ranchmen have already signed up.

Prizes of a rod and reel and an engraved plaque will be awarded to the person who catches the longest snake, to the one who captures the shortest snake, to the person who catches the snake with the most rattles, and to the person who captures the largest number of pounds of snakes.

Five rules which have been set up for the roundup are:

1. No guns allowed.
2. Keep all vehicles on existing roads.
3. Hunt only on approved ranches.
4. Use extreme caution in fire prevention.
5. Close all gates at all times.

Bronte Jaycees are working in cooperation with the Coke County Game Management Association in sponsoring the hunt. A committee composed of Otis Smith, C. E. Arrott and Curtis Walker is representing the association. The county agent's department and game warden department are also cooperating with the sponsors.

Wayne Dunnam, president of the Jaycees, said this week that everybody is invited to take part in the hunt and to come to the exhibitions in Robert Lee. "We think this can be worked into a fine thing for Coke County," Dunnam said, "and we are asking for the cooperation of everyone in putting it over in a big way."

Sour Cream Apple Pie

Sift together 2 tbsp. flour and $\frac{1}{4}$ cup sugar
Add 1 unbeaten egg
1 cup sour cream
1 tsp. vanilla
 $\frac{1}{4}$ tsp. nutmeg
Beat to smooth thin batter, add 3 cups apples, diced fine.
pour in unbaked shell. Bake in hot oven about 400 degrees.
Bake for 30 minutes. Remove from oven and top with the following spiced topping:
1 cup sugar
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup flour

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$\frac{1}{4}$ cup butter
1 tsp. cinnamon
Sprinkle well over pie and return to oven and bake 10 minutes at 400 degrees.

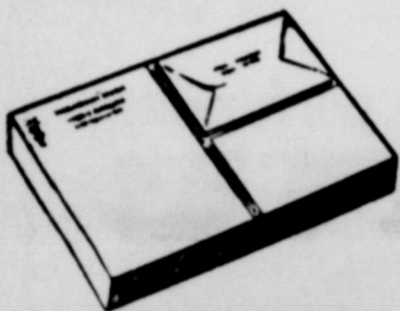
Mrs. Shamblin was driving alone when the accident occurred.

WTU to Reduce Rates Because Of Tax Cut

Savings resulting from the reduction in Federal income taxes will be passed on to West Texas Utilities customers according to plans for system-wide rate reductions announced recently. These reductions in rates will save customers about \$1 million annually, approximately 2.8% at this time. Savings will be greater as electric sales grow, the company said.

Marvin Bryant, WTU local manager, announced that the Company plans to pass on the full benefits of the tax reduction which it will receive under the new tax law. Under the new law the income tax on corporations will be reduced in two steps of 2% each. The corporate income tax will go from 52% to 50% in 1964 and from 50% to 48% in 1965.

"We are giving customers the benefit of both the tax reduction already established for 1964 and the tax reduction scheduled for 1965," Cal Young, WTU President said. "Passing this tax saving on to customers in the form of rate reductions will simply leave the Company with the same rate of return it has been earning."

"Such system-wide rate reductions require extensive study," Young continued. "In addition, after the new rates are designed, considerable work will have to be done to adjust our IBM computer billing procedures to these new rates." Young added, "We expect to have the new rates in effect by mid-summer... probably July or August. Prior to the time the rates are placed in effect, they must be approved by each incorporated city."

"WTU has a unique record for any industry... one of which we are very proud," Young pointed out. "WTU has never raised a rate. Through the years we have consistently reduced the cost of service as plant efficiency and improved operation, together with increased customer usage permitted. This planned rate reduction is a continuation of that long-established policy."

WTU supplies electric service for Bronte and Blackwell and 165 other West Texas towns and communities in 50 counties extending from the Red River to the Rio Grande.

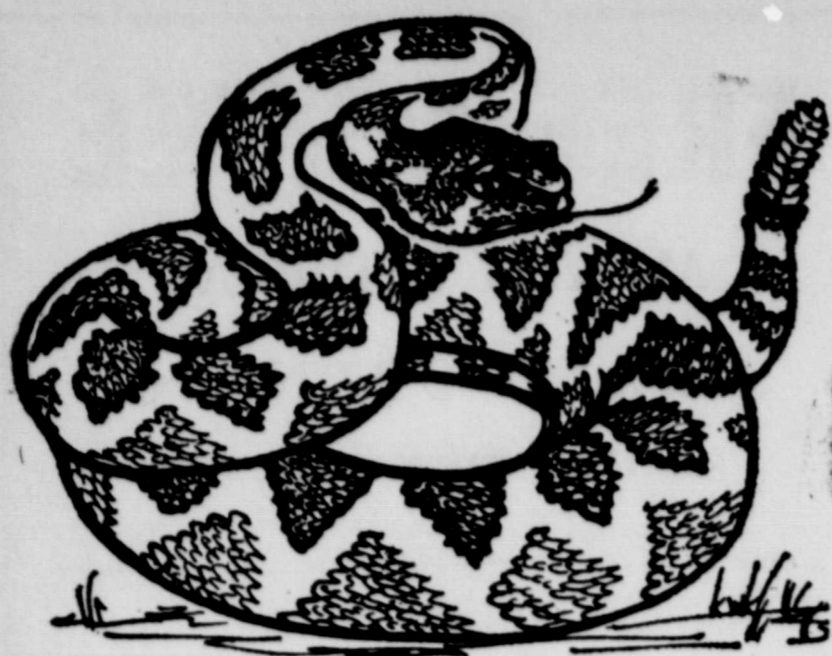
