Five candidates have filed or been petitioned to run for trustee of the Bronte Independent School District. Names which will appear on the ballot are Davey Crockett, Jacob Bruce Morrow, Bill Thomas, E. L. Champion and Conda O. Richards. Two vacancies exist.

Morrow and Thomas are presently serving on the board. The election will be held Saturday, April 4.

Trustees who have additional time to serve are Joe Rawlings, A. E. Bell Jr., Edward Cumble, James Wells and Horace Taylor.

Fifth Candidate Files for Council

Another candidate filed before the deadline last Saturday for a place on the ballot in the forthcoming city council election. Matthew Caperton, presently serving on the council, filed for re-election, bringing the total candidates for councilman to five. Three vacancies are to be filled.

Two candidates were petitioned to run for Mayor. They are H. O. Whitt and Royce Lee. They are running for the position presently held by Mayor Norman R. Kiker, who is not seeking re-election.

Candidates for councilman who had filed or been petitioned before last week's Enterprise was published are Elmer Hurley, Martin Lee, J. O. Pitts and Billy Joe Lockett. Lockett is now serving on the council.

Holdover members of the council are Royce Fancher and C. E. Bruton. Cecil Kemp is the other outgoing councilman and is not running for re-election.

Rattlesnake Roundup Attracts Big Crowd

Bronte Jaycees' first annual Rattlesnake Roundup held last weekend was rated by the sponsors and participants as a complete success. Hundreds of local and out of county visitors turned out Saturday and Sunday afternoons for the show at the stock show

barn in Robert Lee.

The Jaycees were disappointed that there were not more hunters, but the local civic group came out all right financially and members were pleased with the support given by local residents.

Four rods and reels and plaques

were awarded as follows: F. R. Smith of Abilene for the longest snake, 60 1/2 inches; Bob Ragsdale, of Blackwell for the snake with the most rattles, 13; Richard Calder of Robert Lee for the shortest snake, 14 inches; and James Calder of Robert Lee for the largest number of pounds of snakes, 160 pounds. Calder's catch was made up of 150 snakes.

Handler Bitten Twice

Only dark spot in the show was when Shellie Downs, noted snake handler of Gainesville, Fla. was bitten twice by a rattler during a "milking" demonstration. He was reported Wednesday to be recovering satisfactorily in a Sweetwater hospital and reports said he hopes to be able to participate in the Sweetwater Roundup this coming weekend.

Between 250 and 300 snakes were captured, a long way from the 1,000 or more that were hoped for. The supply, however, was ample to conduct the shows, and "milking" demonstrations and for visitors to have all the fried snake meat they wanted to eat.

Huge quantities of the snake steaks were sold at 25 cents a piece. One Jaycee said, "they were eating it as fast as we could dress out the snakes and cook the meat."

Bill Ransberger, Sweetwater snake handler, conducted exhibitions of snake handling every hour both Saturday and Sunday afternoons. He was assisted in some of the shows by Downs. The crowds were fairly thin Saturday, but spectators were ganged up around the snake pit four or five deep all Sunday afternoon.

Ransberger's talks and demonstrations were both entertaining and informative, as he showed how to handle the reptiles safely and told of their habits and traits. Other interesting aspects of the show were watching Ransberger and the Jaycees dress snakes in preparation for cooking, and the "milking" demonstrations. The venom is ejected through the snakes' fangs into sterile bottles and is used in preparing medicines.

The left-over snakes were purchased by Sweetwater for use in getting their show started this weekend.

Concerning the financial results of the hunt and show, Jaycee officers reported this week that all bills are not in and they are not sure of how they came out with the project. However, they did state that the organization made some money.

Wayne Dunnam, Jaycee president, said Tuesday that the organization is well pleased with results of the show. He said, "It wasn't as big as we had hoped for, but we thought it was a success." Asked if he thought the Jaycees would sponsor the roundup and show again next year, he said, "I can't speak for the club, but as for myself, I'm in favor of having it again, for I think it will be bigger and better after having had a show this year."

Dunnam added, "We are grateful to the hunters, workers, all the people who came to our show, and to everyone else who helped us in any way. Without your cooperation, we couldn't have had the show."

Tornadic Wind, Hail Strike Sunday Night

Tornadic winds did considerable damage in the Tennyson, Brookshire, Norton and Wilmethe areas Sunday night. No injuries were reported and most of the damage was to out buildings and articles which were not tied down.

Sunday morning was warm and sunny, with a temperature reaching over 80 degrees just before noon. Twelve hours later, the mercury had dropped almost 50 degrees, hovering around the freezing mark.

Showers developed about 4:30 p.m., but the violent weather didn't move in until some four hours later, when the hard winds hit. In Bronte, the ground was covered with small hail. The hail was accompanied by heavy rain and strong winds. Amount of the moisture here was about .6 inch. A frost Tuesday morning evidently was not heavy enough to kill fruit tree blooms.

Jimmy Wells Wins High Honors with Rambouillet Sheep

Jimmy Wells showed the reserve champion of the Junior Rambouillet Show in San Angelo last weekend. Wells' ewe placed first in the breeding ewe competition and went on to take reserve champion honors in the entire show.

Another of his ewes placed 15th in the same competition, which had 48 entries. A ram showed by Wells placed fifth in the show. The three animals, shown as a pen of three placed fourth in the 18 groups showing and also placed fourth in the breeder-owned show, which had 14 entries. Wells received \$95 prize money on the three sheep, according to J. T. Henry, vocational ag teacher and sponsor of Wells' project.

Jim Morrow exhibited two Herefords in the commercial calf show and received a choice rating on one and a good on the other. He received \$14 prize money. His animals were auctioned at the end of the show.

Both Wells and Morrow are members of the Bronte FFA chapter.

Another Bronte boy, Larry Corley, member of the local 4-H club, won a certificate in the calf scramble entitling him to purchase an animal for a project.

Morrow Breaks Own High Jump Record at Ozona

Jim Morrow did it again. He broke the high jump record at the Ozona track meet last Saturday. The record jump of six feet and one inch broke the record of six feet and one-half inch, which, incidentally, was made in 1963 by the same Jim Morrow. Weekend before last, at Mason, Jim set a new record for that meet when he hurled himself six feet and four inches.

Bronte trackmen amassed a total of 40 points to take fifth place in the meet, in spite of the fact that illness prevented the relay team's entering those events which are heavy point makers.

Weldon Broussard took fifth place in the high jump event.

Royce Lee won second place in the broad jump with 20 feet, one and one-half inches.

In the 220 yard dash, Ronnie Lee won third, while Tommy Glenn Sims was fourth place winner.

Sims came out second in the 100 yard dash while Ronnie Lee came in sixth. Royce Lee also placed fifth in the 440 yard run.

The track team will go to Sonora Saturday for competition with many of the same teams which took part in the Ozona meet. Coaches expect the team to be operating at better strength than last week. The Sonora meet begins at 1 p.m.

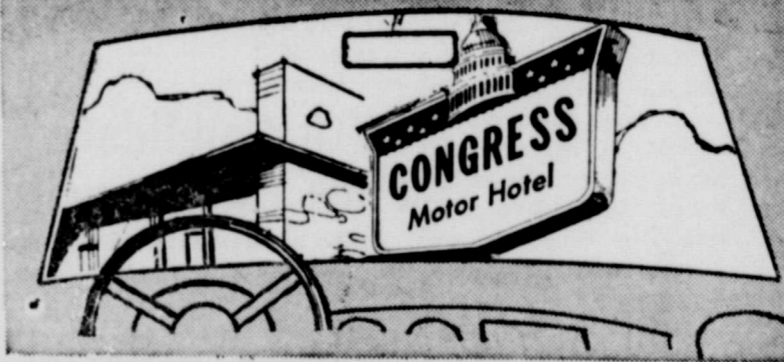

County Agents News Column

We are pleased to be home from the last two weeks and two ventures on the show circuit. But, we can't say the same about our results. We met stiff competition and had to settle for less than we expected.

Among our entries placing at Houston were three lambs in the finewool class. Ronny Varnadore placed 19th, Jay, John and Kathy Service 35th and Edwin Lindsey 50. Also, Ronny Varnadore's registered hampshire buck lamb placed 9th in his class of the breeding sheep show.

James Bird Pentecost placed his three hereford steers shown at Houston, placing 19th in the middle weight; 20th in the heavy weight class of the junior show; and 7th in the heavy weight class of the open show.

The San Angelo Show entries placing were Maxie Evans with his third place middle weight Angus steer; Barbara Blaylock, 7th place group of three range ewe lambs and Jimmy Varnadore, 8th, group of three ewe lambs.

Several other entries were placed in both shows, but did not place high enough to make the premium sale.

In the steer show at San Angelo, Sharon McCutchen placed 7th, James Bird Pentecost 13th and Jo Alice Evans 19th. There were approximately 40 steers in each class. Lambs placing at San Angelo were John Service, 30th, and Buzzy Wojtek, 34th.

Several club members tried their hand at calf scrambling in the two

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shows. Darrell Pitcock, our only entry at Houston, caught a calf and has received a \$150 certificate with which he is to purchase a registered beef heifer.

Two other club members met with success scrambling for project money in San Angelo. Edward White and Larry Corley will both receive certificates on the purchase of a project.

The screwworm picture still looks favorable. Ten weeks have passed since the last case was confirmed by authorities at Mission. The big migration, however, has not started. We cannot be too watchful. This is the key year in the program. If the outbreaks—and authorities do expect some—can be checked early, the program will be over the hill. But, if we fail to report any suspected case,

then the program could lose all the ground gained last year. We must do our part to make the program the success that it can be.

Coke County has been recertified as a modified certified brucellosis area. The recertification period has been extended three years to January 12, 1967. As you know we had been recertified as Tuberculosis free for a six year period.

A ton of manure is worth about \$5.00 in its ability to produce crops, the authorities say. The average nutrient content of manure is 10 pounds of nitrogen, 5 pounds of phosphate, and 10 pounds of potash per ton. Manure is usually worth more when it is spread at a light rate of about 5 tons per acre.

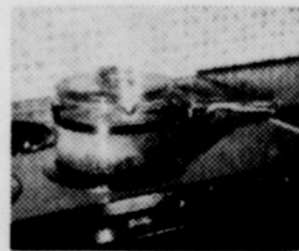

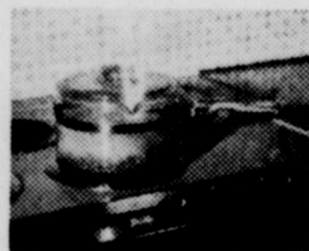
