Notes On Canning Meat

For a number of years home demonstration agents have confined their beef and pork canning to the season from October 1st to March 30th, according to a ruling from A. & M. college. These meat canning instructions have been sent out from Extension Service for use in drought areas to prevent further loss of animal or loss of weight of animals without pastures or feed.

This summer there is an emergency for summer meat canning. Because we must take every precaution to secure high quality products and to avoid loss of same, and to avoid possible results of poison, it is necessary that these instructions be followed.

A man's home is his castle and as long as he and his family alone are concerned he can do very much as he pleases. But when he turns his home into a factory for manufacturing food to be sold or exchanged, his status changes, and he must have a care for what happens to those people who eat the things produced in his home factory. In other words, he is distinctly responsible for producing and conserving his products in the safest possible manner.

Miss Zetha Melniss and Miss Lala Blair, Extension Specialist have given some time and thought to the conditions regarding the canning of meat in summer and I am quoting from them:

1. If beef or pork MUST be canned in the summer it must be THOROUGHLY COOLED in a COLD STORAGE PLANT. An ice box or home refrigerator is not sufficient.

2. Mr. Roy Snyder made the following recommendation with reference to the cooling of meat:

"a" As a maximum the carcass should be allowed to remain in cold storage for TWO or THREE Days for ripening.

"b" In cases where this length of time is not possible, the following are the MINIMUM PERIODS for an ANIMAL OF 500 POUNDS LIVE WEIGHT: 34 to 38 DEGREES - LEAVE CARCASS IN STORAGE AT LEAST 18 HOURS. 42 to 45 DEGREES - LEAVE CARCASS IN STORAGE AT LEAST 24 HOURS.

Note: if temperature of storage plant is below freezing, the meat should not be frozen.

Politics Perks Up as Second Primary Nears

With the second primary only a week away, interest in politics in Castro county has been slow to materialize but there were evidences of renewed interest this week.

Probably of primary interest locally is the contest between Garland Brown and Bill Burnam to determine Castro county's next sheriff.

Both candidates have been very busy since the first primary in an effort to line up the support given Nolen, Snider and McElroy in the first primary.

Supporters of both men became active this week.

Second in interest is the run-off between Glenn Hickman and Frank Cone for the office of County and District Clerk. Less talk is heard about this race than that for Sheriff but interest is keen nevertheless.

In Precinct No. 4 Andrew Acker and L. O. Norman are staging a vigorous campaign for the place as Commissioner from that precinct.

E. C. Burks, incumbent did not seek re-election and the successful candidate in this race will be the only new member of the Commission the other three having been elected in the first primary.

These three contests are the only county run-offs necessary.

Interest in the Governor's race is becoming stronger daily. There is considerable speculation as to which of the two candidates will get the bulk of the 601 votes polled here for Clint Small in the first primary. No active Hunter organization has been formed here though the Alfred backers have been active for a few days. An Alfred rally is planned here Saturday afternoon.

FATHER OF H C WEBB DIED AT AMARILLO HOME SUNDAY

John William Webb, 75, father of H. C. (Atticus) Webb of Dimmitt, died at 1:35 o'clock Sunday at his home in Amarillo.

Funeral services were held Tuesday morning at Amarillo, where interment was made.

Up until the time of his retirement two years ago, Mr. Webb was New Mexico state manager of the American National Life Insurance company. He had been in the insurance business for 35 years.

No Water Shortage For Dimmitt, Says Manager

FREE WATER!

There is no danger of a water shortage in Dimmitt according to City Manager J. William Webb.

A few towns in the drought area have reported a decreasing supply of water, but the local City well is holding up as well as it ever did, Mr. Webb said.

A few citizens have wondered about the local water supply, fearing that Dimmitt might have a shortage but their fears are unfounded.

City property owners were given a real "break" last week by the City Commission when it was decided to give each water consumer 250 gallons of water free for each tree on their places.

The city dads recognized the danger of losing many of the city's fine young trees unless some action was taken.

Each property owner is urged to take advantage of the offer and not to permit their trees to die for want of water.

The amount used for irrigating trees will be deducted from the August water bill, that is 250 gallons for each tree on the premises. For instance if a property owner had 10 trees he would be entitled to 2500 gallons of water free.

Meat Canning --

remain longer than 12 hours or it will begin to freeze.

3. There are two possible methods of preventing meat from becoming too warm during preparation after it is removed from the cold storage. The first method is to remove from storage one quarter at a time, cut and can it before removing another. The portions of this quarter not being prepared should be kept in the refrigerator.

The second method is less desirable but may be used where no other plan is possible or it may be used in combination with the first method. Cut the meat at the cold storage plant. As each quarter is cut it should be returned to storage and left until all the carcass is ready to be transferred to the home or to the canning plant. Tubs and pans may be lined with clean cloths and the cut portions packed in those, then covered with clean cloths and wrapped in paper, or ducking, or both. This wrapping will exclude the heat while products are being transferred. When the meat reaches the home or the plant all portions not being prepared should be kept in the refrigerator until ready for use.

4. The cans should be thoroughly cooled immediately after removing from the canner. When well or by drant water is warm the cans should be cooled as thoroughly as possible in this. Ice should be added to the final cooling bath. This helps prevent danger from spoilage or over-cooking.

5. All canned foods should be stored in a cool dry place. A temperature of from 50 to 70 degrees is considered best. Well ventilated cellars are excellent for storage of meat and non-acid vegetables.

If you plan to have Home Demonstration Agent assist with meat canning demonstrations during the summer months, please write your agent full particulars of the situation. Before she can give a demonstration or assist in canning of meat during the summer every detail of the above instructions must be complied with. There is extreme danger in the canning of meat during hot weather without thorough refrigeration. And the Extension Service of A & M college urges that meat be canned only in extreme emergency. The danger is not only in a high per cent of spoilage but in serious illness resulting.
