1.5 Inch Rain Gives Area Brighter Look

Thundershowers early Wednesday morning dumped up to 1½ inches of rain in the Bronte area. The heavier part of the fall evidently covered a narrow belt through here, as the measurement was lighter both north and south of town.

Ranchmen were glad to see the

moisture, as pastures have been getting dry during the last few weeks of hot weather and no rain.

The rain started falling about 5 a.m., and about 5:30 a heavy clap of thunder aroused most residents from their sleep. No damage was reported from the nearby electrical bombardment.

The forecast from the San Angelo Weather Bureau for Wednesday a chance for more thunderstorms day and Thursday said there is in the late afternoon.

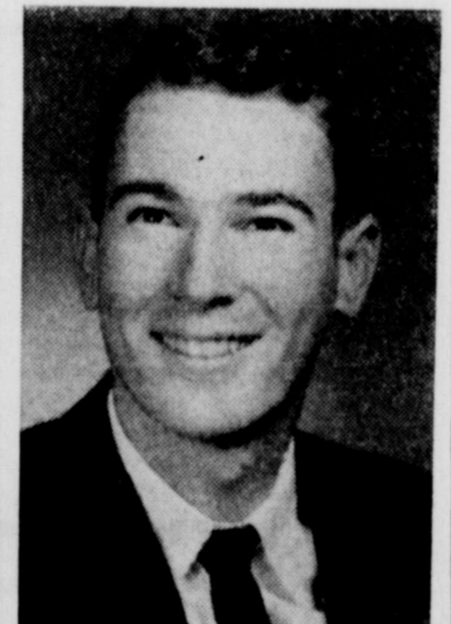

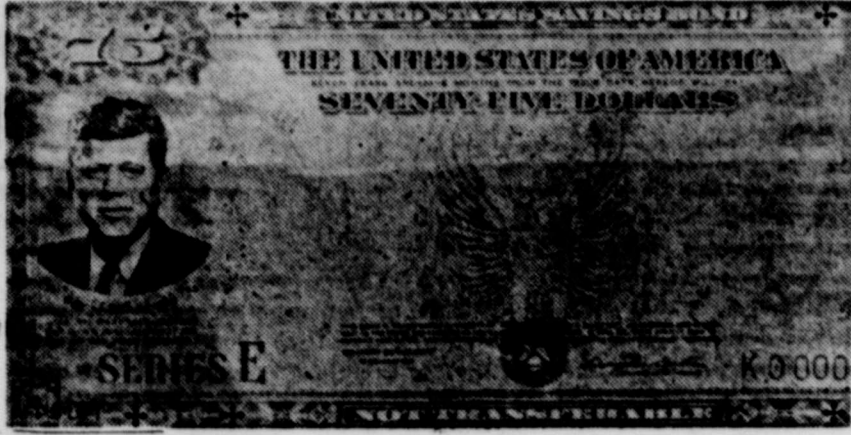

County Agents News Column

Coke County will be represented at the State 4-H Round-Up next week by members of their winning soil judging team. Team members are Gaylon Pitcock, Doyle Robertson, C. L. Sparks and Lynsey White, all of Robert Lee.

The State 4H Round-Up will be held June 2-4, on the campus of Texas A & M University at College Station. The team members, accompanied by County Agricultural Agent, Sterling Lindsey will be entering the State Contest for the second time. They were the fourth place team in the State Contest last year.

The pecan nut casebearer has emerged in this area. From our findings, the peak hatch should have been from Sunday to Tuesday.

It is still not too late to spray. Nearly all of the casebearer larva are still small and in the first nut. Some of the eggs may not have hatched yet, and a late deposit of eggs could be counteracted with an insecticide application now.

The following insecticides have given good control when the timing is right and ample pressure was used; D.D.T., Malathion, sevin, and nicotine sulfate. I would add zinc sulfate to the spray to help combat rosette.

The screwworm cases jumped last week — to 15. This is the high for the year. Counties with their first cases were Llano, Presidio, Real, Edwards nad Crockett. This moves the known cases a little closer to us. The authorities have complimented the operators on their alertness to the situation. We need to continue being alert and avoid any loss of ground.

We are reminded of the back tag brucellosis testing program.

Any operator can recertify his herd by the back tag method and our county can recertify by this method if enough operators participate in the program.

A few Coke County operators have been in to secure back tags. But, the percentage has been small. If you would like to have a supply of tags, drop by to see us. You can recertify by having tested any breeding females you sell that go to slaughter.
