HEARING ON RL DAM SET FOR MONDAY

A hearing will be held in Austin Monday to hear discussions on an application of the Colorado River Municipal Water District for a permit to build a dam on the Colorado near Robert Lee.

Actually the hearing was called to consider a request of CRMWD for an amended permit, as the agency already has a permit to build a dam in Mitchell County. CRMWD is seeking permission to change location of the dam and to alter some dimensions set forth in the original permit.

L. T. Youngblood, a member and former president of the Upper Colorado River Authority, will attend the meeting. Possibly others from Bronte will also attend.

Quite a lot of opposition is expected at the hearing. Rumblyings opposed to the Robert Lee site have been heard from Colorado City, and towns in the area served by the Lower Colorado River Authority. Also some questions have been raised by citizens of Ballinger and San Angelo. General opinion in Bronte seems to favor the Robert Lee site.

Tentative agreement between UCRA and CRMWD will allocate plenty of water in the proposed lake for use of Robert Lee, Ballinger, and Bronte.

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EDITORIAL

Last Monday marked the 23rd anniversary of a momentous event in the lives of many of us. It was on Dec. 7, 1941, that the Japanese Air Force bombed naval and military installations at Pearl Harbor, and set off the greatest example the world has ever seen of man's inhumanity to man.

Many of us didn't realize the effect the terse announcement made on a cool Sunday afternoon would have on our lives. Some of us thought mighty America would be able to polish off her adversaries on short notice. Little did we know that the conflict would not end until four years later.

That day set machinery in motion which would direct that our lives follow many strange paths leading to places we had never heard of before.

Our itinerary covered such famous names as Guadalcanal, Tulagi, Coral Sea, Tarawa, Eniwetok, Kwajalein. For others it meant the long road through North Africa, Italy, Normandy and finally Germany. Others went to the Far East—Iwo Jima, the Philippines, India, China — and many other places.

It was a long arduous road for many; for many others it was short, but final.

Some of the names mentioned above are gradually fading as time passes, and we are doing ourselves, our children and our country a disservice not to keep reminding those younger than we of their meaning in time, blood, tears and toil.

We are neglecting a duty if we do not, at every opportunity, remind each other of the heritage of our time and of the men and women who made it possible—from the Revolution against Great Britain right down to the latest skirmish in Viet Nam.

Perhaps a little more reminding would increase our appraisal of the value of our privileges.

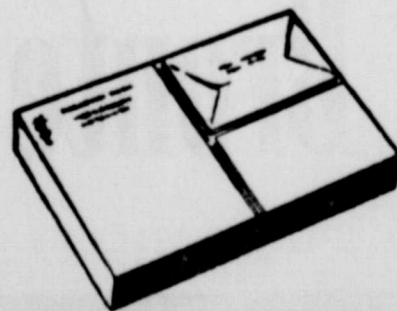

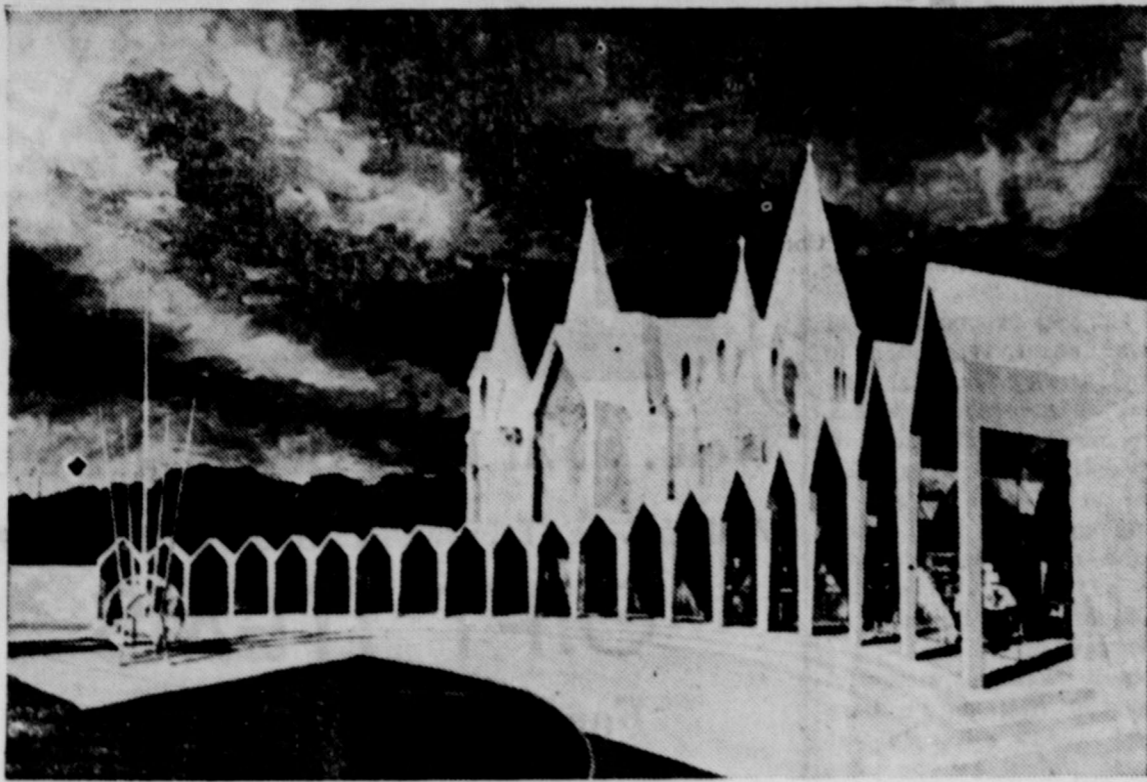

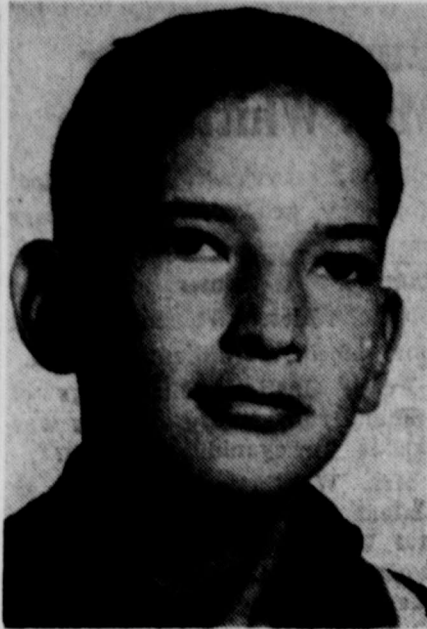

Selecting Christmas gifts for the men on your list may prove exasperating unless one has in mind the type of gift each individual prefers.

Establish a guideline for the men into types, such as business-gift selection by dividing the men, sportsman or the homebody.

The businessman type — whether he's the chairman of the board or a junior executive — is probably loaded with white shirts and a gift of the new smart striped and colored shirts that are correct for daytime wear probably would be a better choice.

This season's cuff links, tie bars and tie tacks are reduced in size and are in many instances reproductions of the classic heirloom sayings that rely on elegance of design and fine workmanship rather than bulk. They'd make good gift choices for the businessman. Warm rich colors so popular this season can add spark without being loud — and tie and socks can be selected in colors to compliment his wardrobe.

Sweaters are always welcomed by the sportsman or outdoorsman. Even if he has one of each type, he can always use one in another color or pattern. Select from big bulky ski-types and fisherman-types, featherweight mohairs and alpacas, muted mixtures and shetlands, or softly shaded wools and cashmeres. Choose from all the new patterns, and remember the look of leather in outer wear, particularly the new easy-care simulated leather of cotton treated with silicone finish.

For the homebody, new fabrics and textures have made gift-giving easy. Host coats in warm, rich colors are good, and robes can be selected from opulent silks, man-made fibers, wools, both flannel and challis, and thick terry cloth.

To avoid disappointments and to assure delivery before Christmas, meet these mailing deadlines: packages for distant points, Dec. 5; out of town cards, Dec. 10; local packages, Dec. 14; local cards, Dec. 15.

For an unusual treat for holiday desserts or unexpected company, make some Meringue Shells now and freeze for later use. They are delicious and unusual.

Meringue Shells

- 3 egg whites
- ¾ teaspoon salt
- ¾ teaspoon cream of tartar
- ¾ cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon vanilla or other extract

Have egg whites warmed to room temperature. Add salt and cream of tartar and beat until mixtures form rounding peaks. Beat in sugar portions of 1 tablespoon at a time and continue beating until sugar is dissolved and glossy peaks form. Shape into cups or any desired form on ungreased heavy wrapping paper or other unglazed paper on a baking sheet. A pastry bag is useful, but not necessary in shaping meringue shells. Bake in a very slow oven (250°F) 30 minutes for soft shells, or bake 1 hour for dry, faintly browned shells. At the end of baking period, turn off heat and allow shells to remain in oven over night or until they are cool. Serve with ice cream topped with fruit, or your favorite sauce; whipped cream, cream fillings, berries or other fruits. Serves 5-9 depending upon size of shells.

The shells may be colored with food coloring for variety and different extracts used. Try red or green shell with peppermint extract.

After shells have cooled, put into freezer type plastic bag, and freeze. Be sure to pack and store where shells will not be crushed or broken.

To crisp and refresh shells, place into warm oven until crisp again. This usually is not necessary unless shells are exposed to moisture.

SEVEN COKE ACCIDENTS DURING NOVEMBER

Seven Coke County accidents were reported for November by the San Angelo Sub-District of the Texas Department of Public Safety. None involved fatalities.

Three of the accidents caused personal injuries and four involved property damage, the total amounting to \$4,790.

In a comparison of the first eleven months of 1964 Coke County seemed to be going far ahead, safety-wise, of 1963. No fatal accidents have occurred in 1964, compared to four deaths by December of 1963. Sixteen personal injury accidents had been counted at this time each year. There have been 34 accidents causing property damage amounting to a total of \$23,498 as compared to 47 accidents with a total of \$43,754 at this same time in 1963.

Total accidents Dec. 1, 1964 were 50 while 67 accidents had

been reported Dec. 1, 1963.

The only gain is 1964 was reported in those injured. Twenty-five persons have been injured in accidents this year while only 18 had been injured at this time last year.

In the thirteen county district, thirty-three persons have been killed so far this year in accidents as compared with 36 at this time in 1963. However total accidents for the entire district are up this year with 847 so far this year and 812 Dec. 1 last year.

The Department also reports that the approaching Christmas-holiday season is the deadliest of the year, trafficwise.
