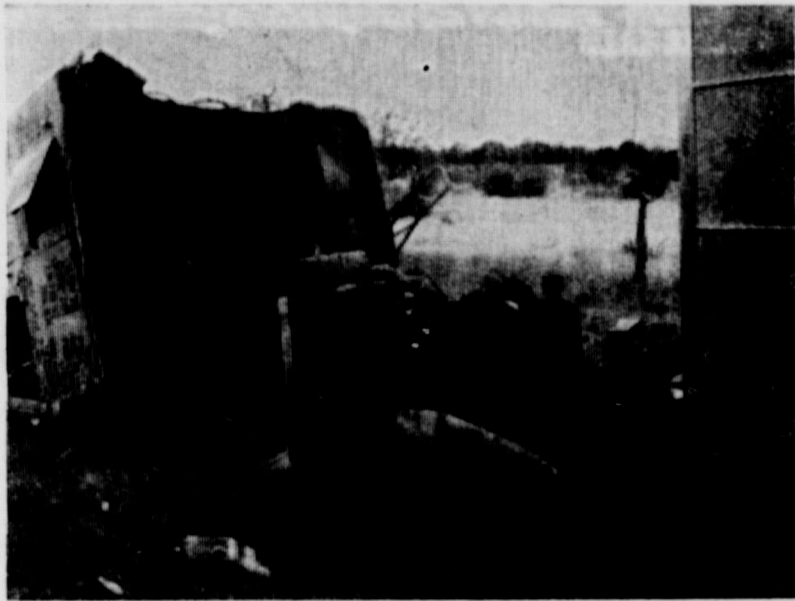

Pickup, Truck Collide; Abilene Man Killed

An Abilene man, 38 year old Junior Clifton Robertson, was killed last Thursday shortly after noon in a grinding, steel-tearing head-on collision between his pickup and a big diesel moving van. The accident occurred about seven miles north of Bronte on Highway 277.

Driver of the truck was Edward Eugene Tallant, 33, of Fort Worth. He was admitted to Bronte

Hospital and treated for shock and minor injuries. The truck belonged to Campbell Moving Co. of Campbell, Calif.

Investigating officers said the collision occurred in the south-bound lane of the highway. The tractor of the big van was demolished, and little except twisted and torn steel was left of the pickup. Engine and transmission parts were scattered over a wide section of the highway.

Mr. Robertsan was an employee of West-Tex Drilling Co. of Abilene. He lived at Fort Phantom Lake. He was born April 6, 1928 in Truscott and was married in 1951 to Camilla Burleson of Abilene.

Survivors include his wife; his father and stepmother, Mr. and Mrs. M. M. Robertson of Graham; one brother and three sisters.

Patrolman Ivey Daniels and Sgt. William Gardner of the Department of Public Safety in San Angelo investigated the accident, assisted by local Deputy Sheriff Jesse Parker.

Evening Lions Receive Charter Tuesday Night

Bronte High School auditorium was the scene of an impressive chartering ceremony Tuesday night which gave birth to a new and second Lions Club. The new club, to be known as the Bronte Evening Club, is the newest Lions Club in the world, according to retiring

District Governor George Thompson of Sweetwater.

Another point brought out by Thompson is the fact that Bronte is the smallest town in the world with two Lions Clubs.

The program in the auditorium followed a barbecue dinner in the

school lunchroom.

Lion Cecil Cox gave the invocation before dinner and after the group moved to the auditorium, Horace Heath, district cabinet secretary, led two songs. Elmer Hurley welcomed visitors. Janet Lee and Bennie Carol Oglesby sang a couple of songs, accompanied at the piano by Suzanne Pruitt. Mayor Royce Lee greeted the group and C. E. Bruton introduced visiting Lions. J. T. Henry served as master of ceremonies.

Thompson then presented the charter to Lion Boss Royce Fancher, who heads the new club. Thompson also introduced Carl O. Hyde, of Midland, past district governor and first vice president of Texas Lions' Crippled Children's Camp, who was main speaker of the evening.

Tom Kirkham, state secretary, presented the new club with a speaker's stand with a Lions emblem on its front. The stand is made out of wood from a number of foreign countries in which Lions clubs are located.

Thompson had a number of gifts for the new club, including a bell and gavel, two banners to hang on the wall of the meeting place, and miniature United States and Lions flags. He presented each of the charter members with a membership pin.

Special awards were presented to J. T. Henry for obtaining a new member for the daytime Lions Club, and to Elmer Hurley for his work in getting the new club organized. Officer pins were presented to President Fancher, Secretary Billy Joe Lockett and Tail Twister Horace Taylor.

Visiting Lions were present from San Angelo, Sweetwater, Midland, Colorado City, Robert Lee, and Stamford.

The recipe I am using this week is one I think you will enjoy as it is quick to make, keeps well and is so delicious.

Fresh Peach Chiffon Pie

- ¾ cup sugar
- 1½ cup chopped fresh peaches
- 1 tablespoon unflavored gelatin
- ¼ cup cold water
- ½ cup hot water
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- ½ teaspoon almond extract
- dash of salt
- ½ cup heavy cream whipped

Add sugar to peaches and let stand 30 minutes. Soften gelatin in cold water; dissolve in hot water. Cool; add peach mixture, lemon juice and salt. Chill until partially

set; fold in whipped cream. Pour into crust; chill thoroughly. Yields one 9-inch pie. Any crust may be used — vanilla cookie, graham cracker or plain pastry.

County Parks Provide Recreation For All Ages

Probably the 66 persons who enabled the 1956 park bond issue to carry didn't know they would provide the means for 150,000 persons to go swimming in Coke County in the first ten years the swimming pools were open.

Up through the end of the 1965 season a total of 147,545 swimmers had used the pools at Robert Lee and Bronte. With the 1966 season well underway, in all probability, the total has already passed the 150,000 mark.

A record number of more than 900 votes were cast at the election which was held April 7, 1965. The proposition passed by a narrow margin of 66 votes. The rural area of Coke County went solid against the issue, but Robert Lee and Bronte cast a large enough majority for the bond issue that it squeaked by.

In addition to providing a first class swimming place in Robert Lee and Bronte, the bond issue provided money for the parks in which the pools are located. Much time, money and effort has gone into making them two of the most beautiful small parks in the state.

Picnic facilities are provided, along with extensive playground equipment, making both parks ideal spots for family gatherings and other recreational activities. In addition to the picnic places provided out in the open, Robert Lee has a community center on its park grounds. The center has been booked solid on weekends for years, during the summer months, for family reunions and such.

No Drownings

With approximately 150,000 users in the pools during the ten years they have been open, no one has drowned. Some fairly close calls have been had, but alert life guards have been able to prevent a tragedy.

Hundreds of persons, mostly youngsters, have received swimming instructions at the pools. Instructors have always been well trained and knew how to teach the

pupils the correct ways of swimming and water safety. In all probability, there are every few young people and children in Coke County who have not had swimming lessons and as a result are able to take care of themselves in the water. This training which will always be useful to those who took advantage of it, would have been impossible without the provision made by Coke County voters in 1956.

County commissioners have used their machinery and road crews in making the parks more beautiful and useful to citizens. Caretakers have added picnic tables, barbecue pits and other structures to make the two county parks just about perfect recreation spots.

Improvements Slated

Special funds from the federal government are now available for use in improving recreation facilities. These funds are available on a matching basis with local funds. Coke County commissioners court is now in the process of working up a plan to submit for approval for this county, in order to make it eligible for these funds.

The commissioners, in a recent meeting made available \$30,000 to be used for improvements in the two parks. This money was still on hand from the original \$130,000 bond issue, inasmuch as only \$100,000 of the bonds were sold and the remainder were retained in county ownership.

The county parks don't even come close to breaking even, as their income during their first nine years

of operation was only \$27,055.47, compared to \$188,155.36 for cost of operation. However, most Coke County citizens feel that it is money well spent to have a place for swimming, picnicking, and playing tennis, volleyball and other games.

Golf, Too

Operated adjacent to the county parks in both Bronte and Robert Lee are nine-hole golf courses. Golf associations in both towns operate the courses, and a large number of out of county golfers have been attracted to them particularly during tournaments which are staged at intervals throughout the year. Many compliments have come from visiting golfers to the Coke County courses.

Present caretakers of the county parks are Lindy Devoll at Robert Lee and Dick Cooper at Bronte. Since the parks were opened, Aubrey Denman was caretaker at Bronte until earlier this year, while at Robert Lee the following men have served as caretakers: R. C. (Buzz) Sawyer, Ralph Garvin, Howard Varnadore and Devoll.

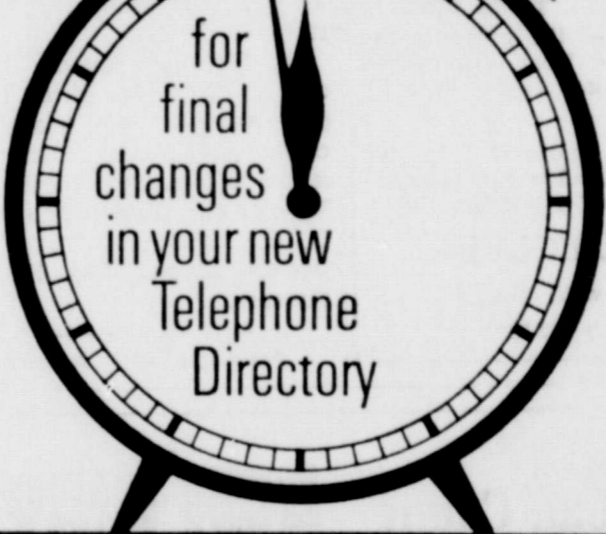

Social Security Reports on Coke

About 453 workers in Coke County's nonfarming businesses earned taxable wages under the old-age, survivors, and disability insurance program, according to the latest edition of County Business Patterns, J. G. Keene, Social Security Assistant District Manager in San Angelo said this week.

Sixty-three reporting units of employers of nonfarm employees covered under the program paid out some \$524,000 in taxable wages in the county during the first quarter of 1964. The report shows four of the employing units reported 20 or more workers each at that time. The largest proportion of employment, 258 workers, was in crude petroleum and natural gas.

The current edition of County Business Patterns is the 11th in a series showing county and industry statistics based on wage reports filed under the Federal social security program. This edition is divided into 53 parts contained in 53 separate books, one for the United States as a whole and one for each of the 50 states, Washington, D. C., and Puerto Rico, (which includes statistics for the Virgin Islands, American Samoa and Guam.)

Reference copies of County Business Patterns may be examined at field office of the U. S. Department of Commerce, at district and branch office of the Social Security Administration and at many public libraries. The complete set of 53 books may be purchased at a cost of \$36.30. Individual books can be obtained at a price ranging from 40c to \$1.75 each. Orders should be sent to the Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington 25, D. C., or to any U.S. Department of Commerce field office.

Rudd to Head Ag. Hall of Fame Campaign in Coke

J. O. Rudd of Robert Lee has been named county chairman in the Texas campaign to build a Texas Pavilion at the Agricultural Hall of Fame at Bonner Springs, Kansas.

The county campaign is one of more than 200 such campaigns planned throughout Texas this summer.

Honorary state chairman is Governor John Connally, who launched the Texas drive in May with a statement and proclamation strongly supporting the national agricultural center.

State co-chairmen are Harold H. Hogue, prominent wheat rancher from Dalhart, and Charles G. Scruggs, editor of The Progressive Farmer, Dallas.

Mr. Scruggs said, "The Agricultural Hall of Fame and National Center is the only institution in the country which is devoted to memorializing the greatness of American agriculture since pioneer days." He explained the National Center is administered by a board of volunteer agricultural and business leaders drawn from every state in the Union and that the center is a private, non-profit, tax-exempt corporation having no government support.

Comprising 275 acres of rolling farm land at one of the highest points in Eastern Kansas, the Agricultural Hall of Fame today has assets of more than \$700,000.

An exhibit hall of 9,500 square feet with an administrative wing of 3,000 square feet were opened to the public last June. A second building will soon be under way which will have more than 18,000 square feet of exhibit area and will be the largest of its kind in the world given over exclusively to the exhibit of antique farm power machines.

One of the more popular attractions at the Agricultural Center, is "Old Tex," a 2000-lb. Longhorn given by the Light Ranch of Cotulla, Tex.

The Texas goal is \$400,000. The Texas Pavilion will represent a gift from the citizens of Texas to all the American people.
