## Hunting Season Starts Saturday

Saturday morning will find a good many hopeful nimrods loose in Coke County, as the season opens Nov. 12 for hunting deer, quail and turkey. Hunters may take to the field 30 minutes before sunrise.

The season remains open on deer and turkey through Dec. 31 and on quail for another month, through Jan. 31.

Antlerless deer may be taken in certain designated areas in the county. A map showing these places is on display in the courthouse. Antlerless deer permits were issued Nov. 9, and hunters must obtain their permits from land owners.

Bag limit is two bucks. Spikes are legal this year, as long as hardened antlers are protruding through the skin.

Limit on turkey is two gobblers or two bearded hens per season, and on quail, it is 12 per day or 36 in possession.

Legal time for hunting is from 30 minutes before sunrise until 30 minutes after sunset.

# Longhorns Too Much For Lions; Take 50-8 Victory

The Bronte Longhorns didn't have too much trouble with the Roby Lions last Friday night, as they tamed the Lions' roar down to a meow and came up with a 50-8 win.

The Longhorns managed to come up with payoff plays in every quarter, while the Lions were held scoreless until a kickoff return carried them about 75 yards, with 2 seconds left on the clock.

Doug McCutchen did most of the quarterbacking, but Keith McCutchen also got in some good practice in handling the ball, in the absence of David Glenn, who was sidelined most of the night recovering from an injury by rough Trent.

Just about everybody got in on the act, with the freshmen getting their best work out of the season.

### First Quarter

McCutchen kicked off to start the contest. With Jacky Knox quarterbacking the Lions, they went from the 32 to the 43, but a fumble was recovered by Bronte at that point.

On the first play from scrimmage, McCutchen went for the first Longhorn TD. A pass play for extras was no good, but it was called back and McCutchen went in on the ground on the second try: Score: 8-0.

Charles Hill was stopped on his

own 1 after scooping up McCutchen's kickoff. The Lions made about 8 yards in three tries, then Knox punted. McCutchen took it on his own 44 and dashed back down field with it. Knox dropped McCutchen on the Roby 1 yard line. It was 14-0.

Hill took the kickoff again and ran it back out to the 28. A bog-down there forced a punt. It took a bad bounce and McCutchen had to chase it back to the 10, from where he went to his 48 before he was pulled down. Masterson made 5, and then he carried again for a 47 yard run and another touchdown. However, luck was not on his side,

as the nice run was called back and Bronte was penalized 5 yards. Keith McCutchen called for a run by Randy Barbee which was good for a couple but an incomplete pass brought up 4th down. Davis Corley punted to Larry Upshaw who was stopped in his tracks by Gary Don Allen.

The Lions made their first 1st down on the next series but could not make a second. Knox had to punt. The Longhorns took over on their 26. Keith McCutchen handed off to Cousin Doug who went for a touchdown, some 74 yards. Try for extras failed, and the score was 20-0.

David Scott kicked off to Bobby Moore, and then tackled him after he made his way to the 45. Moore made 3, then Corley tackled Knox for a loss of 9. A pass play was called, but Brian Richards put the rush on Knox and it fell short. The Lions had to punt, and the Longhorns got off one play before the end of the quarter.

### Second Quarter

With a 2nd and 6 on the 24, Barbee went 11 yards for a 1st, and then scampered 13 more to the 48 for another. A fumble on the next play was recovered by Calvin Jones on the 50 for the Lions. Brown

**Real Progress Made On School**

Real progress has been made in the past several days on the building program at Bronte School. Supt. C. B. Barbee said this week that he is well pleased with the showing which has been made.

He said all hardwood floor work in the new gym should be completed by Friday, and terrazzo floors will be poured this week and polished next week. Asphalt tile floors are yet to be laid.

Plumbers and electricians are about finished with their work, and painters are still busy, but can see the end of their work. All ceiling frames have been completed and laying the ceiling should go at a rapid pace. Cabinet work is also about completed.

All roofing work was completed this week, including a new roof on the old gymnasium building.

Barbee said school officials want to have an open house and dedication program as soon as practicable, after the new building is occupied. Stating that activities will be going at a full pace from now until after the first of the year, the superintendent said he felt that Public School Week, March 6-11, might be a good time to plan the special program. Further announcements will be made as plans develop.

**TODAY IS DEADLINE FOR SOME VIETNAM MAIL GIFTS**

Postmaster Noah Pruitt Jr. of Bronte today announced that henceforth all first class mail, personal sound recordings (voice letters), and parcels weighing 5 pounds or less and measuring not more than 60 inches in length and girth combined, will be airlifted on a space available basis between the United States and all military post offices overseas.

Also, under public law 89-725, which was signed by President Johnson on Nov. 2, second class publication such as newspapers and magazines published weekly or more often, and featuring current news of interest to the military, will be airlifted from San Francisco to the armed forces serving Viet Nam.

Pruitt explained that parcels weighing five pounds or less and not exceeding 60 inches in length and girth combined, paid at surface rates, will be moved by surface transportation within the United States from the points of mailing to the port of embarkations.

Parcels weighing five pounds and other, though they are given airlift priority from San Francisco to Viet Nam on a space available basis, should be mailed no later than Dec. 1. Airmail should be sent no later than Dec. 10. Deadline for Christmas packages weighing more than 5 pounds going to Viet Nam and other overseas military post offices by surface means, is Nov. 10 (today).

Barbee made 6 and McCutchen tossed a pass to Corley for a 1st on the 28. After picking up another 1st on the 14, McCutchen passed again to Corley for a TD. McCutchen went through the middle for extras and the score was 28-0.

The kickoff went to Upshaw and after three tries Knox was faced with a 3rd and 4. He tried a pass but Barbee took a slap at the ball just before it got to the receiver, so Knox had to punt. It was fielded by McCutchen on the 42.
