About 20 Bronte men were present Monday night for a meeting to discuss future water needs of the city. The group agreed unanimously that immediate action should be taken to determine the feasibility of building a dam 4.6 miles south of Bronte on Live Oak Creek.

Dr. Elwin Skiles To Lead Revival At First Baptist

A week long revival meeting is scheduled at First Baptist Church in Bronte, beginning Sunday, July 30, and continuing through Sunday, Aug. 6. The special services will be held both morning and evening, with the Rev. Dr. Elwin L. Skiles, president of Hardin - Simmons University in Abilene, doing the preaching.

John R. McLaughlin, Associate for the Church Services Division, Baptist General Convention of Texas, will be in charge of singing.

The Rev. Harry L. Morris, pastor, said that services will be held each day at 7 a.m. and 7:30 p.m., except that no Saturday services are scheduled. Sunday schedules will remain as usual, 11 a.m. and 7 p.m.

Dr. Skiles has been president of Hardin - Simmons since April 3, 1966. Prior to that date, he was pastor of First Baptist Church in Abilene. He has also served as pastor of churches in Russellville, Ky., Richmond, Va., Georgetown, Ky., and Pensacola, Fla. During World War II, Dr. Skiles was a Navy Chaplain. He has conducted two world tours for young people.

He was born in Callahan County and graduated from Cisco High School, after attending Hardin - Simmons two years, he went to Baylor University where he received his bachelor's and master's degree. He also holds master's and doctor's degrees from Southern Seminary.

At the request of the Foreign Mission Board, Dr. Skiles preached in a six weeks evangelistic crusade in the Far East in 1960. Services were conducted in Hong Kong, the Philippines, Japan, Taiwan, Vietnam, Indonesia, Thailand, Singapore and Hawaii.

McLaughlin's work is in promotion work in Sunday School, Training Union, church music and Brotherhood work among the Latin American congregations in Texas.

He holds a bachelor of arts degree from Hardin - Simmons and Bachelor of Sacred Music from Southwestern Baptist Seminary; also a diploma from Instituto de Idioma Espanola, San Jose, Costa Rica. He has served as director of music and education in churches at Lufkin, Corpus Christi, Mineral Wells, San Antonio and Abilene.

Morris said that everyone is invited to come and hear the preaching during the revival. "We have two men to help us who are outstanding in their fields, and I know everyone will be pleased to hear them and will receive a blessing from attending the services," he said.

Reserve Seats Now On Sale

Barbee said that anyone who wishes to reserve his same seats should contact the superintendent's office before the deadline.

pointed a committee to work on future water needs of the city and area. Committee members are L. T. Youngblood, J. L. Brunson, Clyde Lee, Royce Fancher, and D. K. Glenn, along with city council members, Horace Grigg, Martin Lee, Bill Clark, Marvin Bryant and Cecil Kemp

There was no question by anyone present that a water study should be made and an effort put forth at once toward securing more water for future growth of the area.

Mayor Lee said at the beginning of the meeting he wanted to make it clear that Bronte has no immediate problem of supplying the city's needs. "This study in my opinion," he said, "should be directed toward what we will need five, ten or 20 years from now."

The site on Live Oak Creek is located on property owned by Ralph Lewis, a resident of Arizona. Those present at the meeting who are familiar with the site were optimistic about its possibilities. They pointed out that the location is a natural for location of a dam, and that the creek at that point has a large watershed, most of which is pasture land.

The group okayed extending an invitation to the engineering firm, Freeze, Nichols and Endress of Fort Worth to have a representative at the next meeting of the committee, with a possibility of retaining this firm to do engineering work on the project. Lee said he expected to call another meeting within the next two weeks.

Local Water Usage Increasing After Recent Rainfall

Bronte residents were approaching the 400,000 gallons per day mark in water usage just before the rains of last week. Bill Luckett, water superintendent, said that he pumped 382,000 gallons one day, but since the rain, water users have limited their consumption to about 200,000 gallons per day.

Luckett said Monday that the demand was gradually increasing again, however, and he looked for it to approach 400,000 gallon mark again unless more rain is forthcoming.

Luckett said he has a report on the purity of samples of Bronte water collected recently. Four samples sent in to State Health Department laboratory were reported to be free of harmful organisms. Samples were collected at Creek Texaco Station, City Cafe, McShan's Snack Bar and the residence of Taylor Emerson.

Leaky Valves Expensive

A leaky faucet or commode can cost a water user considerable money, Luckett pointed out. He cited one example where a customer had been using 5-6,000 gallons a month, but a leaky commode valve pushed a monthly reading up to 37,000 gallons.

"If any of our customers feel their bills are too high, they would do well to check leaky faucets and commode valves," the water man said.

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Elmer Hurley Writes of Experiences Of Bronte Delegation at Convention

Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Hurley and Melody and Mr. and Mrs. Martin Lee attended the Lions International convention in Chicago early in July. The Enterprise asked Mr. Hurley to write an article telling about their trip and his impressions of the convention. He wrote the following:

It was with great excitement and anticipation that Mr. and Mrs. Martin Lee and Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Hurley and Melody left for Chicago on July 4 headed for the Lions International convention. Usually the anticipation is greater than the experience, but this trip was different. The world wide fellowship and the international touch of Lionism was so much more than we ever expected it to be. Seemed like everyone you saw just tried to see how friendly he could be. There were 78 of us in a group who left by plane from Dallas. A happier and more jovial group you have never seen. There was never a complaint from a single person, ages from 14 to 70.

The Texas Lions breakfast was held Thursday morning at 7:30. There were about 600 people present for it. This was a real treat and we had a jazz band plus other excellent entertainment. Texas own Dave Evans, first vice-president, participated as did past presidents Herb Petry, Jr. and Judge Julian Hyer from Dallas.

Politics for third vice-president was the most exciting element of the convention. Too much background would be required to tell it all, but the Texas delegation defeated the whole international cabinet, with a few exceptions. Thanks to great Lions like R. A. Lipscomb, Herb Petry, Jr., Julian Hyer, David Evans and our own past governor George Thompson, the end result was 3,724 to 3,053 in favor of Dr. Bob McCullough from Tulsa, Okla. You should of seen me carrying a picket placard on the sidewalk in front of the Palmer House hotel and handing out Dr. Bob circulars just like any other 'demonstrator'.

Another highlight of the convention was an address by Secretary of State Dean Rusk. He was interrupted by three 'peaceniks' who were very quickly disposed of after being pummelled by many of the 15,000 Lions present for one of the morning business sessions. Dean Rusk made an outstanding address on our stand in Viet Nam and was given a great ovation by all present. His speech was instantaneously translated into 12 languages for those non-English speaking people present. We are convinced it is not people at war with each other, but governments.

The International Show was an outstanding event of entertainment. Narrators were Ray Sherer and Martin Argronsky, famous TV news commentators. Others on the show were Herb Shriner, Rosemary Clooney, Russell Algair (10 year old blind boy who played the piano like a professional) and the Purdue University Choir. Herb Shriner was simply hilarious with his dry comedy.

Over 50,000 Lions and wives were present for the convention parade on Wednesday morning. It started at 9:30 and lasted until 3:30 with over 170 entries, over 40 beautiful floats, 70 high school bands including one from a school for the blind. Color was added with the presence of Miss America, Jane Anne Jayroe.

Another exciting event was

the presentation of the flags from all the 137 countries and geographical locations where Lionism exists. This was done under the supervision and narration of David Evans. It was hard to hold back the tears when "Old Glory" as carried down last by a marine color guard with all the lights out except a spot light on the guard carrying the flag with the Star Spangled Banner being played. It made us proud to be Americans.

There were 45 hospitality rooms where all kinds of nice gifts were given away by the different states and countries. These were very interesting for the ladies. You should see what Janet, Melody and Patricia brought back with them. We thought we would need an extra plane.

All in all the Martin Lees and the Hurley's had a marvelous 4th of July trip. We assure you many, many more people know about Bronte, Texas than ever before. We are very grateful for the opportunity we had of representing Bronte and we look forward to going to Dallas in 1968 to the next Lions International Convention, God willing.

Getting Good Peachy Flavor

Fresh fruit pickings are real peachy this summer.

Taste - tantalizing fresh peaches are likely to be available several weeks yet, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture. And you can get the best in peach flavor by selecting fresh peaches with care.

Most peaches are picked at the "firm - ripe" stage since they are so delicate and easily bruised. For the finest flavor, however, tree - ripened peaches cannot be matched. Some growers sell tree - ripened fruit at the orchard, and some even allow the customer to pick his own. This is an ideal way to buy for canning or freezing.

Whether you buy at the orchard or in a city market, you can get good flavor by carefully observing the skin color of the fruit. Always check the background or "ground" color of the skin. It may vary from a creamy white to a deep golden yellow, depending upon variety, but it should never be greenish. Peaches picked too green have poor flavor, and they never ripen - they just shrivel and become leathery and unusable. Never test firmness with fingers. Just a slight pressure or pinch results in a flesh bruise.

For fresh eating, sort and use the ripest peaches first. Ripen those that are unripe at room temperature, away from direct heat or sunlight. Store ripe peaches in a single layer on the coldest shelf of the refrigerator. It's best to prepare fresh peaches just before you are ready to use them. If they must be sliced a little ahead of time, sprinkle slices with lemon or lime juice to prevent darkening.

You'll need 1 egg yolk, rind of 1 lemon, juice of 1/2 lemon, 1 tablespoon butter or margarine, 1/2 cup light corn syrup, 1/4 cup sugar and 1 cup whipping cream, whipped. Blend egg yolk, sugar, lemon rind and juice. Stir into corn syrup. Put into heavy saucepan and bring to boil, stirring constantly. Boil 2 minutes. Stir in butter or margarine. Chill until thick (about 2 hours). Just before serving, fold into whipped cream and spoon over fresh sweetened sliced peaches.

Info Due On Coke Poverty Program

More information on the anti-poverty program for Coke County is expected in the next few days, according to County Judge W. W. Thetford. He called the Tom Green County Community Action Council office Monday and was told by the director, J. O. Stinnet, that details of the program should be available soon.

The San Angelo office has been designated as district headquarters for a large area of West Texas, including Coke County. The Office of Economic Opportunity recently approved a grant of \$271,257 to set up the program in this area.

An appreciable amount of the grant will be used to make a study of the area to determine just what type programs are needed, and for setting up offices in each county which shows a need and requests the aid.

The money will be divided among all the counties involved on a basis of the number of residents who qualify because of low income.

Judge Thetford told this newspaper Monday that he was in favor of pursuing the project for Coke County "as long as there is a chance for securing help for any of our people who need it."

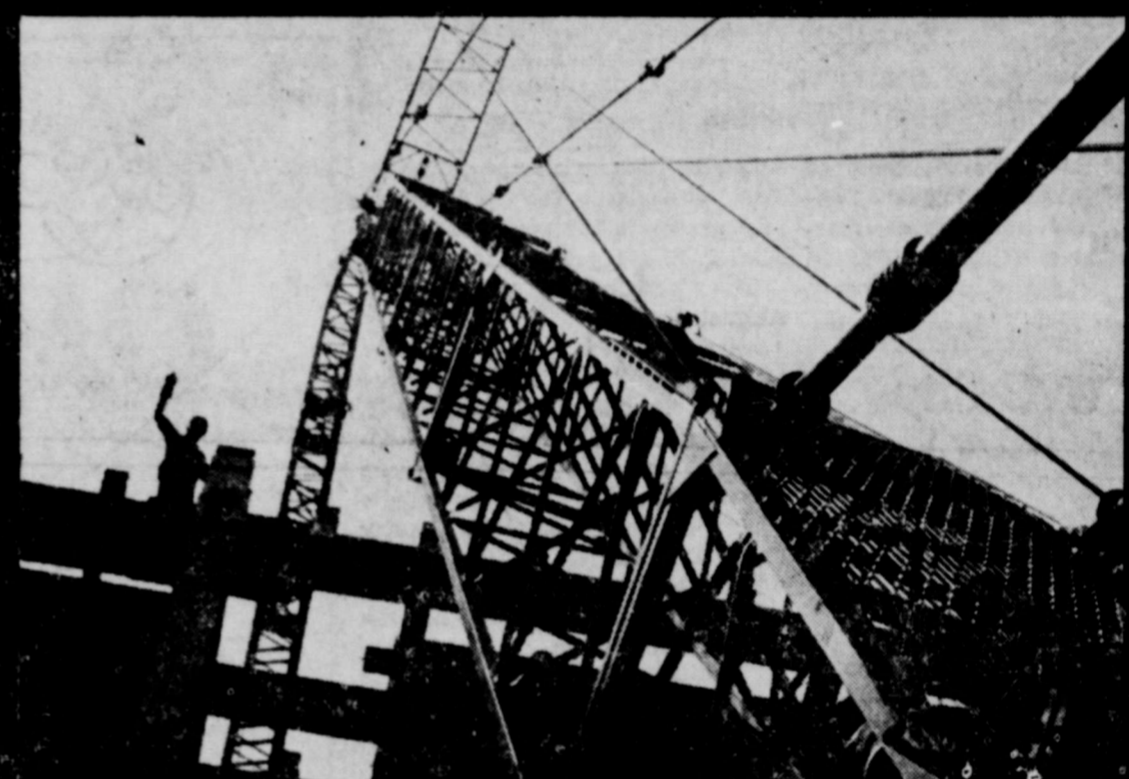

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The objectionable belts are those which simply fasten around the wearer's waist and do not come up over his shoulders.

It was pointed out that the belt type preservers will not necessarily push a person's head up out of the water if he is injured. There's no danger of the belts' permitting wearers to sink, but persons may be made to float face down. In such a case, there is likelihood of drowning.

Life preservers, which are required by law in Texas, are marked "Coats Guard Approved" and are of the cushion type with handles, or the Mae West type which fasten around the waist, come up over the shoulders and fasten around the neck. Texas law provides that there must be one approved life preserver for each person riding in a boat.
