Election Precincts Consolidated Into 5

The following information is made up of excerpts of minutes from a meeting Monday of the Commissioners Court. It explains the new setup in election precincts of the county. The consolidation, the commissioners pointed out, was not done because of the wishes of the court, but because a new state law provides that voting boxes with less than 50 registered voters must be consolidated with another box.

It was brought to the attention of the Court that three major election law bills were passed by the 60th Legislature of Texas at its Regular Session which ended on May 29, 1967.

Sec. 7, Paragraph (b), Article 2.04, Texas Election Code fixes a minimum of 50 voters for each election precinct, ascertained by the number of voters in the last preceding presidential election year, and provides that if there exists any election precinct in the county which does not comply with the foregoing requirements, the commissioners court shall make the necessary changes before the first day of October, 1967.

Longhorn, Steer Tilt Is Expected To Draw Crowd

The Bronte Longhorns are cocked and primed for their first home game Friday night, when they will host their perennial foe, the Robert Lee Steers. Kickoff time is 8 p.m.

Coach Cecil Toliver said this week that his team came through the contest last Friday with Bangs in good shape and the lads should be ready to meet the boys from the Coke County capital.

Robert Lee, like Bronte, took an easy victory last Friday in the season opener. The Steers played

Menard and came out on the long end of a 36-0 score.

The Longhorns have a little weight advantage over the Steers, averaging 175 to the opponents' 168.

Bronte is in the top spot in Texas again this week in Class B football, with an even greater playing strength factor than was indicated last week by Harris Rating System. The Longhorns were rated at 111.1 in Coach Toliver's weekly communique from the rating firm, which is slightly above even the top Class A school in Texas. Bangs dropped from third to 17th in Texas after suffering a 52-12 defeat at the hands of the Longhorns. Robert Lee was rated No. 63 among the Class A schools, with a playing strength of 88.3. Spur is No. 1 in Class A with 110.0.

Bangs Was Easy Mark For Bronte Longhorns

The Longhorns had little difficulty in standing up to their No. 1 spot in the state last Friday night when they downed the No. 3 rated Bangs Dragons, 52-12.

The game was a colorful one, in that red flags much of the time decorated the green playing field. Penalties were the order of the day, as both sides were penalized unmercifully. Bronte drew more penalty yardage than Bangs, but then the Longhorns ran more plays than their opponents. The Longhorns, in addition to racking up 52 points on the scoreboard, had four touchdowns called back.

First Quarter

The two teams looked fairly evenly matched in the first quarter, then Bronte broke loose on a touchdown spree and crossed the goal line three times during the initial period. However it was late in the first period before a score was put up to stay.

Philip Sheffield kicked off to David Glenn to start the ball game. On 3rd down, with 15 yards to go, he tossed a pass which was intercepted by Bangs' tailback

Tommy Stephens. After two downs and a penalty the Dragons faced a 3rd and 15, so they elected to quick kick, and Bronte took over on their own 23.

Doug McCutchen, Charles Masterson and Glenn moved the ball to the 45 and a 15 yard penalty against the Dragons moved the ball to the Bangs 40. On the next play Glenn drew back and tossed a pass to Davis Corley who went for paydirt, but a penalty nullified the try. On the next play, McCutchen powered his way once again to the double stripe, but it didn't count as the Longhorns were offside. After three unsuccessful pass tries, the Longhorns kicked to the Bangs 23.

The Longhorn defense and the flags were too much for the Dragons, so they punted. It was short and gave Bronte the ball on the Bangs 38. McCutchen made 2, Masterson went for 19 yards for a 1st on the 15, and Glenn added 8 more. A pass try failed, and Masterson went 11 for a 1st on the 2. Glenn went around the right side on the next play for the counter. A pass to McCutchen

was good for extra points, but a flag was lying on the field and it was called back. The next try failed. Score: 6-0.

McCutchen kicked off to Stephens who was downed on his own 35. A 15 yarder against Bronte gave Bangs a 1st, but when the quarter ended they faced a 4th and 8 situation.

Second Quarter

Instead of kicking on 4th, the Dragons attempted a pass which went incomplete, and Bronte took over on their 46. McCutchen got wound up and went for 12 and 14 on two successive runs, putting the ball on the Bangs 30. Glenn kept on the next play, took his time to pick up some fine blocking and headed for the double stripe. Glenn also carried for 2 extras and the score stood at 14-0.

The Dragons made some nice gains on the next series of downs with Stephens doing most of the leg work and moving the ball to the Bronte 30. There they bogged down and, faced with a 4th and 20, kicked into the end zone.

Buying Radio & TV Sets

Wise shopping proves a good habit for every purchase made by the consumer, but particular consideration should be given when buying a radio or television set.

Paul Dixon, chairman of the Federal Trade Commission, has established precautions which should be followed by the consumer.

He states that advertisements for radios and TV sets sometime fail to give important details or guarantees, such as parts not covered by warranty, and specific conditions of the guarantee and how long it runs.

Guarantees sometimes vary between cartons and the information inside. An unconditional guarantee on the carton of a television antenna may prove to be merely a 10-day guarantee on information inside, and claims of antenna pick-up capabilities are often exaggerated.

Advertisements for some "socket-type" antennas may overstate capabilities and fail to disclose certain dangers. Dixon says the usefulness of a house wiring system as an antenna depends on the type of wiring, the position of the house, interference from other appliances and the danger of shock if a capacitor in the plug should fail. He says such "socket-type" antennas are virtually useless for color television sets.

Some advertisements are only to "bait" the customer and then "switch" him from the desire for a lower-priced set to a higher-priced one.

Usually such ads appear to be selling well-known brands at low prices, but the customer soon learns that the price refers to a lesser-known brand.

These selling practices are not limited only to television sets but may apply in many situations.

Fashion Features Total Look

The fashion recipe for fall 1967 features a list of compatible ingredients. Designers explain that leaving out one ingredient is much like forgetting an important commodity when baking a cake. The end result isn't very good and often falls flat.

For the new fall look, you begin with a toss of short curly hair or one of the other new shorter cuts, natural sheer makeup and a silhouette narrow at the shoulders and gently skimming to the body to a slightly flared hemline. It is said all must be proportioned

for a perfect look.

With the simple, trim silhouette, sparkling scarves brighten outfits in the accessory line. Belts are returning in chain or leather, lightly placed at the hip. Gloves are short, cut-out and casual. Antique-look jeweled pins and earrings are unusually rich. And small shoulder or handbags enhance rather than overpower.

Interest is on the legs for the younger set, with sporty or dressy stockings a must. Whether the skirts are one, two or three inches above the knees, these must pick up a tone of the outfit. To balance the shorter hemlines, little, low heeled shoes are the order of the season, with the newest look in squared toes.

Lingerie closely follows outerwear trends, with mini slips and petticoats. Tights and shorter panty girdles eliminate the problem of exposing stocking tops when sitting or bending.

Although the fall 1967 look sounds new, any of these accessories or ideas can be adapted to older clothes for a new spark of fashion.

Decorative Pillows Run Wild

Decorative pillows run wild for fall in mink, fox, lamb, giraffe, pony, leopard or any wild animal one can imagine.

To carry out the fur craze of last year, pillows will feature fake fur and real fur pillows.

But this isn't all. Authorities predict no end to the bright vivid shades, such as hot pinks, lemon yellow, fuchsia, cherry red, golds and greens in vinyl and metallic.

The wet look in vinyls, along

with patent, will be found in solids, stripes and checks. Clear vinyl with a touch of spicy color proves popular.

For the formal market will be the glitter of the metallics. Gold, black and silver metallic threads will be woven in brocades, velvets and damasks for a dressy look.

Designers use the word "eclectic" as best describing the selection of pillows available in the fall with the many interesting and splashy shapes, patterns, textures and colors.

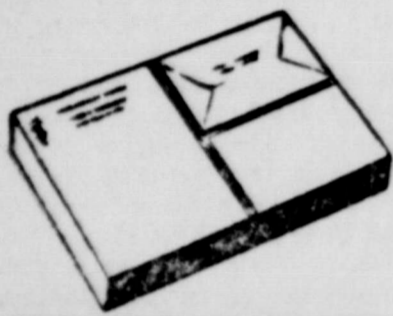

The two - day session will feature training workshops on 4-H, family life, safety, citizenship, health and recreation. Recommendations from these meetings will be taken back to the counties by those attending the state convention and carried out by the approximately 36,000 THDA members throughout the state.

Examples of proposed recommendations include home demonstration club members assuming citizenship responsibilities through study of new state legisla-

tion, clubs' studying the services for the mentally retarded, clubs' encouraging and supporting community and state agencies whose programs assist families, and clubs emphasizing driver education for youth and improved traffic safety legislation to legislators.

In citing the accomplishments of the THDA, Mrs. Low pointed out that "during 1966, the 36,000 club members in 1,709 different clubs provided help in the development of homemaking skills to 265,395 homemakers not enrolled in clubs — an average of about eight assistances per club member."

Mrs. Low also emphasized that 74 outstanding 4-H Club girls have received THDA scholarships in the past 41 years.

"These recipients now serve in leadership capacities throughout the state," Mrs. Low states, "a tribute to the leadership of this organization."
