Texas oil production in 1967, Israeli-Arab conflict, totaled 1,-Based on most recent U.S. Bu- 050,000,000 barrels, a statewide increase over 1966 of about 5 percent. Production last year varranging from 3.5 percent below 1966 to 15 percent above.

> "Production from Coke County last summer helped prevent any oil scarcity for U.S. consumers at a time when one-third of the world's supply was cut off," said Corbin J. Robertson, Houston, Association president: "We must keep in mind, however, that it may be difficult for Texas fields to sustain production in future emergencies if the discovery of new reserves continues to lag, due to lack of exploratory drilling."

> The annual study showed that Coke County ranked 54th among Texas counties in total value of its production of some 6.4 million barrels of oil and 45.6 billion cubic feet of natural gas.

Texas oil men, according to Rinehart's yearbook, drilled 40 wells in the county, risking some \$3 million. Forty-five percent of ton; a sister, Mrs. Fannie Hardin them were dry holes, costing about \$1.3 million.

County landowners and others with mineral interests cashed royalty checks totaling about \$2.9 million during the year. Likewise, the county's flow of oil and gas generates \$1.2 million a year in production taxes paid by producers and royalty owners to the state treasury.

Reports from the Texas Employment Commission show some 112 persons directly employed by the oil and gas industry in the county with an annual payroll of \$824,000.

Plants which convert crude oil and natural gas into useful products also add to the value of a county's output. The Oil and Gas Journal lists two gas processing plants, with a total capacity of 125 million cubic feet a day for the county.





Freezing is one of the simplest, most popular methods of preserv-Dr. Janice May, government ing foods at home. It retains the natural color, flavor, texture and food value of most fruits, vegetables, meats and baked goods.

Handling the food promptly also retains quality.

Undesirable flavors and appearance can be caused by improper packaging. The selection of container depends on the type of food and personal preference.

But all materials should be moisture-vapor proof to prevent evaporation and retain the highest quality in frozen foods.

Authorites recommend rigid containers of glass, aluminum or plastic; and sheet wrappings of moisture-vapor resistant plastic films, freezer aluminum foil, heavily waxed paper and laminated pa-

But, do not use ordinary waxed papers, household aluminum foil and cottage cheese or ice cream

All packages should be air tight. Freezer burn, a surface discoloration on meat and poultry, often results when meat or poultry dry inside the packaging.

Give special care to foods which may become rancid, a result of natural fats and oils being exposed to atmospheric oxygen. These foods include fish, shellfish, beef, pork, meat, poultry, cherries,

Freeze fruits and vegetables at be frozen in a commercial plant at -5 to -20 degrees F. for best re-
