Coke Demos Want Truth on Nixon

Coke County Democrats were interested in getting to the bottom of the Nixon administration's suspected wrongdoings when the convention for the county was held in Robert Lee. Delegates to the convention passed a resolution petitioning Cong. O. C. Fisher to expedite investigation of Nixon's alleged Watergate involvement and the subsequent cover-up.

The resolution called for Fisher "to support any other legislative action which would in any way help restore national confidence in our federal government."

The delegates also passed resolutions abolishing provisions for use of state funds to finance primaries and reinstating filing fees, and another declaring their support of Gov. Dolph Briscoe as the leader of the Democratic Party in Texas.

A resolution was passed in memory of the late D. K. Glenn of Bronte for his many years of service to the party as Coke County chairman.

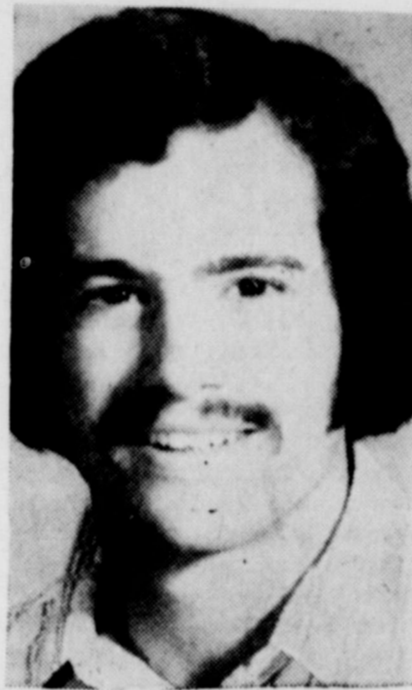

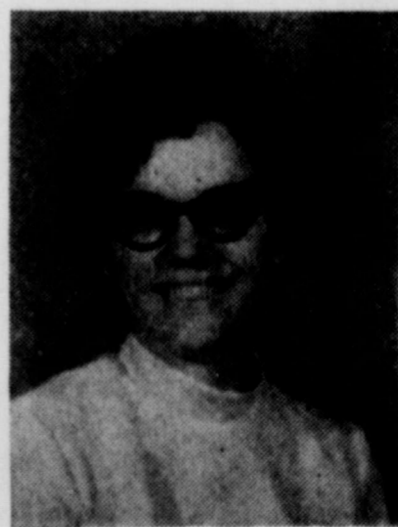

H D Agent's News Dept.

Beginning this year May will be known as Older Americans Month instead of the old designation of Senior Citizens Month. This is officially the 13th year that this older generation has been honored in Texas. During this month, I shall try to have information in my column that will interest this generation.

Although a person's calorie needs decrease as he ages, he still must take in proper nutrients.

To make sure he gets proper nutrients, an older person's diet should include foods from each of the Four Food Groups — in the recommended amounts.

For example, he needs two cups of milk or other milk foods each day. Also two servings of meat or meat substitute, four servings from the fruit and vegetable and four servings from the bread and cereal group.

For in-between meal snacks, choose foods from the daily Four Food quota.

Fresh fruit, cottage cheese, milk, crisp raw vegetables, yogurt, spiced hot tomato juice or a slice of cheese on rye bread offer tasty, nutritious snacks — plus being convenient.

Packaged pastries and candies, in contrast, "eat up" calorie allowance quickly but furnish little nutritional benefit.

So, for best health during aging, cut out calories carefully.

The Four Food Groups should be basic to a person's eating plan. More information is available from my office.

Consumer "Zingers"

Some 85 per cent of the venereal disease (VD) cases reported in Texas are in the age groups 15-29. This means uneducated teenagers are prime targets.

House cleaning takes up one-fifth to one-fourth of the total time spent on homemaking.

Know what you're paying for. Carcass beef is sold by "hanging weight"—which means the consumer pays for the whole thing, including fat and bone trimmed away when cutting up the carcass.

For example, if a consumer bought a 300 pound side of beef, he would probably take home about 225 pounds of retail cuts. Yet he'd pay for the entire 300 pounds, including 75 pounds of fat and bone.

When buying carrots, choose well formed, smooth, well colored, firm ones. Avoid roots with large "sunburned" areas at the top, which must be trimmed, and roots flabby from wilting or showing spots of soft decay.
