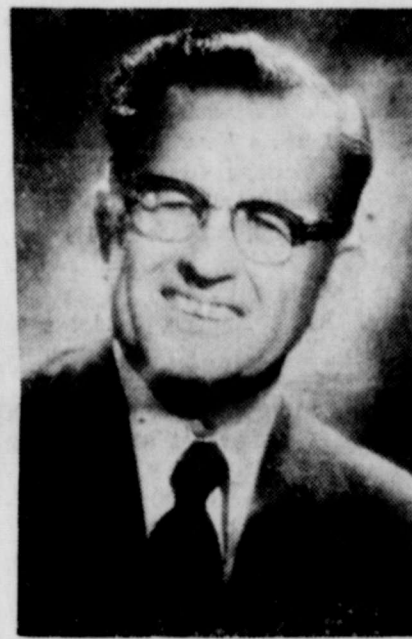

## Parker Recaptured After Prison Break

Danny Parker, 21, of Bronte was one of two inmates of the Oklahoma State penitentiary at McAlester who were captured Tuesday after their escape from the prison. Parker and Lonnie Johnson, 25, were taken into custody by a tactical squadron of the Oklahoma Highway Patrol and young female hostages they were holding were freed.

Parke is serving a term in the Oklahoma prison for forgery and was due for consideration for release in 22 months.

The following story was released Wednesday by United Press International concerning the escape of Parker and Lonnie Johnson:

MEEKER, Okla. (UPI) — Two prison escapees armed with a rifle and shotgun Tuesday surrendered before a steady advance by bloodhounds and officers, freeing the second of two teen-aged hostages without warning their demands for money and a getaway car.

Red haired Kim Thomas, 16, her face stained by tears of joy, emerged from the fugitives' wooded hiding into the embrace of an uncle.

She said she was not hurt, but told officers that near the end of the lengthy ordeal one of the fugitives pointed a gun at her and threatened to "blow my head off."

"You know, I tried to have a conversation, ask them if they were guilty, being in the pen," she said. "They said no. I said well, I can understand that. I go, I want to live, I don't want to die and I'll do

#### Grazing Plans Needed For High Production

Most ranchers in Coke County have a grazing system whether they realize it or not. Although their systems are doing an adequate job, most systems could be improved to yield more production. One way to improve their production is to develop a planned grazing system.

A planned grazing system is a system in which two or more pastures are rested from grazing in a planned sequence through the year or during the growing season of desired plants.

The purpose of a planned grazing system is to maintain or speed up improvement in plant cover on rangeland. Grazing systems enable ranchers to use the forage on all grazing units and to improve efficiency or grazing uniformly, using all parts of each grazing unit. This insures a dependable supply of forage throughout the grazing system and improves the habitat for wildlife.

To develop a system, all factors must be considered. Factors such as the size of the operation, number of pastures, number of livestock, climate, range sites, water facilities and many others that pertain to ranching.

Ranchers in Coke County are working closely with the Soil Conservation Service and are developing a system tailored to help meet their objectives. They know the results will be more forage and more livestock production.

### Funeral Rites Held For 'Pop' Little

Funeral services were held Tuesday morning at 11 o'clock for I. C. (Pop) Little, 85, of Dallas at Laurel-land Funeral Home. He died Tuesday morning in a Dallas nursing home. He was a brother of Mrs. Renza Lee of Maverick.

Mr. Little was born July 27, 1889, in Travis County and came to the Maverick community with his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. W. R. Little, in 1901.

He was married to Elizabeth Borders on Dec. 11, 1911. She died in 1969. He was a member of the Methodist Church.

Mr. Little was a well known pipeline contractor in the United States. He began his career in the oil boom towns in 1918 and lived in Ranger, Breckenridge, Big Sandy and Borger. He did a stretch of the Big Inch Pipeline across the United States and fulfilled other pipeline contracts in Texas, Mississippi, Pennsylvania, Louisiana, New York, Montana, Wyoming and other states. He bought extensive land holdings at Happy and Childress during the 1940s. Since his retirement a few years ago, he has been hospitalized most of the time.

Survivors include three sons, Ira and Eugene of Dallas and Audie Lee of Arlington; two sisters, Mrs. Renza Lee of Maverick and Mrs. Edna Caperton of Branson, Mo.; three grandchildren and three great grandchildren. anything I can to please you."

The only shots actually fired were believed aimed at a patrol helicopter and the dogs.

Paula Workman, also 16, was freed earlier to deliver the escapees' demands for \$200, a car and safe passage from the area.

Oklahoma Highway Patrol Chief Jerry Matheson refused to meet the demands until the second girl was freed. Officers pressed steadily forward and the patrol helicopter hovered overhead. The fugitives surrendered when the cordon moved to within a few hundred yards of them.

Lonnie Johnson, 22, and Danny George Parker, 21, walked away from a trusty building at the state penitentiary at McAlester Sunday night and seized the girls at a cabin on Lake McAlester.

Parker said he gave up because he was afraid Miss Thomas would be hurt in an exchange of gunfire with officers.

Johnson, cradling a rifle in his arm, came out of hiding briefly earlier to talk with his sister, Sherry, who had been pleading with him over a loudspeaker for him to surrender.

A patrol pilot located the fugitives near a stream southwest of Meeker early Tuesday and a host of officers quickly sealed off the area.

Johnson was serving 15 years from Lincoln County for auto theft and Parker was sentenced to four years for forgery from Kingfisher County.

The above ends the UPI dispatch on the matter.

A release from the Abilene Reporter-News says that Parker was

on his way to Abilene to kill his wife. The story goes on to say that he has no wife, but was formerly married to La Donna Scott, 17, of Bronte. The Reporter-News story says she has been divorced from Parker for more than a year.

She is now living with her grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. T. B. Beaver, of Bronte.

Parker has a "lengthy record" of criminal activity ranging from attempted rape to burglary.

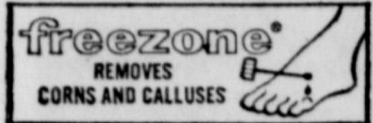

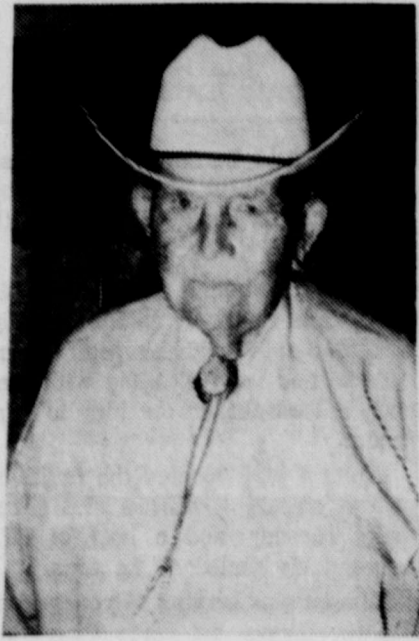

## Pioneer Ira A. Bird 90 Year Old Honoree

Ira A. Bird was born Dec. 15, 1881, in a log cabin on the bank of Falls Creek eight miles from Hico in Hamilton County. When he was five years old his family moved to the part of Tom Green County which was two years later organized into Coke County. They settled near Yellow Wolf Creek in the little village of Sanco.

Mr. Bird grew up doing all the chores common to an early day family in the country. He attended a one room school, the lumber for which his father hauled in a wagon from Ballinger. When he was 17 years old he took the state examinations and received a First Grade Teacher's Certificate which was the best Teacher's Certificate at that time, and he started teaching his first school which was the Horse Mountain School north of Sanco while he was still 17.

He married Mary Maud Cosby from north of Big Spring when he was 18. When the grasshoppers ate everything in this country, even to the bark on the mesquites, they went to Big Spring where he secured a section of land by taking part in a land rush. While homesteading their land they lived in a half dugout where Mrs. Bird cooked their food on a cow chip fire. Later they moved back to Sanco and still later to their ranch where he has lived ever since. Mrs. Bird died in 1968.

The Birds have two daughters, Mrs. Evelyn McKinley who lives with her father, and Mrs. Nolan Pentecost who ranches with her husband near her father.

Mr. Bird has been engaged in the ranching business all of his life, and has raised registered Hereford cattle for 58 years.

He was elected and served two terms as county commissioner of Coke County. He took the lead in establishing and carrying on the Sanco Camp Meeting for 22 years, and helped sponsor an annual Christian Youth Camp at Sanco for a number of years. He has always been active in community and church work and is a member of the Evangelical Methodist Church.

Mr. Bird has continued very active and alert through his 93 years, and still operates a small part of his ranch and runs a few sheep and a very few head of cattle. He drives his car around the ranch, does a little yard work, reads a lot and remains interested in everything that goes on around him. He feels that keeping busy and interested in things is one secret to living a long and satisfying life.
