Longhorns, Jayton Meet In Top Class B Game

One of the top Class B games in the state will unfold tonight when the Bronte Longhorns travel to Jayton to take on the Jaybirds. The two teams were preseason favorites to battle it out for the District 3-B title and nothing has happened since the season began to change that. Kickoff time is 7:30 p.m. and all local fans are urged to follow the Horns.

The Longhorns will carry a perfect 7-0 season and a 4-0 district

Basketball Team To Participate In Clinic at Snyder

The Bronte Longhorn girl basketballers have been invited to participate in a basketball clinic at Western Texas College in Snyder Saturday. The local girls will play Meadow in a 7:30 game that night.

Coach Zula Sweeten will also appear on the program Saturday. She will be on a panel along with other coaches and lecturers discussing different aspects of basketball. Coach Sweeten said she felt it was a great honor to have the Longhorn team invited by Western Texas to appear at the clinic.

The clinic will kickoff at 8:45 a.m. with registration followed by lectures and demonstrations throughout the day. The Western Texas College Dusters will have a scrimmage game beginning at 6:30. The Bronte-Meadow pre-game warmup starts at 7:10 to be followed by the contest at 7:30.

Still Undefeated

The local girls have captured two games in the past week. They traveled to May last Thursday night and downed their host 70-49. Sherrie Coalson was the top scorer with 35. Shelley Cumbie had 21, Leah Barbee 11 and Kim Glascock 3.

Tuesday night the Forsan Buffs came here with the Horns outscoring their arch rivals, 87-73. Coalson once again led the scoring with 31; Cumbie had 22; Barbee 17; Glascock 14; and Marla Thompson 3.

The girls now have a record of 4-0.

B Team Games

The girls B team also captured two games the past week to move up their record to 3-0. They downed May 33-19 with Karen Arrott the top point maker with 16. Shylene Tidwell had 13 and Debbie Frazee 4.

The locals downed Forsan 41-38. Arrott again was top scorer with 20. Tidwell followed closely with 18 and Frazee had 3.

Upcoming Games

The girls A team will travel to Eola Monday night. Game time is 7 p.m.

The volleyball teams will also be in action next week. Brownwood will come here Thursday night for A and B team games starting at 6:30. The A team is a 10-2 record and the B team is undefeated with an 8-0

record into the contest. The Jaybirds dropped their season opener to Roscoe but have come back to win six straight. Their loop record is also 4-0. The winner of Friday's game will be almost a sure bet to go on and take the title as all other 3-B teams have suffered two or more league defeats.

The winner of this game the past three years has gone on to capture the league title. Jayton topped the Horns the first two times, 14-6 and 28-13. The Longhorns won it all last year by soundly thrashing the Jaybirds 26-0.

This year's game when looked at on paper appears to be almost even. Besides having almost identical records the two teams are also even in the points column. The Horns have tallied 177 over the season and 103 in district play, while Jayton has 162 and 127. The Longhorns have given up 51 overall and 26 in league action while the Jaybirds have surrendered 53 and 28.

The Harris rating system has the game as a tossup while the Abilene Reporter-News has the Horns ranked number one in the Big Country and Jayton number two. The winner will probably be determined by who really wants to get after it the most.

Texas voters will have a rare opportunity Tuesday, Nov. 4, one they have never had before. They will vote on a new constitution for the state, and if it carries, it will replace the one which was adopted in 1876, almost 100 years ago.

The ballots are divided up into eight propositions on which registered voters will cast their votes.

No. 1 deals with the separation of powers of the state government, and includes legislative and executive duties of the state government.

Coke Historical Group Receives State Recognition

Coke County was one of the 46 county historical commissions that was presented with a Distinguished Service at the annual meeting of the Texas Historical Commission in Nacogdoches Oct. 24-25.

Mrs. Bryan Yarbrough of Robert Lee, chairman of the Coke County Historical Commission, attended the meeting and accepted the award for Coke County.

County historical programs had to qualify in 15 different areas over the last year to receive this state recognition.

To receive the commendation, county historical commissions must present a minimum of six programs on local history to other civic groups; sponsor or help plan at least three conducted historical tours; conduct at least one phase of an oral history program; and complete at least one phase of any one of several historical preservation projects such as a written county history, restoration of structures, or the establishment of county archives; among other requirements.

The Texas Historical Commission presents the Distinguished Service Award each year to all county groups meeting these rigorous basic qualifications.

Runnels County also was among the 46 counties to receive the award.

OFFICES TO CLOSE

Offices in the County Courthouse at Robert Lee will be closed Tuesday because of the election.

No. 2 deals with the judiciary of the state.

No. 3 has to do with elections held in the state.

No. 4 deals with Texas schools.

No. 5 revises provisions for financing various agencies which the state supports.

No. 6 provides the rules for local governments, such as county and city.

No. 7 is labeled "general provisions" and is sort of a catch-all for items not provided for in the other propositions.

No. 8 provides for methods of amending the new constitution, if it passes.

Everyone is encouraged to get out and vote next Tuesday. The ballots are printed so voters can vote for or against either of the eight propositions.

Ballots have been printed in English and Spanish for Coke County, which will allow those who can read only Spanish to be able to understand it.

Anyone who wishes to may come by the office of County Clerk Mrs. Winnie Waldrop, the Robert Lee Observer office or the Bronte Enterprise office and see a sample ballot.

Voters who wish to vote absentee in the Nov. 4 election have one more day to do so as the deadline is Friday, Oct. 31.

Persons who will be out of the county or hospitalized on election day may vote in the office of the county clerk until 5 p.m. Friday.

Mrs. Winnie Waldrop, Coke County clerk, reported Tuesday afternoon that her office had mailed out four absentee ballots but no one had come by her office to vote absentee.

A sample ballot, sponsored by the First National Bank appears on page 7.

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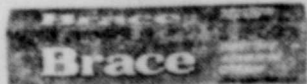
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COKE WOMEN INVITED TO SEWING PROGRAM

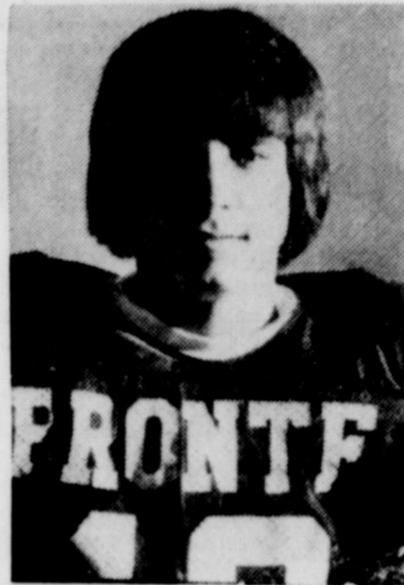

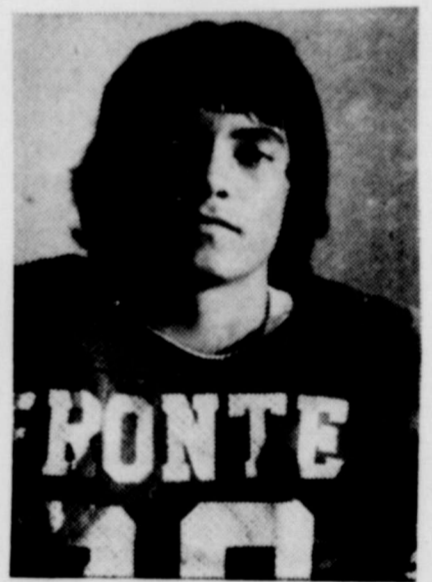

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Horns Whip Loraine, 31-0

The Bronte Enterprise

The Bronte Longhorns tallied three touchdowns in less than nine minutes to whip the Loraine Bulldogs 31-0 in a District 3-B game played at Loraine last Saturday night. The Horns had a 19-0 lead after the first quarter of play and toyed with the Bulldogs the final three periods with Longhorn reserves seeing a lot of action.

The win was the seventh of the season without a loss and moved the Longhorns' district record to 4-0.

First Half

Clint Porter kicked off for the Longhorns to start the ball game with Loraine putting the ball in play at their own 15. Three plays lost 7. Wayne Coalson then returned the punt from the Bulldog 40 to the 30. Three plays lost 6 yards but on the 4th down quarter-back Nelson Coulter hit Randy Parker with a 36 yard scoring pass with 8:25 left in the first quarter. Kerwin Denton's extra point kick was no good and left the score at 6-0.

Loraine returned the kickoff out to the 43 but on 2nd down Porter fell on a Bulldog fumble to put the Horns in business at the 41. Coulter picked up a big 29 yards on 1st down. Billy Ren Lee then made 8 yards in two carries before Coalson picked up a 1st at the 1. Lee then bulled his way over for the TD and following Coalson's successful EP kick, the Horns had a 13-0 lead with 5:55 left in the quarter.

Following Porter's kickoff Loraine once again gave up the football with Bobby Frazee recovering the loose pigskin at the Bulldog 36. Lee and Coulter advanced the ball to the 5 where Lee cracked it

into the end zone to make the score, 19-0, with 3:13 still remaining in the first quarter. Coalson's EP attempt was no good.

The Longhorns held following the kickoff and forced Loraine to punt with the ball being killed at the Bronte 45. Coulter picked up a 1st down at the Bulldog 44 as the quarter ended. Lee carried for 7. Joe Bob Ragsdale picked up 2 and Coulter again made a 1st at the Bulldog 34. Four running plays picked up 8 yards and the ball went over on downs.

Loraine once again was forced to punt with the kick carrying only to the Bulldog 44. Ragsdale picked up 2 and Kevin Gibbs 1 in two tries. Coalson's punt carried to the Bulldog 19 where Denton fell on a loose ball to keep possession for the Horns. Gibbs made 3 and Coulter 11 for a 1st at the 5. A delay of game penalty moved it back to the 10. Coalson got the 5 back on 1st down and then carried for 2 before Coulter picked up the final 3 and the TD. The EP try again was no good and the Horns led 25-0.

The Bulldogs moved the ball from their 41 to the Longhorn 8 following the kickoff. Here the Horns' defense got tough and took over on downs. Three plays later the half ended.

Second Half

Coalson returned the second half kickoff from his 25 to the 34 from where the Longhorns started their final scoring drive of the night. Lee picked up 14 yards in two carries and a Coulter to Parker pass was good for 33 yards and a 1st at the Loraine 19. A pass fell incomplete and Coulter lost 5 in two tries before Denton broke off tackle and scampered 24 yards for the TD. Denton's EP kick was no good and the score was 31-0.

Loraine punted following the kickoff but the Horns were forced to kick it back with Coalson's punt being killed at the Loraine 15. The Bulldogs were again forced to punt with the Longhorns getting the ball at their 41. Coulter picked up 7 before Loraine recovered a Horn fumble at midfield. Then they completed a pass to the Horn 28 and picked up another 1st at the 15. Two plays later Mark Lee

pounced on a Bulldog miscue at the 15.

Following an exchange of punts the Bulldogs recovered a loose ball at the Horns' 27. They picked up a 1st at the 16 but following a 1 yard run, an offside penalty against the Horns and three passing attempts, the Longhorns took over at the 10.

The Horns moved the ball out to the 42 before Loraine once again recovered a Longhorn fumble. The Bulldogs completed one of four passes and Bronte took over at their 40. Parker picked up 5 but Gibbs lost 6 to bring up Coalson's punt which carried to the Loraine 31. Coulter intercepted a 1st down pass and returned it 40 yards for an apparent TD but the ball was brought back and the Horns penalized 5 for offside.

The Longhorns got the ball one more time but gave it back on a fumble. Coulter then intercepted a Bulldog pass at the Loraine 45 the final play of the game.

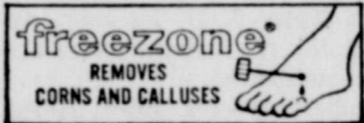

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SAM PENDERGRAST'S COLUMNS ARE TO BE PRINTED IN BOOK

Sam Pendergrast, San Angelo columnist, was born in Bronte, so despite his determination to be fair to all areas of the 47 county "beat" for his column — it's no wonder Bronte and Coke County come in for frequent mention in "Blowing with the Wind; a West Texas Collection," the 250 page book due to be published the first week in November.

In fact, the first column in the collection of more than 100 of his popular columns being reprinted is about his roots in the Eaton family of Bronte.

But there are also columns about the Bronte football team that rampaged through Class B last year, the musicians and parents and friends that back up the Longhorns, and many reminiscences about Bronte as typical of the "grassroots of America."

"We tried to pick out the columns which are most representative of the life and times of West Texas," Pendergrast said, "and we ended up with 80 different date-lines from Lometa to Balmorhea and Del Rio to Kermit."

Pendergrast, former editor of news papers at Corsicana, Santa Rosa, N. M., El Paso and Hamilton, O., has traveled more than 50,000 miles through West Texas in the past 14 months in search of feature materials and news events of general interest.

He has become a popular speaker, master of ceremonies and judge of everything from female good looks to chili. (Among one of the most active "cookoff" judges in Texas, he will be one of the judges in the Ninth Annual World Championship Chili Cookoff at Terlingua Saturday, Nov. 1, and he reiterates the contest has not been moved to California despite the attempts of former Terlingua figure C. V. Wood of the far western state.)

A 1951 graduate of Abilene High School with a bachelor's degree in English from Texas Western College (now the University of Texas at El Paso), he has taught high school English, Spanish and journalism and written eight book length projects.

He is currently serving as 15 county district director of public information for the American Cancer Society and founding president of the San Angelo Press Club.

Pendergrast's book receives more or less regular advertising in the San Angelo Standard-Times, and it ought to be an interesting item for any West Texan's library.

Coke Rural Water Group Working

A meeting of the Coke County Water Supply Corporation steering committee was held Thursday, Oct. 9, at the Courthouse in Robert Lee to further discuss the possibility of securing treated water for rural areas of the county.

Attending were Don Fields, committee chairman; Floyd Harmon, committeeman; Sterling Lindsey, County Extension Agent; Bronte Mayor R. T. Caperton; County Attorney Bob Owen; County Judge W. W. Thetford; Alton Pyburn, PHA county supervisor; and William E. Fox, engineer of San Angelo.

The group had a discussion of the project and a question and answer session was held. Fox answered questions and provided information regarding the procedures to follow and the engineering required to secure treated water for rural areas. Pyburn answered questions and provided information regarding loans and grants for establishing a water supply corporation.

Following the discussion an application was filed by the steering committee with Pyburn for a loan

and grant to construct a water supply system that would provide treated water to the rural areas of Coke County.

SCREW WORM CASES SHOW BIG INCREASE IN NORTHERN AREAS

The screw worm numbers over the state suddenly increased with more cases showing up in northern counties. No doubt recent rains have been a factor in the increase.

Coke County had three cases last week from three different areas of the county. Thomas Black had one case confirmed on his place 15 miles west-southwest of Robert Lee. A second case was reported from the Wendland ranch nine miles southeast of Robert Lee. The third case came from the Charlie Cave ranch on the county line just south of Blackwell.

Adjoining counties have reported increases also. Operators are encouraged to watch for possible screw worm cases and submit samples of all worm cases to the Mission laboratory for positive identification. The program officials require positive identification before they will release sterile flies to a given area.

Pena said that married women who have not changed their name with Social Security should do so.

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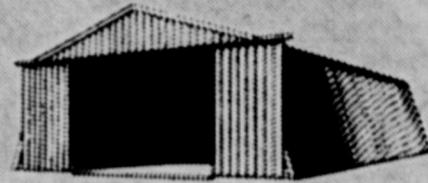
