Constitution Loses By Landslide In Coke, State

Coke County voters went a little stronger against the proposed new constitution than most Texans, voting about five to one against the eight proposals that were presented to Texas voters Tuesday.

The entire new deal was soundly defeated all over the state with some counties voting as heavily as 11 to one against it.

The proposed new constitution was put together mostly by members of the Texas Legislature sitting in convention, and many con-

servative members of the executive branch, including Gov. Dolph Briscoe, came out against the new constitution.

Even quite a number of the members who drafted the new constitution came out against it in part or entirely.

Rites to Be Held For Mrs. Harris

Mrs. John R. (Mary) Harris, administrator of the Bronte Hospital, died last Friday at 6:10 p.m. after a long illness.

Her body was taken to San Antonio for cremation and private funeral services will be held in Bronte's Fairview Cemetery.

It was Mrs. Harris' request that her father-in-law, the Rev. John Roy Harris of Ada, Okla., read the 23rd Psalm at her final rites.

Mrs. Harris was born Sept. 3, 1915, at Blackwell and attended Blackwell Grade School. She moved with her parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. Rex Lewis, to Carizozo, N. M., where Mr. Lewis established the Rafter 8 Ranch. She graduated from Carizozo High School and entered nurses training in El Paso's Masonic Hospital. The school was closed before she completed her work and she went to San Antonio where she completed requirements for her R. N. degree.

She was married to Dr. John R. Harris April 23, 1944, when he was stationed in San Antonio with the armed forces.

The family moved to Bronte in 1947 and Mrs. Harris served as her husband's surgical nurse for many years before she took over

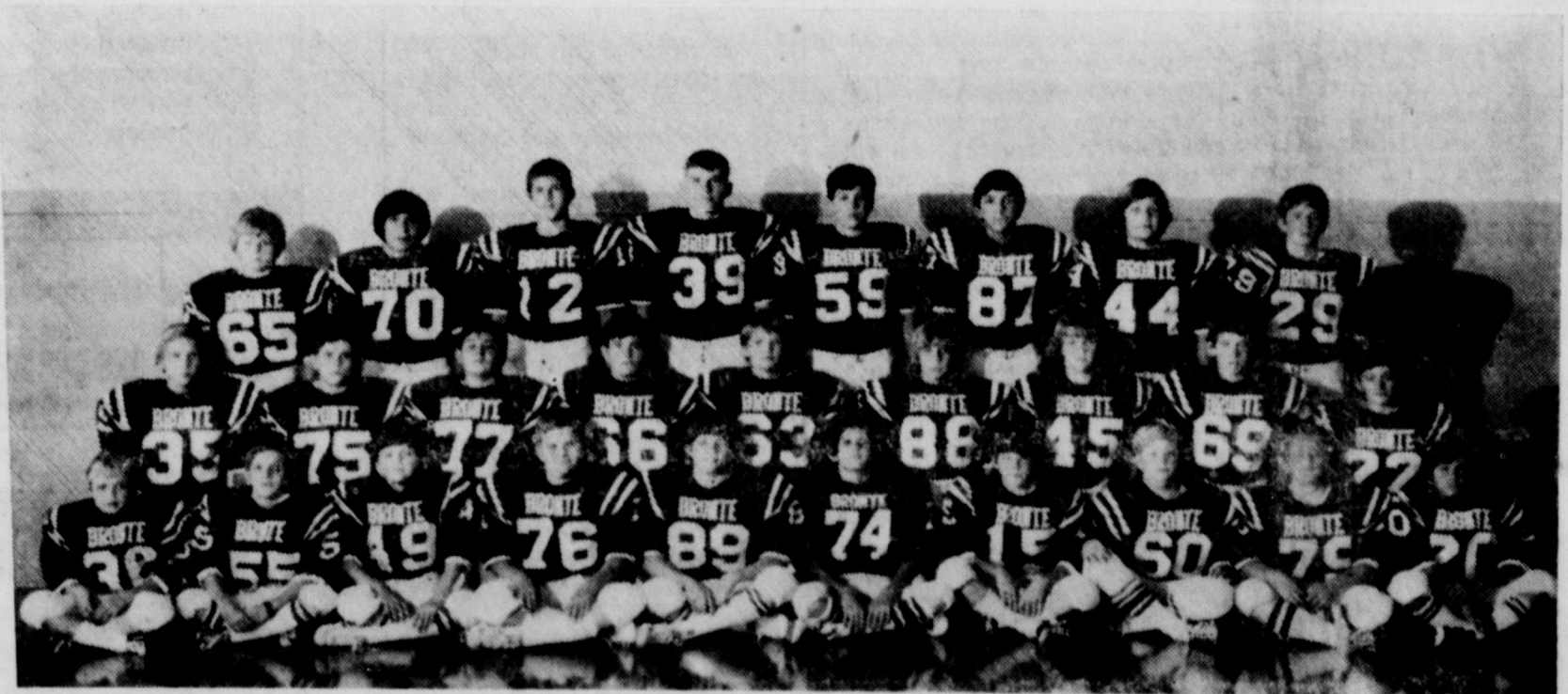

CATTLEMEN'S ASSN. REVIEWS ACTIVITIES OF THE PAST YEAR

In a recent meeting of the Coke County Independent Cattlemen's Association, the accomplishments of the past year were reviewed.

In less than a year, the Independent Cattlemen's Association has become not only the largest livestock association in Texas, but has the largest active membership in the United States, in excess of 100,000 members.

It has informed national and state leaders, including the President, the Congress, State Legislatures, Federal and State Agency officials, and, most important, the public, of livestock and agriculture problems.

It has put forth maximum effort to defeat land use legislation and was very instrumental in its failure.

The Association sought and obtained changes in the Emergency Livestock Loan Act benefiting the farmer and rancher.

It supported the new state law prohibiting state agencies and subdivisions from purchasing and using imported beef.

It supports state legislation to tax open space land on its capability to produce and on fair market value.

Helped organize a task force of the heads of all agricultural organizations in Texas that went to Washington and met with task forces from other states to work in harmony to accomplish whatever possible for agriculture as a whole.

Was responsible for stimulating greater activities by other livestock and agriculture associations.

Developed and is now publishing the "Independent Cattlemen" magazine to inform membership of ICA activities and provide educational and research data to improve ranching and farming techniques.

ICA has been involved with a number of bills that were passed and defeated on the state and national level.

Officers of the Coke County ICA are: Don Fields, president; Royce Panther, vice president; Robert Mathers, secretary; Wayland Drennen, treasurer.

Plans are to start a membership drive for 1976 in the near future.

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Horns Fall From Unbeaten Ranks, 17-8

The Bronte Longhorns saw visions of an undefeated season fall by the wayside last Friday night when they traveled to Jayton and were beaten by the Jaybirds, 17-8. The Horns trailed 17-0 at halftime but came back in the second half to outscore their hosts, 8-0.

The game was a hard hitting affair with both teams putting forth an outstanding effort. Turnovers and penalties played important roles in the game's outcome. Jayton drew over 100 yards in walkoffs, aiding the Longhorns in their only scoring drive. The Horns were even less fortunate, having a TD in the early part of the game called back and turning the ball over numerous other times.

The Longhorns, though much smaller and slower than the Jaybirds, gave a good account of themselves and had nothing to be ashamed of. The Horns' record is 7-1 with two games left to play.

First Half

Clint Porter kicked off for the Horns to open the ball game. Jayton was caught holding while the ball was in the air and Porter kicked off again, this time from the Jaybird 45. The kick sailed into the end zone and Jayton put the ball in play at the 20.

With all-state halfback Mark Fincher and quarterback Bobby Kelly doing most of the carrying, the Jaybirds moved for 1st downs at the 31 and 41. Then Fincher broke off the left side and raced 59 yards for the first score of the evening. Fincher's extra point kick was no good and the Jaybirds had a 6-0 lead with less than three minutes gone in the game.

Nelson Coulter returned the Jayton kickoff to the Horns' 35. Wayne Coalson made a fine run to the Jayton 37 but the ball was brought back and the Horns penalized 5 for illegal procedure. Then Coulter broke loose and traveled 70 yards to pay dirt only to have this play also called back and Bronte penalized 15 yards for illegal block, to bring up 1st and 20.

Coulter hit Randy Parker for 9 and then picked up 6 before a Horn fumble turned the ball over at the 42.

Fincher, Kelly and Billy Wilson took turns carryin to move the ball to the 6 where a field goal attempt was no good and the Horns still trailed 6-0. With the ball at the 20, Wayne Coalson picked up 1 and Coulter hit Mark Lee at the 25 only to fumble the ball and have Jayton once again recover. Fincher carried twice for a 1st at the 12. The Jaybirds were then penalized 5 for illegal motion. The Horns defense got tough and held for three downs only to have Fincher kick a 27 yard field goal to raise the score to 10-0.

Following the kickoff the Horns once again turned the ball over to Jayton on a pass interception at the Bronte 49. The Jaybirds picked up one 1st down before Kerwin Denton picked off a Jayton pass to give the Horns the ball at the 31. Three plays later Coalson punted to the Jaybird 43. Jay-

ton was then forced to punt back with the Horns taking over at their 34. The Horns couldn't move and Coalson again punted to the Jaybird 31.

Fincher, who had over 200 yards rushing, picked up 30 yards in two tries before a pass was completed to the Horns' 5. Fincher picked up 1 before Kelly got the last 4 and 6 points with 13 seconds left in the half. Fincher then ran for two extra points to bring the halftime score to 17-0.

Second Half

Coalson returned the kickoff out to his 29. The Horns were forced to punt but the Jaybirds drew an illegal block penalty while the ball was in the air and the Horns had a 1st down at the Jaybird 39. Coalson picked up 1 and Coulter 2 before the Jaybirds were penalized 5. Denton picked up a 1st at the 28. Three plays lost 1 and a 4th down pass went incomplete but the Jaybirds were called of interference at the 16. Denton then went straight up the middle for 16 yards and 6 points. Coalson carried for

the 2 EPs on a weird play to bring the score to 17-8.

Porter's kickoff went off the side of his foot but M. Lee recovered for the Horns at the Jayton 36 to once again put the Horns in business. Four plays picked up 9 and the ball went over at the 27.

Jayton then started a time consuming drive but came up with no points as the Horns' defense got tough and took over at their own 12. The Horns couldn't move and Coalson got off a great 68 yard punt. It was once again called back and the Jaybirds were again penalized 15 yards for throwing an illegal block while the ball was in the air. The Horns kept possession at the 25. The Horns still couldn't move and Coalson punted 46 yards to the Jaybird 34.

The Jaybirds picked up 1st downs at their 46, the Longhorn 43, 32 and 17 before the Horns stopped them and took over at the 15. Two plays later Jayton came up with another loose ball at the 15. Fincher picked up 7 before Kelly fumbled the ball into the end zone

with the Horns recovering and taking over at the 20. One play later the final whistle sounded with the Horns losing their first game 17-8.

Parker, Coalson, Coulter, Denton, Paul Cervenka, Jimmy Tidwell, Porter, Billy Ren Lee, M. Lee and Randy Leigh all turned in good defensive games.

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GOOD RAINS DAMPEN AREA

Good fall rains dampened the entire Bronte area last weekend. The rain started falling Saturday night and continued into Sunday. Weather officials said the moisture drop was triggered by a cool front colliding with a flow of moisture coming in from the southeast.

The Enterprise's official rain gauger, Dave Seibold, said the city had 2.6 inches Saturday night plus .3 of an inch Sunday, for a total of 2.9 inches.

Other measurements reported to The Enterprise were: C. E. McGuire, west of town, 3.2 inches; Ed Cumbie, north of town, 1.7 inches; Jim Mackey, to the northeast, 2.5 inches; W. H. Thomas at Tennyson, 3.2 inches.

Ranchers were overjoyed with the moisture fall, and said it would be a big boost to small grain crops which would, in turn, provide winter grazing for their cattle and sheep.

MORE SCREWWORM CASES IN COUNTY

Coke County had three additional confirmed cases of screwworms last week. Also, several other cases were reported being treated. A total of six cases have now been confirmed in the past two weeks.

The Wendland Ranch had a second case confirmed along with first cases being reported by Don Glenn from his place five miles north of Bronte and Simpson Bros. from their place four miles north of Robert Lee.

Statewide, the number of cases has increased rapidly during the past three weeks. Because of concern over the buildup, we called Dr. Novey, veterinarian in charge of the program, to find out about sterile fly releases in this area. Dr. Novey stated that the buildup in the screwworms over wintering area of South Texas had increased so in the past three weeks that the program directors were forced to concentrate all the sterile fly drops in the southern half of the state — from the Hill Country south. He stated that as of a week ago, Oct. 26, all drops have been placed in the south half of the state.

This means we need to watch closely the local situation. With lambing and calving in process, we could have quite a few cases before the onset of cold weather. The cool nights have slowed down insect movement, but the fly will still become active during the warm part of the day.

To kill the overwintered pupa in the ground, roughly two months of 60 degrees or lower ground temperatures are required. Also, the female fly does not lay eggs when the temperature is below 65 degrees, as a rule.

INFO RELEASED ON FORTHCOMING GAME SEASON

Coke County Game Warden R. L. Flanagan has released the following information concerning the forthcoming deer, turkey and quail seasons.

Deer and turkey season will open Saturday, Nov. 15, and will go through Jan. 4. Bag limit on deer, three. This includes two buck and the third by antlerless permit only. Bag limit on turkey, two of either sex.

No person may take antlerless deer without first obtaining a permit from the land owner where such animal is killed. All tags and permits must be attached to animals immediately upon possession and remain attached until the carcass has been finally processed. Recommended procedure is to fasten tags and permits to antlers or forelegs with string or wire.

It is unlawful for any person to kill and possess a turkey without attaching the turkey tag from their valid hunting license to the bird and this tag must remain attached to the bird until arrival at its final destination.

Quail season also opens Nov. 15 but will go through Feb. 15. Bag limit is 12 per day, 36 in possession.

Legal shooting hours will be one-half hour before sunrise to one-half hour after sunset.

Anyone leasing property for hunting is required to buy a shooting preserve license. This can be obtained from Parks and Wildlife Dept. in San Angelo.

Persons between ages of 17 and 65 are required to buy resident hunting licenses while those under 17 and over 65 need to purchase exempt licenses.

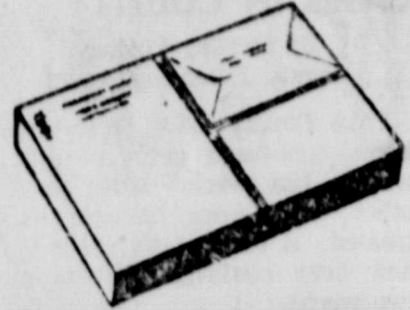

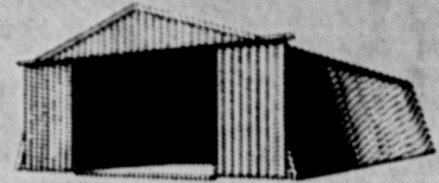
