#### VOTER REGISTRATION CARDS REQUIRED

Due to the new Texas Election laws and the new type of registra\_ tion it is required that every voter take his or her registration card to the polls so that it can be stamped "VOTED."

Since there will be two Primaries held in Coke County May 1 these cards will be stamped "Democrat-Voted" or Republican-Voted" in the proper blank on the card.

If anyone, for some reason, does not have a voter registration card and is a legally registered voter, he may sign an affidavit that it has been lost and a receipt will be made at the polling places.

The voter can vote in only one polling place in a Primary Election, either Democratic or Republican. Voters are not allowed to spit their votes in a Primary Election and vote for some candidates in one party and some in the other.


# Important for Women PLEASE READ
